TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS

1. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office at the Bank of England on Friday, the 2nd July 1976, at 1 p.m., for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act 1877, and the National Loans Act, 1968, to the amount of £500,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000, £10,000, £25,000, £50,000, £10,000, £25,000 or £1,000,000. They will be dated at the option of the tenderer on any business day from Monday the 5th July 1976 to Friday the 9th July 1976 inclusive and will be due 91 days after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of

England.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated and the net amount per cent. (being a multiple of one new halfpenny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. Notification will be sent on the same day as Tenders are received to the persons whose Tenders are accepted in whole or in part. Payment in full of the amounts due in respect of such accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of cash or by draft or cheque drawn on the Bank of England not later than 1.30 p.m. on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.

7. Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills

8. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

9. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES (DUPLICATION OF TREATIES)
(No. 2) Order 1976 (SI No. 218)

For the purpose of entry into operation of the European Communities (Definition of Treaties) (No. 2) Order 1976 (SI No. 218), the following treaty listed in Part II of the Schedule to the Order should be regarded as entering into force for the United Kingdom on 21st June 1976.

Protocol on the Accession of Greece to the Convention on the Provision of Mutual Assistance by their Customs Authorities, concluded between the Member States of the European Economic Community, signed at Rome on 7th September 1967 (Cmnd. 6304).

NOTICE OF SEIZURE UNDER THE CUSTOMS AND EXCISE ACT, 1952

Pursuant to section 275 (5) of the Customs and Excise Act 1952 and paragraph 1 of the 7th Schedule thereto, the Commissioners of Customs and Excise hereby give notice that by virtue of the powers contained in the Customs and that by virtue of the powers contained in the Customs and Excise Acts and enactments amending those Acts, certain goods, namely: Twenty-two magazines and four 8 mm. cine films imported and found at Mount Pleasant Postal, Depot, London E.C.1, on or about the 14th June 1976, have been seized as liable to forfeiture upon the grounds that the said goods are indecent or obscene articles which were imported contrary to the prohibition contained in section 42 of the Customs Consolidation Act 1876.
