The Queen has been graciously pleased to approve the award of the Queen's Commendation for Brave Conduct to the undermentioned:

Marine Engineering Mechanic 2 William Ritchie Wilson Wallace D149809Q.

On 23rd February 1976 machinery breakdown drills were being conducted in the Steam Propulsion Plant of H.M.S. Antrim, then at sea off Portland. On completion of these drills MEM2 Wallace was standing on the lower plates, hand pumping lubricating oil round the Starboard Fuel Pump which was being restarted when an explosion occurred approximately four feet away, causing a number of secondary fires in the area of the Starboard Main Feed Pump and the Starboard Fuel Pump.

Pump and the Standby Fuel Pump.

MEM2 Wallace, shouting "Fire" and realising that he was the only person near to the blaze, attempted to reach the nearest foam extinguisher, but found it to be covered in flames. He therefore passed through the flames surrounding the Starboard Feed Pump, thereby passing the ladder which offered escape to the safety of the upper plates, and went aft to collect a gas-water extinguisher some fifteen feet distant. He then returned to the scene of the fire and, despite the thick black smoke that now enveloped the area, proceeded to extinguish the fires. In so doing he prevented leaking diesel fuel from the discharge pipe on the Standby Fuel Pump re-igniting; it was this which had caused the initial explosion. Wallace was subsequently relieved by senior ratings but he had already successfully extinguished

the fire and it did not re-ignite.

MEM2 Wallace, who is 17½ years old and serving on his first ship, displayed great bravery and remarkable presence of mind in tackling a potentially disastrous fire. There is no doubt that his prompt and unselfish action in risking his life to extinguish the secondary blazes prevented the occurrence of a major conflagration.
