Ount Traun, Mareschal of Lower Austriz, is come to pass the Festival in this Ci y, after which he will return to Presburg, in order to assist at the Diet of the States of Hungary, in the Quality of Great Commissive of the Emperor. Letters it in thence bring us no Account of any late Transsctions of Moment; but Mareschal Heister will speedily set out for that Kingdom, and Preparations are making to undertake the Siege of some important Place. At the same time General Passis will continue the Blockade of Neuhausel, and with a Detach ment of his Army observe the Motions of the Enemy. General Cusani, who is lately returned from Milan, is to Command the Cavalry in Hungary the ensuing Campaign. This Court is very much dissatisfied at the Inclination which the Republick of Genea has lately expressed towards the French Interest. The King of Spain hath complained of the great quantities of Corn which are daily transported from thence to Marseilles, and other Ports on that Coast; and also of the Reception of the Duke of Uzeda by that Republick, with the Character of Vicar-General of King Philip in Italy, and of permitting him to raise Recruits, and surnish the Tuscan Ports which are in the Possession of the Duke of Anjou with Military Stores out of their Dominions. Marseschal Tham is returned from the Baths at Baden, and designs to set out for Italy as soon as the necessary Funds are established for the March of the Imperial Troops out of their Winter Quarters and their Subssistence during the Campaign. Several Methods are already proposed for this end; and it is believed he may be ready to begin his Journey immediately after the Festival. The Regiment of Roccavion, consisting of a theusand Horse, has received Orders to serve this Campaign on the Upper Rhine, and will be speedily commanded to March towards those Parts.

Orders are given for drawing out a third pare of all the Regiments of Militia, to recruit the Regular Troops, and the Militia is to be reinforced by the Peasan's of the Country. Monsteur Krabbe, the Privy-Counfeller, is gone to make the necessary Dispositions for that purpose among the Boors in this Island. The Draught out of the Militia will amount to five thousand Men. From the Camp at Goullezin, April 27. N. S. The Enemy having, upon quitting their Posts on the Scarpe, broke down all the Bridges, we have repaired such his side, and ter opening the rearest Communication with Liste and Tournay, from which Places the Army must receive their chief Subsistence during the Siege. On the 25th we began the Lines of Circumvallation, which being now in a good forwardness, all our florse, except a Detachment of sitteen hundred, will march o Morrow over the Scarpe, and encamp between the lower Branch of that River, and the Canal that leads from Douay to Liste, to be nearer to our Magazines of Forage, and the greatest part of the Foot will remain on the side of Artois. The Duke of Marlborough will take his Quarters at the same time at the Abby of Flinnes, on the other side. A thousing Foot are detached to Day to take Post at the Town of Arleux, they are to stop the Sluices near that Place, which supply the Inundations about Douay with Water Olders are likewise given for cutting the Scarpe at Bioche, between Douay and Arras, in order to draw off the Wa-

ter on that fide into the adjacent Marshes. The heavy Artillery and Ammunition for the Siege will be sent up from Ghent and Mons with all possible Expedition; and General Dops, with the Body of Troops that wintered on the Maes, continues encomped near Tournay, to conduct them from thence to the Camp. Great numbers of Deserters come daily over to us; those from Douay give an Account that there are seventeen Bartalions and sour Squadrons in the Place. The Mareschal de Montesquiou is a Cambray, near which Place about ten Battalions and five Squadrons are encamped, and the rest of his Troops are gone into Gerrison.

From the Camp before Douay, May i. N. S. On Monday the 28th of the last Month the Horse of the Duke of Marlborough's Army passed the Scarpe at Lalain, as that of the Prince of Savoy's did the Canal at Oby, and encar ped, the former with the Right at the Village of Rache, and the Left near Bouvignies; the latter with the Right at Oby, and the Left a Rache. The Foot on the side of Artois have taken their Ground. The Instanty of the Prince of Savoy is extended from Pont Oby to Esquerckien; that of the Duke of Marlborough's troin Quincy to Sains. This Morning Lieutenant General Cadogan was commanded by the Duke of Marlborough to visit the Plains between Lens and Esquerchien, and to mark out a proper Place for ranging the Army in Line of Battel, as there may be occasion, in case the Enemy should attempt to disturb the Siege. The greater part of the heavy Arillery and Ammunition necessary tor the Siege is arrived at Ghent; and measures are taken for bringing that, and what comes from Mons, to this Place. The Artillery is expected here on the 8 h or 9th Instant. In the mean time the Disposition is making for the Attack of the Place, and the Troops having provided a go d number of Fascines, Gabions and Pickets, it is intended to break Ground to Morrow Night. The Sivices which the Enemy had broke on the Upper Dealle being repaired by the Duke of Marlborough's Order, the River is now made Navigable as far as Oby, which will very much tacilitate the Transport of our Forage, and other Necessaries from Lifle. Posts are likewise taken by strong Detachments of our Troops, as well from that Town, as from Tournay to the Camp, for the greater Security of our Convoys. A Detachment of eight hundred M n of the Prince of Savoy's Army attacked this Morning the Castle of Oignenville near Fort of Escape, into which the Enemy had put a Garrison of one hundred Foot, and ten Dragoens, who after an Hour's dispute submitted themely as prioners of War. Hague, May 2. N. S. The Penfioniries Buys and Vander-Duffen returned from Gertruydenberg on the 25th of the last Month, and the next Day they had a Conference with the Pensionary Heinsus, the Lord Townshend, and Count Zinzendors. On the 28th they made a Report of what peffed between them and the French Minifters to the States General; and on the 29th to the States of Holland. The French Ministers are to continue at Gertruydenberg 'till the Return of another Courier they have disparched to Versailles for further Instructions.
