Berlin, April 5. N. S.

PPrince Eugene did not arrive here 'till last Tuesday about seven a Clock in the Ev'ning; and being fatigued with his Journey, did not appear at Court that Night. He was entertained in the same Apartment of the House appointed for the reception of Ambassadors, in which the Duke of Marlborough was received when here: The Prince of Anhalt was also lodged there, to accompany his Highness. Monsieur Lubieres, who was lately made a Brigadier, had been sent with the Prince's Aid-de-Camp, Monsieur Hohendorf, last Sunday, to compliment the Prince on his Way, in the King's Name, and to wait upon him hither. On Wednesday Morning the Grand Chamberlain, and most of the chief Ministers of the Court, attended the Prince, who was conducted to the King at ten a Clock; and though he declared he desired to be looked upon as Incognito, and to be treated without Ceremony, yet at his coming at the Castle, he was received at the Head of the great Stairs by the Field-Marshal, and conducted by him to the King's Bed-chamber Door, where he was received by the Grand Chamberlain, and introduced to the King, with whom he was alone for almost an Hour. He went from thence to wait upon the Queen, and afterwards dined with their Majesties, and the rest of the Royal Family, at an Oval Table; the Prince Royal placing himself at the lower end, to avoid any Ceremony of Place. After Dinner Prince Eugene went to wait upon the Prince and Princess Royal; the Margravin of Prince Albert, and the two Margraves, went to the Palace of Ambassadors, to return him his Visit; where he remained all the rest of the Afternoon, in Conference with the Ministers, at which time several things lately in Dispute between the Imperial Court and this were settled to Satisfaction. The next Morning when the Prince came to Court, the King led him into his Bed-chamber, and made him a Present of a Hat, with a Diamond valued at sixteen thousand Crowns. After this, his Majesty, the Prince Royal, Prince Eugene, the Prince of Anhalt, the Grand Chamberlain and the Field Marshal dined with his Excellency the British Ambassador. As soon as they rose from Table the Prince Royal attended Prince Eugene to the Arsenal, the Amphitheatre, and the Stables, where the Grand Chamberlain met them, as being Master of the Horse, and presented his Highness, by his Majesty's Orders, with a fine Set of black Horses. The next Morning the Prince had the Satisfaction to be informed that the King consented to continue his Troops for another Year in Italy. The Prince of Anhalt having taken leave of the King yesterday, set out this Morning for Dessau, with a Resolution to make all the haste he can to put himself at the head of the Prussians, whom he is to Command this Summer in Flanders. They write from Warsaw, of the 25th of March last, that several Deputies had proposed to treat of a Peace with Sweden, and to comprehend in a general Act of Oblivion those of the Swedish Party, who were willing to submit to King Augustus, but many had violently op-

posed such an Expedient; insisting, on the contrary, that their Estates should be Confiscated, and given to those who had remained faithful. They write from Mittau, of the 24th of the same Month, that the Czar was at Petersburg, and that he was making great Preparations for an Expedition by Sea.

Frankfort, April 9. N. S. To Morrow the Deputies of the Circle of the Upper Rhine design to adjourn themselves until the Conclusion of the Festival. The continual Rains that have fallen for several Days, having rendered the Roads impassable, and secured the Frontiers from any Attempt of the Enemy. General Gronsfeld hath commanded some Forces, that were posted in the Lines of Etlingen, to return to their Quarters for Refreshment, until the Weather permits the Armies to take the Field. They write from Strasburg, that five hundred Waggon laden with Corn and Oats were brought thither from Lorraine, and that they speedily expected another Convoy. The Equipages of Marshal d'Harcourt were also arrived at that City, and it was given out that they would be speedily followed by that General himself. In the mean time the rainy Weather had filled the Ways with such deep Waters, that the Execution of any Enterprize of Importance must necessarily be deferred for some time. The French Forces are not so compleat and numerous as was formerly reported; and most of the Recruits that arrive in Alsatia appeared either too old or too young to carry Arms, or pass through the Fatigues of a Campaign.

Brussels, April 16. N. S. Yesterday Morning the Duke of Marlborough and Prince Eugene arrived at Antwerp, where after having received the Compliment of the States of Brabant, they proceeded towards Tournay. Last Monday Lieutenant-General Cadogan and Count Tilly set out from hence towards the Army; and all the other Officers are gone to their respective Commands. All the Troops are advancing towards the General Rendezvous. The English, Hanoverians and Prussians, who were Garrisoned in Malines, Louvain, and the neighbouring Towns, are encamped in two Lines at Anderlecht. On the 13th Instant they were joined by the Dutch Forces from this City; and on the 14th a Scotch Regiment of Guards, and Lieutenant-General Cadogan's Regiment of Dragoons marched to the same Camp. As long as these Troops continue in our Neighbourhood, the Cavalry will be supplied with Forage from our Magazines; and the Mayors of the adjacent Towns and Villages are ordered to furnish them with Straw and other Necessaries. On the 20th Instant it is said they will advance in a Body towards the Frontiers, and join the rest of the Army. The Troops that were quartered along the Meuse arrived Yesterday at Wavre, where they are to halt this Day, and to Morrow continue their Rout towards Soignies. The Imperialists also, that were Garrisoned at Nivelles, Halle, Enghein and Ninoven left their Quarters on the 14th and 15th Instant. The Prince d'Auvergne set out from hence this Day for the Army.
