**T**HE humble Address of the Shire of *Mid-Lothian*, was presented to Her Majesty by *George Lockhart, Esq;* their Representative in Parliament, being introduced by his Grace the Duke of *Hamilton*.

*Which Address Her Majesty received very graciously.*

*Vimna, January 14. N. S.* This Court hath taken a Resolution to augment the number of their Troops, and make the most vigorous Efforts against France the ensuing Campaign, in concert with the Measures of her Britannick Majesty and the States-General. Early Reinforcements are to be sent to join the Imperial Army on the Upper Rhine; and it is said that Prince Eugene will visit the several Courts of the Princes of the Empire, in order to excite them to the same Vigour in their Proceedings, and to engage them to take such speedy and effectual Measures as may frustrate the Enemy's Designs of penetrating into the Empire; and also to prosecute the War upon the Rhine with a greater Force. His Imperial Majesty hath writ a Letter to his Electoral Highness of *Hanover*, desiring him to continue in the Command of the Army of the Empire, with assurances of his utmost assistance, and endeavours to procure such timely Succours from the respective Princes of the Empire, as shall enable him to act offensively against the Common Enemy. In the mean time the Recruits and new Levies are carried on throughout his Imperial Majesty's Hereditary Dominions with very good Success; and it is hoped, that all the Regiments will be completed by the middle of March. The Affairs of Hungary afford us a hopeful Prospect of the speedy Conclusion of that War; all that part of the Kingdom which is situated on this side the Danube is reduced to his Imperial Majesty; and the Garrison of *Neuhauzel* is so strictly blocked up, and suffers so very much for want of necessary Provisions, that it is believed it will be obliged to surrender before the next Campaign. General *Heister* hath been so successful in this War, that it is not doubted but he will be continued in the Command of the Army in Hungary. However there are frequent Complaints of that General's Severities to the Protestants of that Kingdom. Yesterday the Baggage, and part of the Equipage of the Prince of *Lorraine* set out for *Presburg*; to which Place he designs to follow the same speedily in Person, accompanied by *Adam Prince of Lichtenstein* and *Count Thauun*, who are to assist at the approaching Diet, as his Imperial Majesty's Commissioners. *Monfieur Albani*, the Pope's Nephew, is set out for *Dresden*, somewhat dissatisfied that this Court would not yield up *Commachio* to the Holy See, and has expressed some Resentment of the particular Regard which his Imperial Majesty bears to the Interests of the Duke of *Modena*. The Pope hath nominated *Monfignor Piazza* to be his Nuncio to this Court; and his Imperial Majesty, and all the Foreign Ministers, have received him accordingly. There are certain Advices that the King of *Sweden* was lately at *Bender*; but the determinations of the Ottoman Port concerning that Prince are very uncertain. The Muscovite Ambassador at Constantinople hath written to his Czarish Majesty's Minister here, that he had concluded a Truce between the Czar and the Grand Signior for twenty five Years longer; that he had promised, in his Master's Name, that the new Fortresses which are erected at the Mouth of the *Tanaïs* should be demolished,

because they gave Umbrage to the Turks; and that all other Differences were composed between the Turkish and Russian Empires. The Swedes give very different Relations of those Proceedings, and report, that the Grand Signior had offered his Swedish Majesty to secure his Retreat into Sweden, or mediate his Peace with the Czar. They also add, that the Grand Signior had deposed and imprisoned the Prince of *Moldavia*, for giving Intelligence to the Muscovites of the March of a Party of Swedes, by which Means they were surprized and cut to pieces; and that the Turkish and Russian Troops are advancing towards the Frontiers.

*Brussels, January 27. N. S.* On the 25 h Instant Lieutenant-General *Cadogan* set out for the Hague, from whence he is expected to return the latter end of this Month. On the 17th Count *Bergeick* arrived at *Compiegne*, and having had a long Conference with the Duke of *Bavaria* he set out the next Day for *Cambray*, proceeded from that Place to *Maubeuge*, and from thence to *Namur*, where he arrived on the twenty second Instant. We hear that the French Court hath enabled him to pay some Part of the Arrears due to the Spanish and Walloon Troops in *Flanders*, but hath established such considerable Funds for their further Subsistence, that it is resolved to break twelve Battalions and as many Squadrons, and incorporate the Soldiers into other Regiments, and send the Officers into Spain. We are advised from the Frontiers, that the Enemy have marked out a new Line near *Maubeuge*, which is to begin between the Wood of *Tillieu* and *Omont*, and be extended as far as *Avesnes*. On the 20th of this Month *Gaetano's* Regiment of Horse left *Maubeuge*, in order to march into Spain; but they are in such want of Money for their Journey, that it is believed the Soldiers will be reduced to extreme Necessities, and the Officers have taken up Money on their Bills of Forage at a Discount of thirty Pound in the Hundred.

*Hague, January 28. N. S.* The States of Holland were separated last Saturday, and are to be reassembled within fifteen Days. They have taken a Resolution to borrow two Millions of Florins to supply the present Necessities. On the 26th Instant Lieutenant-General *Cadogan* came to this Place, and will return to *Brussels* within three Days; he hath been present at several Conferences with the Council of State since his Arrival. To Morrow my Lord *Albemarle* designs to set out for *Tournay*. Letters from the Frontiers say, that the Duke of *Bavaria* continued at *Compiegne*, and that it was uncertain when he would set out for *Namur*. Count *Bergeick* is arrived at *Namur*, and hath brought Orders for several Regiments of Walloons to march towards Spain the beginning of next Month. The Inundation occasioned by shutting the Sluices of *Tournay* hath not as yet obliged the Enemy to quit *Conde*, as they have already done *St. Amand* and *Mortagne*. Letters from *Paris* confirm the Difficulties that Court labours under in raising Money; several Projects have been found impracticable, and most of the Parliaments of France have given in their Remonstrances, expressing their Inability to provide the Sums that are demanded of them. Advices from *Constantinople*, of the 1st of this Month, say, that the Ottoman Port had countermanded all the Orders that were given for laying in Warlike Stores, and making any other Military Preparations.

*Whitehaven, January 16.* About twenty Sail of laden Colliers be ready to Sail with the first opportunity to *Dublin*.

*Palmouth, January 16.* Yesterday put in here the Endraught of and from Middleburgh for Maderis. This Day put in the Catherine of and from Hamburg for Bourdeaux, who having been out but ten Days at Sea, was boarded by twelve French Privateers, and escaped them all.

*Plimouth, January 17.* Yesterday came in a Swede of Stockholm from St. Martins with Salt, and another for Cadiz, and the St. Andrew of Stade for Bourdeaux. This Day arrived the Rook Galley for the Canaries, she was taken and Ransomed for six hundred Pound.

*Dartmouth, January 17.* This Day came in here the Sarah and the Mountboon, both of this Place from Guernsey; they bring advice, that Captain Demerret in the Revenge, with Capt. Grushey, and two other Guernsey Privateers, fell in with two French Ships, one of sixteen, the other of eighteen Guns, from Newfoundland, but lost from Bourdeaux, where they unladed their Fish, and related Salt, bound for St. Malo; and after some Hours Engagement were both taken: Captain Grushey hath brought one into Guernsey, but Captain Demerret was not arrived when these Vessels failed from thence.

*Yarmouth, January 18.* This Day passed through our Road a Fleet of Coalters to the Northward, under Convey of several of her Majesty's Ships.

*Hull, January 18.* The Adventure and Arundel came into Humber on Monday in the Morning, and have under their Convoy two Russia Ships which had been separated from the rest of the Fleet, and got into Scarborough Wyke. The Rochester's-Prize and our Trade for London are still here.

*Portsmouth, January 19.* Yesterday her Majesty's Ship the Leopard arrived at Spithead, with about six Sail under Convoy from the East Country. This Day the Rochester failed out of the Harbour; as did also yesterday the Swallow's-Prize. Sir Charles Wager continues at Spithead on Board the Windsor, with his Squadron, and outward-bound East-India Merchant Men.

*Whitehall, January 19.* This Day the Body of the Right Honourable Algernoon Capell, late Earl of Essex, Constable of the Tower of London, was conveyed from hence to the Seat of that Noble Family at Cassioberry in the County of Hartford, in order to be interred with his Ancestors. He was born on the 28th of December 1676, and died on the 10th Instant: He is succeeded in his Honour and Estate by his Son the Right Honourable William Capell, an Infant of twelve Years of Age.
