

of Halmerend and is bounded on the south and north-west by the disused railway line between Halmerend and Leycett.

Description of Public Rights of Way

Parish of Madeley

1. Part of Footpath No. 34 which runs from a point about 400 metres south of Red Hall Farm in a general easterly direction through a derelict underpass of the disused railway to a point on the track leading to the Harrison and Woodburn houses about 200 metres east of those houses being that part which extends from a point at the northern side of the underpass north-eastwards for a distance of about 25 metres to its termination.

2. Part of Footpath No. 39 which runs from its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 1 above at the south-east corner of Bullthorns Wood in a general easterly direction through a derelict underpass of the disused railway to its junction with footpath No. 37 at the south-east corner of the Scot Hay cricket ground being that part which extends from a point at the northern side of the underpass in a general easterly direction for a distance of about 740 metres to the south-west corner of the cricket ground.

3. Parts of Footpath No. 41 which runs from its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 2 above at a point about 180 metres north-west of the Harrison and Woodburn houses in a general southerly direction to a point on the County Highway at Leycett about 100 metres west of West View being firstly that part which extends from its commencement in a general southerly direction for a distance of about 180 metres to a point about 40 metres west of the houses and secondly that part which extends from its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 1 above about 200 metres east of the houses in a general southerly direction for a distance of about 470 metres to its termination.

4. Part of Footpath No. 37 which runs from Leycett Road about 150 metres west of Scot Hay Methodist Church in a north-westerly direction to a point on the boundary with the Parish of Audley about 230 metres south of the old Hayes Wood Colliery reservoir being that part which extends from a point at the north-east corner of the Scot Hay cricket ground in a north-westerly direction for a distance of about 310 metres to the Parish boundary.

5. Footpath No. 38 which runs from its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 4 above at the point about 230 metres south of the old Hayes Wood Colliery reservoir in a general southerly direction to its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 3 at a point about 280 metres south-east of Harrison and Woodburn houses.

6. Part of Footpath No. 40 which runs from Leycett Road about 130 metres west of Scot Hay Methodist Church in a general south-westerly direction to its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 3 at a point about 95 metres east of Harrison and Woodburn houses being that part which extends from a point about 150 metres west of the church to its termination.

7. Footpath No. 45 which runs from its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 5 above at a point about 250 metres east-south-east of Harrison and Woodburn houses in a north-westerly direction for a distance of about 105 metres to its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 6 above at a point about 170 metres east of the houses.

8. Footpath No. 44 which runs from its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 5 above at a point about 240 metres east of Harrison and Woodburn houses in a north-easterly direction for a distance of about 155 metres and then in a north-westerly direction for a distance of about 90 metres to rejoin the footpath described in paragraph 5 above at a point about 180 metres west-south-west of the south-west corner of the Scot Hay cricket ground.

9. Footpath No. 43 which runs from its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 6 above at a point about 40 metres south-west of the Scot Hay cricket pavilion in a south-westerly direction for a distance of about 310 metres to its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 5 above at a point about 250 metres east of Harrison and Woodburn houses.

10. Footpath No. 42 which runs from its junction with the footpaths described in paragraphs 6 and 9 above at a point about 40 metres south-west of the Scot Hay cricket pavilion in a north-westerly direction for a distance of about 145 metres to its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 2 above at a point about 105 metres west of the south-west corner of the cricket ground.

11. Footpath No. 60 which runs from its junction with the footpaths described in paragraphs 4 and 5 above at a point about 230 metres south of the old Hayes Wood

Colliery reservoir in a south-westerly direction for a distance of about 175 metres to rejoin the footpath described in paragraph 5 above at a point about 190 metres west of the north-west corner of the Scot Hay cricket ground.

12. Footpath No. 61 which runs from its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 11 above at a point about 225 metres north-west of the north-west corner of the Scot Hay cricket ground in a south-westerly direction for a distance of about 200 metres to its junction with the footpath described in paragraph 2 above.

Parish of Audley

13. Part of Footpath No. 61 which runs from High Street, Halmerend about 20 metres west of the Methodist Chapel in a general south-westerly direction to a point on the boundary with the Parish of Madeley about 230 metres south of the old Hayes Wood Colliery reservoir being that part which extends from a point about 160 metres south-east of the old reservoir in a south-westerly direction for a distance of about 100 metres to the parish boundary.

14. Part of Footpath No. 63 which runs from a point about 90 metres south-west of Minnie Farm in a general south-easterly direction to the point described in paragraph 13 above on the boundary with the Parish of Madeley about 230 metres south of the old Hayes Wood Colliery reservoir being that part which extends from a point about 180 metres south-east of the old reservoir in a general southerly direction for a distance of about 50 metres to the Parish boundary.

Description of Alternative Ways proposed to be made available

1. An alternative way in the Parishes of Madeley and Audley from Footpath No. 37 at the north-east corner of the Scot Hay cricket ground in a general northerly direction for a distance of about 225 metres then north-westwards for a distance of about 95 metres and then in a general northerly direction to Footpath No. 61, which runs to High Street, Halmerend, at a point about 160 metres south-east of the old Hayes Wood Colliery reservoir.

2. An alternative way in the Parishes of Madeley and Keele from Footpath No. 40 at a point about 150 metres west of Scot Hay Methodist Church in a south-westerly direction for a distance of about 70 metres and then in a south-easterly direction for a distance of about 70 metres and then in a general south-westerly direction for a distance of about 380 metres to a point on the Leycett—Silverdale Road about 180 metres west of Pool End Farm.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC PATH ORDER

HIGHWAYS ACT 1959

City of Bradford Metropolitan Council (Owler Park Road, Ilkley) Public Path Diversion Order 1976

Notice is hereby given that the above-named Order, made on 30th July 1976 is about to be submitted to the Secretary of State for the Environment for confirmation, or to be confirmed as an unopposed Order, by the City of Bradford Metropolitan Council.

The effect of the Order, if confirmed without modification, will be to divert a public right of way which runs from Owler Park Road to the boundary of the North Yorkshire County Council to a line running horizontally to it approximately 40 metres to the south.

A copy of the Order and the map contained in it has been deposited and may be inspected free of charge at the Area Office, Ilkley, during normal office hours.

Any representation or objection with respect to the Order may be sent in writing to the Chief Solicitor, City Hall, Bradford, before 27th September 1976 and should state the grounds on which it is made.

If no representations or objections are duly made, or if any so made are withdrawn, City of Bradford Metropolitan Council may instead of submitting the Order to the Secretary of State for the Environment, themselves confirm the Order. If the Order is submitted to the Secretary of
