**T**HIS Republick hath sent fresh Orders to Cardinal Orsini not to accept of the Protection of the Crown of France. Last Night the Senate was assembled to chuse an Ambassador in Ordinary to be sent from this State to the Court of Great Britain, and Signior Pietro Grimani was elected by a great Majority of the Ballots, and he hath already accepted of that Honour, and is making Preparations for his Journey. The Council of this State hath also resolved to enter into a stricter League of Friendship with the British Crown, and to grant wherever Passports shall be demanded by English Ships for Transporting from the Austrian Countries as much Corn as is thought requisite for the Subsistence of the Confederate Troops; and this Morning a Secretary of State signified these Resolutions to her Britannick Majesty's Minister at the College. The Diversions of the Carneval began last Saturday with the usual Ceremonies. Letters from Rome say, that the Pope was still confined to his Chamber; and his Physicians perceiving that his Distemper increased daily upon him, were apprehensive of his sudden Decease. However, he hath held several private Conferences on the present situation of Affairs during his Indisposition. An Expedient being found out to prevent the Differences which might arise concerning the Pretensions of the Ministers of his Catholick Majesty, and those of the Duke of Anjou, to the Right of a Box in the Theatre of Capranica, leave hath been given for presenting a new Opera in that Place. These Letters add, that Cardinal Gualteri, the Pope's Nuncio to the Court of France, and formerly Legate in the Romagna, was arrived at Rome, and had put up the Arms of France over his Door, and publicly declared himself to be a Pensionary of that Crown. The Imperial Garrison of Orbitello hath been reinforced with two hundred and fifty Men. Advices from Naples say, that Signior Pallavicini was arrived there with a Commission from the King of Spain, as Admiral of the Neapolitan Fleet.

**Berlin, February 1. N. S.** His Majesty hath appointed the Prince of Anhalt-Desfau to command the Prussian Troops in Flanders, and hath resolved to augment his Forces with five or six thousand Men the ensuing Campaign. Count Schlippenbach's Regiment of Dragoons, and a Regiment of Light-Horse, which suffered very much last Year, are commanded from the Low-Countries, in order to recruit their Forces in the King's Dominions this next Summer; and they are to be relieved by Margrave Albert's Regiment of Dragoons, which is far more numerous than both the former. This Court hath taken Measures to prevent the return of the Swedes and General Crassau into Poland, and will shortly form a Camp on the Frontiers of Pomerania for that end. This Morning a Gentleman of the Duke of Wirtemberg's Bed-chamber, who is sent hither to pay that Prince's Compliments to the King, and to thank him for the Honour that is done him, by being admitted into the Prussian Order, had a private Audience of his Majesty, and hath received the Cross and Chain belonging thereunto, wherewith he is speedily to return to his Master. Letters from Saxony advise, that Monsieur Albani, the Pope's Nephew, made his publick Entry into Dresden on the 19th of the last Month, and had a publick Audience of King Augustus, to Congratulate his Majesty's Re-establishment on the Throne of Poland. The Cardinal is since set out for

Vienna, well satisfied with the particular Honours he hath received, and the Success of his Negotiations at that Court, it being reported that he hath obtained a Liberty for the free Exercise of the Roman Catholick Religion in Saxony. These Letters add, that King Augustus left that City on the 20th, and that the Earl of Sairs arrived there after his Majesty's Departure; but was preparing to follow him to Poland, and had dispatched his Secretary before to Cracow. We have received a particular Account of the Czar's Triumphant Entry into Moscow, which was performed with the greatest Magnificence and Solemnity; all the Swedish Prisoners were presented to Publick View, Count Paper and the Commanding Officers marching at their Head, together with the Trophies of the three famous Victories of Poltava, Perewoloczna and Lefna. Nothing could surpass the Sumptuousness and Architecture of the triumphal Arches which were built on this Occasion; Multitudes of Spectators filled the principal Streets, and all the Publick Places through which his Czarish Majesty was to pass; nothing was omitted which might add to the Pomp and Splendor of this Triumph. These Advices add, that the Czar had received Dispatches from the Ottoman Port, with Assurance of an inviolable Observation of the Truce between the two Empires, and a Proposal for its longer Continuance.

**Hague, February 7. N. S.** Yesterday a Bargain was concluded with certain Undertakers, for supplying the Army with Bread, and providing Waggon for the Service of the ensuing Campaign, the number of which they have considerably augmented. To Morrow they will settle an Agreement for filling the extraordinary Magazines which they propose to lay up on the Frontiers, for the Subsistence of the Troops before the Month of May. The Council of State is daily employed in the Examination of the Answer of the Regency of Sweden lately transmitted hither, and also in concerting Measures for the Preservation of the Peace of the Empire. Advices from Flanders say, that the Enemies Garrison in their Frontier Towns have not yet received either Arrears of Money for their Subsistence, or their new Cloathing, but are reduced to great Extremities, as well by the Coldness of the Season, as want of Provisions. Letters from France inform us, that the quantity of Corn which arrived at Marseilles, is not so considerable as was expected; and that the Price of that Commodity was very little abated, notwithstanding this Supply. In the mean time we have frequent Accounts from several parts of the Kingdom of the Misery of the People; and are advised from Grenoble, that a great Mortality reigns in that City and the neighbouring Country. Advices from Spain say, that the Court of Madrid meets with unexpected Difficulties in raising Men for the Service of the Duke of Anjou; and that the Magazines could not be supplied for want of Money. They write from Brussels, that the States of Hainault had consented to the granting a Subsidy of three hundred and fifty thousand Florins; and that the City and Dependency of Aeth were reunited to that Province.

**Plimsouth, January 27.** On the 25th Instant arrived her Majesty's Ship the Kent with a Dunkirk Privateer of twenty four Guns; the Queen Mary Galley from Zant, and Selby Galley from Lophree, both bound for London. Came in also her Majesty's Ship the Yarmouth, St. Albans and Hind, who have been out of the Soundings with Sir John Norris; they have retaken and brought in the Dispatch, laden with Freight from Tharoo, bound for London. Yesterday

Yesterday came in her Majesty's Ship the August from Scilly, with a French Privateer of eight Guns, and the Mary and Anne of Dieppe with Sugar from the West-Indies, two Ships which they retook from the French, and four or five homeward bound Merchantmen. Some time since came in a Hamburger with Pipe Staves for this Place, and a Dane for Dram from Bristol.

*Portsmouth, January 29.* It is believed the East-India Ships will sail this Morning, the Wind being fair at East. Yesterday her Majesty's Ship the Strombulo sailed out of the Harbour to Spithead, where there are eleven Men of War.
