## KENT.

Venice, January 10. N. S. Two British Merchant-men arrived here last Week, one laden with Sugar and Lead from Bristol, and the other with Fish from Norway. The French Ambassador left this City last Monday, being accompanied as far as Padua by the Prince of St. Suono, the Duke of Anjou's Ambassador, who is since returned to this City. The Senate hath commanded the Procurator Ortononi to lay before them the Proceedings between the Court of France and his Son, who, it is reported, hath received Orders from the French King to set up the Arms of France over his Door, and publicly take upon him the Protection of that Crown, with a Promise that his Christian Majesty would maintain his Right against any other Pretenders whatsoever; but we are ad-

vised from Rome, that the Cardinal hath declined those Measures, and returned an Answer to the Court of France. That he will no ways disoblige his Native Country; and unless he can obtain the Consent of the Republick of Venice, he will not any ways concern himself in the Administration of the Affairs of that Kingdom. We are advised that the French Minister at Florence hath been obliged to return home, because he cannot obtain Remittances of Money to support the Dignity of his Character in that City. Signior Toscani, a Subject of this Republick, having accepted of the Honour of Knighthood from King Augustus, an Express hath been sent to Dresden, to order him to return to this City, and answer it to the Senate for receiving any Dignity from a foreign Prince without their Consent and Approbation. But that Gentleman's Effects being out of this Republick, it is believed he will not obey this Order, but rather suffer his Name to be razed out of the Register, than come to Venice. Advices from Rome say, that the Pope continued to be very much indisposed, infomuch that some Cabals were held about the Election of a new Pope; yet it is believed he will recover his former State of Health by the Advantage of the Air of the Quirinal, where he will speedily remove his Court, by the Advice of his Physicians. Letters from Naples say, that Cardinal Grimani was providing great Sums of Money, and considerable Stores of Ammunition and Provision, which are to be transported to Catalonia; and a Squadron of five Men of War is fitting out at that Port, which is to serve as Convoy to their Merchantmen, under the Command of Chevalier Pallavicini, who is suddenly expected there from Barcelona.

Milan, January 11. N. S. We are in hopes that the Differences between the Emperor and the Duke of Savoy will be speedily determined. It is reported, that the Imperial Ministers have proposed an Expedient of exchanging some Lands in Italy with his Royal Highness, as the most effectual Method for accommodating these Affairs. General Palmes is arrived here from Turin, in order to proceed on his Journey to the Court of Vienna, with the Character of Envoy-Extraordinary from the Queen of Great Britain. We are advised from Genoa, that a Flushing Privateer had lately brought into that Port a French Vessel laden with Corn, and bound for Marseilles; and that the English Squadron which is Cruising on the Coast of France, had taken fifteen Corn Ships bound for that Kingdom, and sent them to Barcelona; and the Enemy are apprehensive, that a great Fleet laden with that Commodity, which is expected from the Levant, will also be intercepted by the Confederates. These Advices add, that they had received an Account from Barcelona of several Advantages which General Staremberg had gained over the Enemy; that he did frequently beat up their Quarters, and had dislodged them from divers considerable Posts on the Frontiers of Arragon. Letters from Naples say, that besides the Loss which the Enemy sustained at the Siege of Orbirello, four hundred of their Men had Deserted since that Expedition, and lifted themselves in the Service of his Catholick Majesty. Letters from Rome say, that the Pope had granted Leave for opening the Theatre of Caprinica; but to avoid the Disputes which would have happened between the Ministers of his Catholick Majesty, and those of the Duke of Anjou, concerning the Boxes belonging to the Spanish Ministers, his Holiness had suspended that License.

for the Service of the next Campaign. Several Projects have been had under Deliberation for advancing such Sums as are yet wanting to defray the extraordinary Charge of the War; and it is reported, that they propose to raise some Millions of Florins on Annuities to be established for Life. A Deputation which was sent hither from the Province of Utrecht, to make some Representations to the States-General, concerning certain Publick Affairs relating to that Province, had this Week a Conference with the Deputies of the States appointed for that end, wherein they concluded their Business to the common Satisfaction, and are returned to Utrecht. My Lord Townshend, her Britannick Majesty's Plenipotentiary, hath lately held frequent Conferences with Count Zinzendorf, the Imperial Plenipotentiary, the Deputies of their High-Mightinesses the States-General, and the Pensionary Heimius. The Council of State hath disposed of several Vacancies in the Artillery; and Monsieur Sas van den Bosch hath been nominated to succeed the late Director du Mée. The Officers have received Orders to get their respective Regiments compleat by the 15th of the ensuing March, on Penalty of being cashiered from the Service. Great Magazines are preparing in all the Frontier Towns for the Subsistence of the Troops at that Season, and all other necessary Dispositions are making for an early Campaign. Prince Eugene is expected here from Vienna the latter end of the next Month; as is also the Duke of Marlborough about the same time from Great Britain. The Swedish Minister residing here reports, that he hath received Letters from his Master dated at Bender the 9th of the last November, whereby he is informed that his Swedish Majesty is entirely recovered of his Wounds, and enjoys a perfect Health in that Place. The Prince of Hesse-Rottenburgh, and the Prince of Hesse-Rheinfelds are arrived here; as is likewise the Count de Wells, his Imperial Majesty's Plenipotentiary at Liege, and Monsieur Heymen, a Privy-Councillor to the King of Prussia. The Duke of Bavaria is not yet arrived at Namur; and we hear that his Departure from Compiègne is yet deferred for some Days. We are advised from the Frontiers, that the Enemy had quitted Mortagne and St. Amand, by reason of the Inundation of those Places and the Neighbouring Country, by shutting the Sluices of Tournay, and it was believed they would also be obliged to abandon Concé, in the Streets of which City the Water was already two Foot deep, which rendered their Mills altogether useless, and extremely incommoded the Inhabitants. Engineer General des Roques set out from hence last Week, in order to see what further Advantages could be obtained over the Enemy by this Inundation. Letters from Brussels say, that last Week a Magazine of Hay was set on Fire without the Gate of Lakas; but it was soon extinguished, and a very inconsiderable Loss was sustained by that Accident. Letters from Madrid say, that Monsieur d'Ilberville was arrived at that Court, with the Character of Envoy-Extraordinary from the French King, and had Audience of the Duke of Anjou on the 28th of the last Month. On the 30th Monsieur Elcourt had also a long Audience of that Prince; after which a Courier was sent Express to the Court of France. These Advices add, That the Court of Madrid laboured under great Difficulties in raising Money; and it was believed that a considerable Sum would be demanded of the Clergy of Spain, towards carrying on the War. The Marquis de Bay was returned to Estramadura; he arrived at Alcantara on the 22d of the last Month, and designed to proceed to Bajacox the Day following. These Letters add, that they had received Account from Cadiz, of the taking of a rich Prize from Vera-Cruz by two English Men of War. The Vessel was safely arrived at Cadiz, but to avoid having the Bullion and other Merchandizes wherewith it was laden Registered in the usual manner, she immediately sailed again, and was taken by the English and conducted to Lisbon. Great Quantities of Fire Arms have been transmitted from France into Spain, for the Service of the Duke of Anjou; and they give out, that their Commissaries have bought up a sufficient Number of Horses in Andalusia for remounting their Cavalry. Letters from Arragon advise, that a Detachment of the *Comtedera* is being in motion towards

Balaguer, the Prince Tserclas de Tilly had reinforced the Garrisons of Fraga, Lerida and Mongon, and ordered the rest of his Forces to be in readiness to march on the first Notice.
