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St. James's, January 26.

THIS Evening the Marquis Paleotti, Envoy-Extraordinary from the Duke of Guastalla (being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, and Conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies) had his private Audience of Leave of Her Majesty.

Vienna, January 22. N. S. This Court hath sent Orders to all the Officers of the Imperial Cavalry, but more especially those that are quartered in Bavaria, immediately to move towards the Emperor's Hereditary Dominions, where we hear six thousand Horses are provided for remounting their Troops, in order to march from thence towards the Upper Rhine, and oppose the Enemy's Designs on that Frontier. Advices from Great Waradin say, that several of the most considerable of the Malecontents have submitted themselves to his Imperial Majesty, and obtained their Pardon; but were ordered to perform a Quarantine in the Neighbourhood of that Place, the Imperialists being apprehensive of the Plague which rages in several Parts of Hungary that are in Subjection to the Malecontents. Letters from Raab say, that Colonel Ozkai in the Service of his Imperial Majesty, being taken by the Enemy, was by them carried to Neuheusel and beheaded; and that by the Order of Marshal Heister, the Government of Raab had, in the same manner, executed a Brigadier and a Colonel of the Malecontents. We have received Advices from the Camp before Neuheusel, that a Party of the Enemy, consisting of three hundred Men, belonging to that Garrison, were surprized and cut off by the Imperialists. Advices concerning the Circumstances of the King of Sweden are still very uncertain; they all agree that his Majesty continues at Bender, but some say, that he will stay there this Winter; and others, that he waits only 'till the Ways are passable, to begin his Journey for Sweden.

Copenhagen, January 28. N. S. The Carousal was performed last Night with great Magnificence. Yesterday a Fire happened at Malmo, on the other side of the Sound, which burnt down several Houses. On the 25th Instant an Express arrived here from Schonen, with Advice, that the Danish Detachment which was ordered to March towards Christianstadr, advanced before that Place on the 21st Instant, and possessed themselves of it without any other Opposition from the Enemy, but the Fire of a Battalion, consisting of six hundred Saxons who had formerly been Prisoners in Sweden, and being listed in the Swedish Service, were posted to defend that Place. The Saxons immediately surrendered themselves Prisoners, and a Regiment or two of Swedish Horse, that were in the Town, retired upon the Approach of the Danes, who pursued them as far as Lundbye, which is six Miles distant from Christianstadr. By the taking of this Place, the Danes are become Masters of all the open Country in the Province of Schonen, and will entirely cut off the Communication the Swedes have hitherto had with East, from whence they sent their Letters to Stralsund; so that our Advices from Stockholm must, for the future, be expected to be very irregular. Advices from Sweden say, that the new Levies were carried on with very good Success throughout their Dominions, and that above thirteen thousand Men were already listed. All the Commission-Officers of those Troops, except Ensigns, are such as have formerly served in the Army, and many

other Commanders of Experience are waiting at Stockholm for Preferment. For the greater Encouragement of those Officers that are already received into Employments every Lieutenant hath been made a Captain, every Captain a Major, and all others have been in the like manner advanced one Degree above the Rank they formerly enjoyed.

Brussels, February 3. N. S. Lieutenant-General Cadogan returned here on the 31st of the last Month from the Hague. The Recruits for the Dutch, Saxon and Palatine Troops that are quartered along the Meuse, arrive daily at their respective Garrisons; and such great Quantities of Stores are daily brought into the Frontier Towns, that their Magazines will be very plentifully supplied. Letters from the Frontiers of the 31st last past say, that on the 30th a Detachment of five Companies of Granadiers marched from Valenciennes to Vicogne and St. Amand, and were to be followed by four others the Day following. The Enemy being apprehensive that the Allies may have formed a Design upon Condé during the Frost, the Garrison of Valenciennes is ordered to be ready to be drawn out on the first Notice. Several Parties of Hussars, belonging to the Garrison of Mons, make such frequent IncurSIONS into the Neighbourhood of Valenciennes, that the Gates leading to Mons and Tournay are kept shut the greatest part of the Day. It is confirmed, that three Italian, six Spanish Battalions, and nine of the Walloon Veterans, which are in the Service of the Duke of Anjou, daily expect Orders to begin their March towards Spain. Letters from Paris advise, that the Negotiation between the Empire and France, for the Exchange of Prisoners, was regulated at Monzingen near Brisac on the 13th of the last Month; by Vertue of which Treaty the Officers and Soldiers were released on both sides, and returning to their respective Regiments.

Hague, February 4. N. S. The Prince of Hesse-Rotenburg and the Prince of Hesse-Rhinfels are gone to Dusseldorp. The Council of State hath for several Days been employed in treating with certain Undertakers for the supply of the Magazines on the Frontiers, and Accommodation of the Troops with other Necessaries for their Subsistence, how early soever it shall be thought requisite for them to take the Field. It is said, that Affairs will be Regulated, and an Agreement concluded, the next Week. The Courier that was sent into Sweden with the Proposal of the States-General, concerning a Neutrality which the Danes and Swedes should observe, in regard to the Territories belonging to those Crowns in Germany, is returned hither, and brings Dispatches from Stockholm, whereby it appears that the Regency of Sweden is inclined to comply with the Terms proposed by this Republick, and also to favour the Interests of the Allies, so that it is hoped there will be no Diversion in the Empire to the prejudice of the common Cause: And such Measures are taken to give the King of Prussia Satisfaction in his Demands, that it is expected his Majesty will afford his utmost Assistance towards the vigorous Prosecution of the War. Letters from the Frontiers advise, that Count Bergeick having reformed several Regiments of Walloons, that are to be incorporated with twelve Spanish Regiments appointed for the Service in Spain, is set out for Ghent, where he is to continue as an Hostage until France hath performed the Articles of the Capitulation of Mons. The Marquis of Bonac, formerly Envoy from the French Court to Poland, passed through Liege the 29th of the last Month on his Journey to Paris. There are Advices from Constantinople which say, that the King of Sweden is detained at Bender by the Ottoman

Ottoman Port, until he hath paid a considerable Sum of Money to satisfy the Demands of the Turks for the Security of his Retreat, and the Charges of his Residence in the Grand Signior's Dominions. Yesterday we received Advice from Amsterdā that a Fleet of Ships laden with Corn was arrived there from the Baltick, and that on the first Instant there was a new Election of the Magistracy of that City.

Falmouth, January 22. Yesterday arrived the Coullfall Galley of and for Middleburg from Zant, but left from Gibraltar, having taken in the Streights three Prizes laden with Corn.

Portsmouth, January 26. Sir Charles Wager struck his Flag on Tuesday last, and is set out for London. The East-India Ships that are in this Port are ready to sail with the first fair Wind.

Deal, January 26. This Morning came in hither Commodore Corwall in her Majesty's Ship the Swiftsure, with the Rochester, Ruby, Le Firme, Swallow's-Prize and Mary Galley; but the Le Firme failed through toward the River; and several other Ships are now coming in.
