THE last Letters from Leghorn bring Advice, that the Nassau and Charham, two British Men of War, were arrived there with a French Prize. These Ships were to take in some fresh Provisions at that Port, after which they were to sail directly for Port Mahon, where it is supposed Sir John Norris is arrived with the Fleet under his Command, having been seen off of Barcelona on the 23^d of the last Month. On Saturday last eight Sail of Ships belonging to this State set sail for the Coasts of Spain and Portugal, having several Passengers on Board, among whom were Monsieur Piki and the Abbot Ludwig; the former going to Lisbon with the Character of Nuncio, and the other to Barcelona with that of Inter-Nuncio from the Pope. On Monday last the Terrible, a British Man of War, was dispatched from hence to Barcelona, with Letters to his Catholick Majesty. On the 1st Instant came in here one of the Duke of Turfils's Gallies from Antibes, having on Board the General of the Gallies belonging to Sicily, with the Marquis of St. Philip, who went to Paris about six Weeks ago to receive the last Instructions from the Court of France, as likewise from that of Madrid. It is said he has positive Orders for the Execution of an Expedition on the Kingdom of Sardinia, which the Enemy have been long preparing for in these Parts, and which is carried on by the Duke d'Uzeda, the late Ambassador at Rome, in behalf of the Duke of Anjou.

Warsaw, April 13. N. S. This Court hath been very intent on the Issue of the present Debates and Consultations of the great Council of the Kingdom, and his Majesty hath been very assiduous in pursuing such Measures as may most effectually procure the Tranquility of Poland, and a good Understanding between himself and the Commonwealth. The Opinions of the Council have been Unanimous, that the best Expedient to compass this End would be to assemble a General Diet, to levy such an Army out of the Natives of the Kingdom as may be sufficient for its Security, and to send Ambassadors to the neighbouring Courts. The General of the Crown proposed also in the Diet, that the Confederacy of Sendomir should be confirmed, a Protestation be made against the Treaty of Alt-Ranstadt, and that the City of Dantzig be obliged to pay 100000 Crowns, and provide thirty Mortars, twenty Pieces of Cannon, and three Regiments of Infantry for the Publick Service. His Majesty having heard these Propositions, hath been pleased to consent that the Confederacy of Great Poland and the Treaty of Alt-Ranstadt should be annulled; and hath also declared that he would send the Saxon Troops out of the Kingdom, as soon as the Crown had a sufficient Army on Foot. The levying of those Forces, and the establishment of proper Funds for their Subsistence, hath been the Subject of frequent Debates; and that being adjusted, a new Difficulty arose where the Subsidies should be deposited. The Deputies of Great Poland were inclined to keep up the Ancient Custom, and entrust the Palatines of the respective Palatinates out of which the Money is to be raised, with the Custody, and Management of the Revenue. The Deputies of Little Poland have been very zealous in urging Measures more suitable to the present Circumstances of the Nation, and would have Monsieur de Prebendaw, Great Treasurer of the Crown, to be impowered to receive the whole Publick Funds; and that the Administration of all the Treasure of the Kingdom should be entirely under his Direction. Yesterday the General Council met at their

usual Hour of nine in the Morning, and resuming the Matters that had been under Deliberation the Day before, the great Inconveniencies were set forth that must necessarily ensue, if the Taxes were continued in the Hands of the several Palatines; and after long Debates on this Subject, they came to a Resolution, that the Care of the Revenue should be committed to one Person, and then unanimously agreed that Monsieur de Prebendaw, Great Treasurer of the Crown, should be entrusted with that Charge, and that none but such as are appointed by him should be any ways concerned therein; yet with this Limitation, that the said Power was only to continue during the space of the two next ensuing Years. The Council also determined the Method and Time for paying those Subsidies, and declared that the Payment of the first half should be made in October next; and that in the mean time the most convenient Methods should be taken for bringing in the Arrears granted at the Diet of Lublin. The Council sat till five in the Afternoon, and then his Majesty adjourned them to Monday the 14th. It is believed the Diet will be dissolved within few Days. Yesterday the Deputies from the Nobility of Great Poland went in a Body to visit the Earl of Stairs, Envoy-Extraordinary from the Queen of Great Britain to this Court, and requested that her Britannick Majesty would be pleased to interpose her Princely Offices to procure this Kingdom a sure and speedy Peace with the Swedes. Some time after Monsieur Potechi, Great General of Lithuania, made the Earl of Stairs a Visit. The Deputies of the Nobility of Great Poland waited the same Day on Monsieur Crancenburg, the Minister of the States-General. This Day the British Envoy gives an Entertainment to Prince Badewill, Monsieur Prebendaw the Great Treasurer of the Crown, Monsieur Fleming the chief Minister, the Dutch and Danish Envoys, and several of the chief Nobility in the Kingdom. Last Night we received the Declaration of the Neutrality of the Empire, which gives great Satisfaction to this Court.

Falmouth, April 15. On the 12th Instant failed to Cruize the Neptune's Privateer, Gornelius Garrottson Commander. On the 13th arrived the Hope Galley of Lime, the Palme and the Moadlin, both of Plymouth, all from Oporto, being bound for London. Yesterday put in here the St. John and St. Joseph, of and from Bilbao, from Amsterdam, Mathew Delathamoore Master; and this Day arrived the Expedition Packet-boat, commanded by Captain Clyes, from London, in order to receive a Mail for Lisbon.

Plymouth, April 16. On the 13th Instant arrived the Greyhound Galley of and for London from Leghorn, and the Martha from Oporto. The same Day came in her Majesty's Ships the Romney, Guernsey, Deptford, Experiment, Lark, Mary-Galley and Arundel, with about a hundred Sail of Merchant Ships for Portugal, the West-Indies and Virginia. On the 14^h arrived the Litchfield from Spithead. Yesterday failed the above-mentioned Fleet, and with them the Newcastle, Dover and Sweepstakes; as also the Provost Galley of Bristol for Falmouth. Yesterday came in a Swede from Oporto. This Day failed the Aldborough with two Vessels to the Westward.

Portsmouth, April 18. On Friday last her Majesty's Ships the Norfolk and Lancaster arrived at Spithead from the Eastward. The next Day the Southsea castle came in from Cruising; and her Majesty's Ships, the Royal Sovereign, Lyme and Swallow's-Prize from the Downs. On Sunday last her Majesty's Ships the Southsea-castle and Cruiser failed to the Eastward. The same Day the Port-

land arrived at Spithead, and yesterday the Mary-Galley, both from the Eastward. Yesterday also the Hind sailed out of the Harbour to Spithead, and the Seahorse sailed in. The Torbay, Warspigh, Reserve and Strombulo will sail this Morning to the Downs. Sir Charles Wager continues still on Board the Cornwall with sixteen Men of War.

Whitehall, April 19. Yesterday the Parliament was fur her Prorogued by Commission to the 2d of May next: And this Day the House of Convocation was Prorogued by Wait to the 8th of the ensuing November.
