Moscow, November 21. N. S. Great Preparations are making in this City for the Publick Entrance of his Czarish Majesty. Triumphal Arches are to be erected, and fifty Pieces of Brass Cannon are ordered to be newly cast on that Occasion. Great quantities of Cloth have been bought up in Archangel for the Regiments that are to assist at the Procession; and most of the Governors and Nobility, as also three Persons of the greatest Distinction in every Town, are summoned hither, in order to add to the Magnificence of this Solemnity. The Foreign Merchants who used to pay the Customs here in Specie, are directed to give Bills for one half, either in Holland or Hamburg; and it is said the Product of the Corn shipped off on Prince Menzikoff's Account is to be disposed in the same manner. Our last Advices from Felt-Marshall Scheremetoff's Camp say, that the Army under his Command was advanced before Riga, in order to attack that Place; but it is believed they will desist from further Hostilities against the Town, 'till the Spring advances, and only design to streighten and incommode it, by settling their Winter Quarters in the Neighbourhood; but the Swedes having destroyed, or carried away all the Provisions in the adjacent Country, the Muscovites meet with great Difficulties to find necessaries for the Subsistence of their Troops. His Cz-arish Majesty is speedily expected here by the way of Peterburg: And Admiral Apraxia is gone to that City. There are great Bodies of Troops between Nerva and Revel, where they stay to receive further Orders from Felt-Marshall Scheremetoff.

Leinward, January 4. N. S. Our Regency being advised that the Princess of Nassau, the Consort of our Prince the Hereditary-Governor of Friseland, was on her Journey towards this Place from Cassel, they immediately gave Orders for the Reception of that Princess with all possible Marks of Honour and Respect; for which end they sent a Deputation consisting of four Magistrates of the Court of Justice, the Secretary, and four Members of the States of the Province, and three of the Court of the Accounts, to present her Highness with the Compliments of this Province, on her happy Arrival into this Country. The Princess received the Compliments of this Deputation on the 30th of the last Month at Oranje-Wood. On the first Instant their Highnesses came to Bergen, where they had a very splendid Entertainment at the Expence of this Province; and all things being in a readiness for their magnificent Entrance into this City the Day ensuing, they were met half way by a solemn Deputation from hence; and were conducted hither in the following manner; An Herald with eighteen Trumpets led the Way, who were followed by a Company of one hundred Officers very well Mounted, and commanded by a Brigadier; next to these the Deputies of the Province in their several Coaches, attended by above forty others of the Nobility. These were followed by their

Highnesses own Family and Equipages; after whom appeared their Highnesses in a magnificent Chariot, surrounded by Soldiers armed with Halberets, and followed by the Troops of the Life-Guard. The Sisters of the Prince, accompanied with several Ladies of the Court in rich Chariots, closed the Procession. The Day was concluded with splendid Illuminations and artificial Fire-works. The several incorporated Societies of this City have Congratulated her Highness on her happy Arrival, and the People have given the greatest Instances of their Esteem and Satisfaction, omitting no Honours that might express their Affection towards the Princesses.

Bantry, December 20. O. S. On the 10th Instant a French Privateer called the Mary Magdalen, carrying twenty four Guns and two hundred Men, was forced into Beerhaven Harbour by Distress; she had sprung a Leak at Sea four Days before, which obliged the Men to throw the Guns over Board to lighten the Vessel; as soon as she came into the Harbour she struck on a Rock near a little Island called Denees, adjacent to Castle-Dermody. The Privateer was half sunk by this Accident; but the Men having got on Shore, encamped themselves on the said Island, having made Tents of their Sails, and demanded the following Terms on their Surrender. 1st, That the Captain and Officers should be conveyed on Horseback to Kinsale with their Swords and Pistols, and have the Privilege to wear their Swords as long as they should continue in the Kingdom. 2dly, That all the Crew be safely conducted to Kinsale, and not be stripped or plundered. 3dly, That the Captain, and all the Officers, might have liberty to go to any part of the Kingdom, in order to a Passage into France, upon the surrender of their Arms, and those of the Ships Crew; and upon refusal of these Demands they pretended to March towards Cork, and ruin the Country. The French had also taken a large Fishing-boat, and sent her away with twenty or thirty Men, to look into the Neighbouring Harbours, in hopes of surprizing some Ship that might victual them, and carry them into France; but Intelligence of these Occurrences being transmitted hither, Capt. Parker, an Officer of the Militia, assembled a considerable Body of Men, and joined Lieutenant Tooker of Brigadier Rooke's Regiment, who with some regular Force embarked on several Boats in this Harbour, with a design to sail to that Island, and reduce the Enemy. In the mean time Expresses were immediately dispatched to the Surveyor, Collector, and other proper Officers of the Ports of Baltimore and Crookhaven, to prevent any Surprize from the Men in the Fishing-boat. Lieutenant Tooker set sail on the 15th Instant with the Forces under his Command, but was driven back in a few Hours by contrary Winds; yesterday Morning he set out again in the same Boats, with a design, if they could not compass their Passage to have marched towards the Enemy by Land. As soon as the French Officers saw our Men, they immediately surrendered themselves Prisoners, and this Day they are to be conducted to Kinsale by Lieutenant Tooker.

Kinsale, December 27. The whole Ship's Crew of the Mary Magdalen, a French Privateer which lately ran ashore in Bantry Bay, are brought Prisoners to this Place.
