## The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas a Representation duly made to Her Majesty in Council by the Secretary of State for the Environment that burials should be discontinued as hereinafter directed in St. John the Baptist Churchyard, Holywell, in the County of Cambridgeshire, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto, has in pursuance of an Order in Council made the 19th day of January 1976, and duly published, been taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred on Her by section 1 of the Burial Act 1853 (1853 c. 134), and of all other powers Her enabling, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith and entirely in St. John the Baptist Churchyard, Holywell, in the County

of Cambridgeshire, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that the burial may be allowed in the said Churchyard at their decease of the bodies of Phyllis Bearne, Edwin Henry Buckland, Dorothy Kathleen Butcher, Ida May Cook, Beatrice Kate Cooper, Joan Nellie Coulson, Florence Mary Doyle, Gwendolin Susan Fellows, Lucy Elizabeth Gray, Lily Harris, Gwendoline Howlett, Albert Thomas Marriot, Albert Mason, Doris Elizabeth Powell, John Stanley Powell, Edward George Reynolds, Frances Evelyn Sylvia Saunders, Mabel Evelyn Sutton, Arthur Edward Turner, Henry West, Mary Wilmer and Lucy Wilson, subject to the conditions that there shall be no disturbance of human remains and that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. John the Baptist Churchyard, Holywell, Cambridgeshire) Order 1976.
