

and the same Day the Empress Dowager, accompanied by her Daughters the Arch-Duchesses, celebrated the Anniversary of the late Empress in the Church of the Jesuits. They write from Hungary, that the Colonel of the Heydukes in the Garrison of Neuhausel, having represented to the Governor of that Town the Misery of the Soldiers for want of Money and Cloaths, and reproaching him with the Breach of his Promise, in not providing Necessaries for the Garrison; the Governor was so incensed at these Reproaches, that they both drew their Scymetars, and would have fought upon the Spot, had they not been prevented by some Officers who were present. Hereupon the Heydukes immediately raised a Tumult, and the Governor forthwith commanded the Infantry and Cavalry of the Garrison to stand to their Arms, in order to appease or disperse them. They add, that those Commotions were not quieted at the Dispatch of these Advices, and it was expected that the Consequence would be advantageous to the Imperialists. We have received a particular Account of the taking of Lissa by General Heister, whereby it appears that the General having invested the Place, summoned the Malecontents to surrender; but, upon their Refusal, he gave Orders for bombarding the Town; and having burnt down about two hundred Houses, the Governor sent him a Request to desist from throwing any more Bombs till next Day, during which time he promised to dispose the Town to surrender. This being granted, the Enemy employed all the Night in uncovering their Houses, and prepared for a further Defence, instead of a Capitulation; and next Day signified to the General, That they would defend the Place to the last Extremity, and thereupon made a vigorous Sally on the Besiegers; but they were warmly repulsed, and one Lieutenant and one Ensign were taken Prisoners. The Imperialists immediately hanged up the Lieutenant before the Gate of the Town, shot the Ensign to Death, and thereupon made the General Assault, and carried the Place Sword in Hand. Most of the Malecontents were put to the Sword, and a strong Garrison left in the Town by the Imperialists.

Plimouth, December 27. Yesterday came in the Neptune, a Dutch Privateer, from Cruizing; and this Day sailed for Sweden with Salt from St. Ubes, bound for Sweden.

Portsmouth, December 28. On Monday last her Majesty's Ships the Southsea-Castle, Portland, Lancaster, Royal-Oak, Newark, Looe and Strombulo sailed to the Eastward, with about 50 Sail of Merchantmen and Coasters under their Convoy. Sir John Norris continues still at Spithead, with her Majesty's Ships the Eli-

zabeth, Nottingham, Berwick, Grafton, Gosport, Edgar, Rupert, Windsor, Warspight, Russell, Nonfuch, Cruizer, Rose-Pink, Monk's Prize, Suffolk Hagboat, and Phoenix Fire-ship.
