## NOTICE OF PUBLIC PATH ORDER

TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT 1971—SECTION 210

*The Borough of Bournemouth (Footpath N8—Slades Farm) Public Path Diversion Order 1975*

Notice is hereby given that the above-named Order (hereinafter referred to as "the Order"), made on 7th May 1975, is about to be submitted to the Secretary of State for the Environment for confirmation or to be confirmed by the Bournemouth Borough Council as an unopposed Order.

The effect of the Order, if confirmed without modification, will be to divert the northern section of the public right of way N8—Slades Farm (the total length of which extends from a point adjacent to the eastern boundary of No. 164 Columbia Road in a generally southerly and south-easterly direction to a point on Boundary Lane near its junction with Norton Road) to a line as shown on the plan attached to the Order.

A copy of the Order and the map contained in it has been deposited and may be inspected free of charge at:

- (i) The Ensbury Park Sub-Branch Library, Columbia Road, Bournemouth, Monday and Friday, 9.30 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. Wednesday, and Saturday 9.30 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.
- (ii) The Town Clerk's Office, Town Hall, Bournemouth, Monday to Friday 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Any representations or objections with respect to the Order may be sent in writing to the undersigned not later than 9th June 1975 and should state the grounds on which it is made.

If no representations or objections are duly made, or if any so made are withdrawn, the Bournemouth Borough Council may, instead of submitting the Order to the Secretary of State for the Environment for confirmation, themselves confirm the Order as an unopposed Order. If the Order is submitted to the Secretary of State for confirmation any representations and objections which have been duly made and not withdrawn will be sent to the Secretary of State with the Order.

## BRECKNOCK BOROUGH COUNCIL

## NOTICE OF PUBLIC PATH ORDER

TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT, 1971—SECTION 210

*Borough of Brecknock (Bridleway No. 28—Community of Llanganten and Bridleway No. 14—Community of Llanynis) Public Path (Diversion) (No. 1) Order 1975.*

Notice is hereby given that the above-named Order (hereinafter referred to as "the Order") made on the 29th April 1975, is about to be submitted to the Secretary of State for confirmation, or to be confirmed, as an unopposed Order, by the Brecknock Borough Council.

The effect of the Order, if confirmed without modifications, will be to divert the public right of way in the Communities of Llanganten and Llanynis in the County of Powys running from a point approximately 50 feet south of Hendre Bridge on the west bank of the River Irfon, fording the River Irfon in a southerly direction to a point approximately 200 feet south of Hendre Bridge on the east bank of the river, being approximately 160 feet in length, to a line running from the said point on the west bank of the River Irfon, fording the river in an easterly direction to a point approximately 50 feet south of Hendre Bridge on the east bank and then in a southerly direction along the river bank to a point some 200 feet or thereabouts south of Hendre Bridge, being approximately 240 feet in length.

A copy of the Order and the map contained in it has been deposited at and may be inspected free of charge at the Divisional Council Offices, Cloverly, Garth Road, Bultth Wells, Powys, between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Mondays to Fridays.

Any objection or representation concerning the Order may be sent in writing to the Borough Secretary, Brecknock Borough Council, Oxford House, The Watton, Brecon, Powys, not later than the 12th June 1975, and should state the grounds on which it is made.

If no representations or objections are duly made, or if any so made are withdrawn, the Brecknock Borough Council may, instead of submitting the Order to the Secretary of State for confirmation, themselves confirm the Order as an unopposed Order. If the Order is submitted to the Secretary of State for confirmation any representations and objections which have been duly made and not withdrawn will be transmitted with the Order.

## CHERWELL DISTRICT COUNCIL

TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT 1971

TOWN AND COUNTRY AMENITIES ACT 1974

Notice is hereby given that the Cherwell District Council have pursuant to section 277 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971 as re-enacted by section 1 of the Town and Country Amenities Act 1974 designated the area described in the Schedule below as the Bloxham Conservation Area. A plan of the said area may be inspected at the Cherwell District Council Offices, Bodicote House, Bodicote, Banbury, Oxon.

The effect of the said designation is that:

- (a) All planning applications for development that would affect the character of the area must be advertised and site notices posted so that the maximum opportunity for comment is given to the public before a decision is reached.
- (b) The Cherwell District Council as district planning authority will exercise particular care to ensure that change, when it occurs, does not detract from the character of the area.
- (c) No building in a conservation area may be demolished without obtaining listed building consent from the district planning authority. Exceptions to this rule are those laid down in paragraph 15 of the Department of the Environment Circular 147/74, details of which are available in the offices of the Cherwell District Council. These exceptions mainly affect small buildings within the curtilage of a dwellinghouse, gates, fences, walls or other enclosures, temporary buildings, certain agricultural and industrial buildings and buildings required to be demolished under the provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971, the Housing Act 1957 or the Pastoral Measure 1968.
- (d) The Town and Country Amenities Act 1974, provides that it shall be an offence to cut down, top, lop, uproot, wilfully damage or wilfully destroy any tree in a conservation area (and not already subject of a tree preservation order), without giving six weeks notice to the District Council. Specific permission must in most cases, be obtained in respect of those trees which are the subject of a Tree Preservation Order.
- (e) The Cherwell District Council will generally only consider detailed planning applications in this conservation area. Sufficient detail must be shown to enable the district planning authority to assess the scale, massing, design and materials of buildings and their relationship to existing buildings. Outline planning applications are not considered acceptable in this area.
