Vienna, May 3. N. S.

Letters from Presburg of the 1st Instant say, that great numbers of Horses had been led through that City from Bohemia and Moravia, for remounting the Imperial Cavalry; and all the Dispositions being made for opening the Campaign, we expect to hear, by the next Advices, that the Imperialists have passed the Danube. For this end General Heister hath commanded Bridges of Boats to be laid over that River at Presburg, Komora and Gran, which are situated about five Hungarian Leagues from each other. We have Advices that some Bodies of Horse have already passed the Danube at Presburg, to cover the Frontiers of Austria from the Incursions of the Malecontents, who have not yet assembled their Forces into a Body; but frequently take occasion to plunder the Villages in small Parties, and to raise Contributions on the Frontiers. Great Succours of Men and Money have been transmitted to General Heister from the Emperor's Hereditary Dominions; and Prince Adam of Lichtenstein hath advanced to his Imperial Majesty five hundred thousand Florins, which Sum is to be employed in the same Service. We are assured, that the King of Sweden continues at Bender; it is said that some Presents from the Ottoman Court were sent him by the Grand Signior, the Grand Vizier, and several of the chief Ministers; but his Swedish Majesty being highly dissatisfied with their Conduct towards him in other Particulars, refused to accept of them; and it is reported, that his Majesty hath written to this Court, wherein he assures the Emperor that it was without his Knowledge or Consent, that his Forces accepted of Service under Prince Ragorski, or joined themselves with his Imperial Majesty's Enemies in Hungary. His Swedish Majesty also promises to give this Court what Satisfaction shall be demanded on this Occasion, and to punish the Offenders with Death, if his Imperial Majesty requires it. The Council of War have lately had under Deliberation the Post which is to be taken by the Prussian Recruits that are marching into Italy. They make some Difficulty of permitting them to pass through Tirol, and would have them take the Road through the Country of the Grisons; but it is not known whether they will come to any final Resolution in this Matter.

Dublin-Castle, May 7. This Morning his Excellency the Earl of Wharton, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, landed at Rings-End; on his Excellency's Arrival in the Bay three great Guns were fired from Rings-End, to give Notice of the Yatch's appearing, which were immediately answered by a like Number from the Castle. At his Excellency's landing, nine Guns at Rings-End were discharged, and the late Lords Justices, attended by great Numbers of the Nobility and Gentry in their Coaches, met his Excellency at the Water side, and waited on him to the Castle. In his Excellency's way to the City, the Sheriffs of Dublin, with two Troops of Horse of the Militia, waited upon him, and marched on each side of his Coach bare-headed, being joined by two Troops of the Regiment of Horse, commanded by Lieutenant General Langston. On his Excellency's passing through the Suburbs, a Battery of Guns, which were placed on a rising Ground for that Purpose, were discharged; the Streets from the first Entrance of the City being lined on each side by the Militia, and the Regi-

ments of Lord Siane and Colonel Jones. In his Excellency's Passage, to the Castle, the Lord Mayor and Aldermen in their Formalities, waited on his Excellency to congratulate his safe Arrival; from thence his Excellency proceeded to the Castle, and on his Entrance was saluted by three Rounds of the great Guns from the Tower, and afterwards waited upon by great Numbers of the Nobility, Judges and Gentry.

Waterford, May 6. This Day sailed her Majesty's Ship the Shoram, having under her Convoy twenty two Sail of Merchantmen, laden with Yarn and Wooll for Bristol. They write from Cork, that the Hastings Man of War, commanded by Captain Paul, is sailed to the Westward, having eight Sail of Merchant-Ships under Convoy, laden with Provisions for the Islands of Jamaica and Barbadoes.

Belfast, May 6. The Boston Galley of Dublin, laden with Sugar and Hops, is arrived here from Boston; and the Globe Galley of London, laden with Wine and Brandy from Final. The Queenborough and Seaford's-Prize are sailed to Cruize to the Northward, where two small French Privateers, each carrying four Guns, have infested the Coast.

Falmouth, May 11. On the 9th Instant came in the Dorothy Galley, Thomas Alin Master, from the Canaries, but lost from Mounts-bay. The same Day sailed the Whitehorse Privateer to cruize.

Plimouth, May 12. On the 10th Instant came in her Majesty's Ships the Dragon and Falmouth from Spithead, having on Board the four Indian Princes, together with the Star-Bomb and her Tender, one Ship bound for Newfoundland, three for Boston, one for New-York, three for Virginia, four for the Leeward Islands, and five Coasters with Stores for this Place. Yesterday came in the Francis and Mary of Topsam bound for Opoto.

Dartmouth, May 12. On the 10th Instant her Majesty's Ships the Salisbury, St. Albans and Seahorse, with about thirty Sail of Merchantmen and Coasters under their Convoy, lay all the Day in our Road detained by contrary Winds, being bound from Plimouth to the Eastward: The next Day the Wind changing, they proceeded on their Voyage. This Day the Pearl, a Dutch Privateer of thirty Guns, lay off this Harbour, and in the Afternoon gave chase to two small French Privateers, one of which she took after an hour's chase, and she is now in pursuit of the other.

Deal, May 14. Her Majesty's Ships the Norwich and Mary-Galley sailed yesterday in the Afternoon to the Westward; as likewise did the Godfrey Galley and Hope Brigantine, and several Colliers and other Coasters. Here remain

remain her Majesty's Ships the Dreadnought, Portland, Swiftsure and Triton's-Prize; as also the Spanish-Merchant, the Marlborough, the Margaret, the Lusitania, and the Hopewell, bound for Port-Mahone. This Morning came in hither her Majesty's Ship the Ruby.
