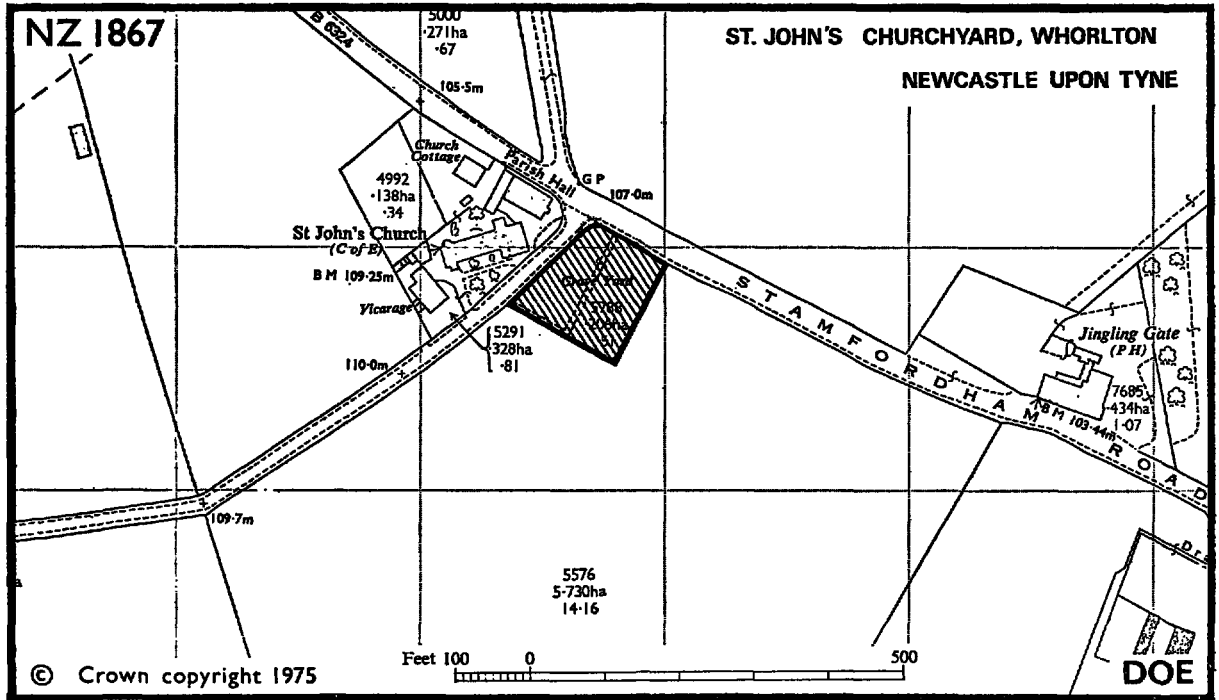
Provided that in any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard the burial may be allowed of the body

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. John's Churchyard, Whorlton, Newcastle upon Tyne) Order 1976.

Whereas a Representation duly made to Her Majesty in Council by the Secretary of State for the Environment that burials should be discontinued as hereinafter directed in part of St. Peter's Churchyard (detached), Berkhamsted, in the County of Hertfordshire, has in pursuance of an Order in Council made the 12th day of April 1976, and duly published, been taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred on Her by section 1 of the Burial Act 1853 (1853 c. 134), and of all other powers Her enabling, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith and entirely in that part of St. Peter's Churchyard (detached), Berkhamsted in the County of Hertfordshire, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that—

(a) In any earthen grave now existing in the said portion of the Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

(b) In the said portion of the Churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. Peter's Churchyard, Berkhamsted, Hertfordshire) Order 1976.
