Leipfic, January 8 N. S.

ON the 2d Instant the Queen, accompanied by the Duchefs of Wolfembu'tle and the Princefs her Daughter, arrived here; as did also the King of Pruffia, the Prince Royal, the Margrave Albert, the Prince of Anhalt-Deffau, the Count de Wartemborg Grand Chamberlain, the Count de Wigenftein Grand Marshal, and feveral other Nobles and Gentlemen the Day following. His Pruffian Majesty was Complimented without the Gates of the City by the Electoral Prince of Saxony attended by a numerous Cavalcade, who marched before his Majesty's Chariot, and conducted him to his Lodgings, which were fplendidly furnifhed for his Reception. On the 5th the King of Pruffia and King Auguftus had a private Conference for the fpace of two Hours. His Pruffian Majesty hath preferred the Electoral Prince of Saxony with a rich Sword fet in Diamonds. The Hereditary Prince of Hungary is not yet arrived, and it is believed he will go to Vienna before he vifits this Court.

Berlin, January 11. N. S. The King is expected here to Morrow from Leipfic, and great part of his Equipage is already arrived. We hear that his Majesty's late Night at Deffau; and that the Prince-Royal and Margrave Albert will ftay there fome Days, in order to accompany the Prince of Deffau at the Diversions he hath prepared for their Entertainment. We hear from Leipfic, that the Princefs of Naffau-Frieze unexpectedly arrived at that City on Wednesday laft. The Baron Kniphaufen returned on Sunday laft from Copenhagen, and is come to this Court, to follicit for a Poft of Honour belonging to the Order of Malta; and as foon as that is determined, he will fet out again for the Court of Denmark. It is reported by thofe who are in the Interests of the King of Sweden, that his Majesty is perfectly recovered of his Wounds, and continues at Benders; that he hath concluded a Treaty with the Grand Signior, who will enable him to return into Poland next Spring with a numerous Army of Turks and Tartars, and affift him in the Profecution of the War againft the Czar of Mufcovy. They alfo give out, that General Steinbock hath afsembled an Army in Sweden, confifting of forty five thoufand Men, and defigns to advance towards Schonen as foon as the Weather will permit, and March upon the Danes if they don't quit that Province; and that the Danifh Troops fuffcr very much by the Severity of the Seafon and want of Provisions. They write from Riga of the 30th of the laft Month, that the Dome of the great Church in that City had been very much damaged by the Enemies Bombs; and a Magazine of Powder had taken Fire, and blown up a Battalion; by which Accident near one thoufand Men were killed. His Czarifh Majesty was expected at the Head of his Army the beginning of the next Month. Letters from Warfaw of the 28th o. December fay, that the Ottoman Port had lately depofed the Hofpodar in Wallachia, and appointed another to fucceed him; and that a French Officer had paffed through the Capital of that Country in his Journey to the King of Sweden.

Hague, January 17. N. S. The States of Holland were reafsembled on the 15th Instant, and are daily employed in fending out fuch Funds as are yet wanting for the Service of the enfuing Year; and it is faid they intend to borrow fome Millions of Florins of the Merchants of this Republick, in order to defray the immediate Expences of the War. They continue to diftribute Money

for the Recruiting the Forces in the Service of the States, that they may be completed by the beginning of the Spring; the Troops having received Orders to be in a readinefs to take the Field by the 25th of the Month of March. Laft Week Monsieur Veldhuysen, Deputy from the Province of Utrecht, at the Affembly of the States-General, died here fuddenly. Count Tilly arrived here on Saturday laft from Liege; and on the fourteenth Count Maffui, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Savoy to her Britannick Majesty, fet out from hence in order to go for England. Count Sinzendorf, his Imperial Majesty's Plenipotentiary to the States General, defigns to fet out for Vienna on the 20th Instant. On the fifteenth the Council of State appointed feveral Commiffioners to vifit the Magazines and Fortifications of the Frontier Towns; and we hear from thence, that four Regiments of the French Troops that are called out of Spain, are already arrived at Quinoy and Landuel, being one Regiment of Infantry, two of Cavalry, and one of Dragoons, but are all in a very weak and miserable Condition; each of the Regiments of Foot confifting only of two hundred Men. The Elector of Bavaria continues at Compeigne, but is expected at Namur to Morrow. Thefe Advices alfo inform us, that the Allies, by flunting the Sluices of Mons, Tournay, and St. Guifain, had drowned all the Territory of Conde, and very much incommoded the Enemy in Valenciennes, Mortagne and St. Amand, fo that they will be obliged to withdraw their Troops from thofe Garrifons, unlefs the Allies do fpeedily open their Sluices. The Chevalier de Luxembourg, who commands in Valenciennes, being attended by feveral Engineers, hath vifited all the Neighbouring Rivers, in order to take fome Meafures to drain the Country, and remedy this Inundation; but finding it impracticable, he immediately fent an Exprefs to the Court of France, to represent to his Majesty the ill Condition of thefe Towns, and alfo to acquaint him, that the Magazines were almoft exhausted, and with what Difficulty they found Provisions for the prefent Subfiftence of the other Garrifons. The French Officers appear very much difatisfied, that they have not been paid their Arrears, particularly thofe of the Walloons. Thefe are further exasperated by an Order from the Court of France, not to furnifh thofe Troops with the Forage for which they have Occafion out of the King's Magazines, but to deduct out of their Pay the value of what they have already received fince the Armies left the Field. The Marquis de Leyda fet out from Namur on the feventh Instant, with a defign to take a Journey to Paris on this Occafion; and defire the ufual Allowances for thofe Troops with their full Pay, without placing to their Account the Forage they have received from the King's Commiffioners; but it is generally believed he will not fucceed in this Affair. We have Advice from Spain, that on the 14th of the laft Month a Body of the Allies, confifting of one hundred Horfe and eight hundred Foot, had burnt down the Bridge of Monçon, and made a Guard of thirty Men, who defended it. Prifoners of War; fo that they had entirely cut off all manner of Communication between the Enemy and Lerida, who were alfo apprehenfive, that the Allies had a defign to attack Tortofa, Balhafiro, or Monçon, in order to open a Passage into Arragon, or into the Kingdom of Valencia. Thefe Advices alfo affure us, that considerable Detachments of the Allies were fending off towards the Plains of Montlanc and Balaguer, where Count Staremberg had laid in great Stores of Provisions and Ammunition.

Plimouth, January 6. Yesterday came in her Majesty's Ship the Assurance from Portland Road. This Day failed the Unity of this Place, with three hundred Prisoners for St. Maloes. Came in also the Mounague and Deptford from Torbay, and the Industry of this Place from Virginia. This Evening arrived her Majesty's Ship the Salisbury from Cruising.

Bristol, January 7. This Day failed her Majesty's Ship the Hastings, and under her Convoy above thirty Merchant-men laden with Woollen Manufactures, Beer, Lead, Cheese, Herrings, wrought Iron, and all sorts of Grocery Wares, bound for Ireland, the Straights, the Leeward Islands, and several Places in the West Indies.

Portsmouth, January 8. On Friday last her Majesty's Ship the Falkland arrived at this Port, and yesterday her Majesty's Ship the Scarborough. This Morning Sir John Norris, on Board the Kanelaugh, sailed from St. Hellens, with the Elizabeth, Berwick, Nottingham, Grafton, Gosport and Suffolk Hag-boar, and a great Fleet of outward-bound Merchant-men bound for the Straights, New England, West-Indies, &c. under Convoy. The Cruiser, Rose-Pink and Monk's-Prize sailed also the same Day to the Westward; and there are ten Men of War still at Spithead.

Deale, January 8. On Thursday last came down her Majesty's ship the Experiment, with the Success Store-ship, and ten sail of Merchant-men bound for the East-Indies; and the Laura, Mary, and Mary and Catherine for Jamaica. On Friday the Marlborough Frigate and Diligence Galley sailed to the Westward. Yesterday Commodore Cornwell arrived in her Majesty's Ship the Rochester, with the Swiftsure, Ruby, Advice, Mary-Galley and Swallow's-Prize, and taking the rest of the Queen's Ships that lay in this Harbour under his Command, and all the outward bound Merchant-men under Convoy, sailed the same Day to the Westward.
