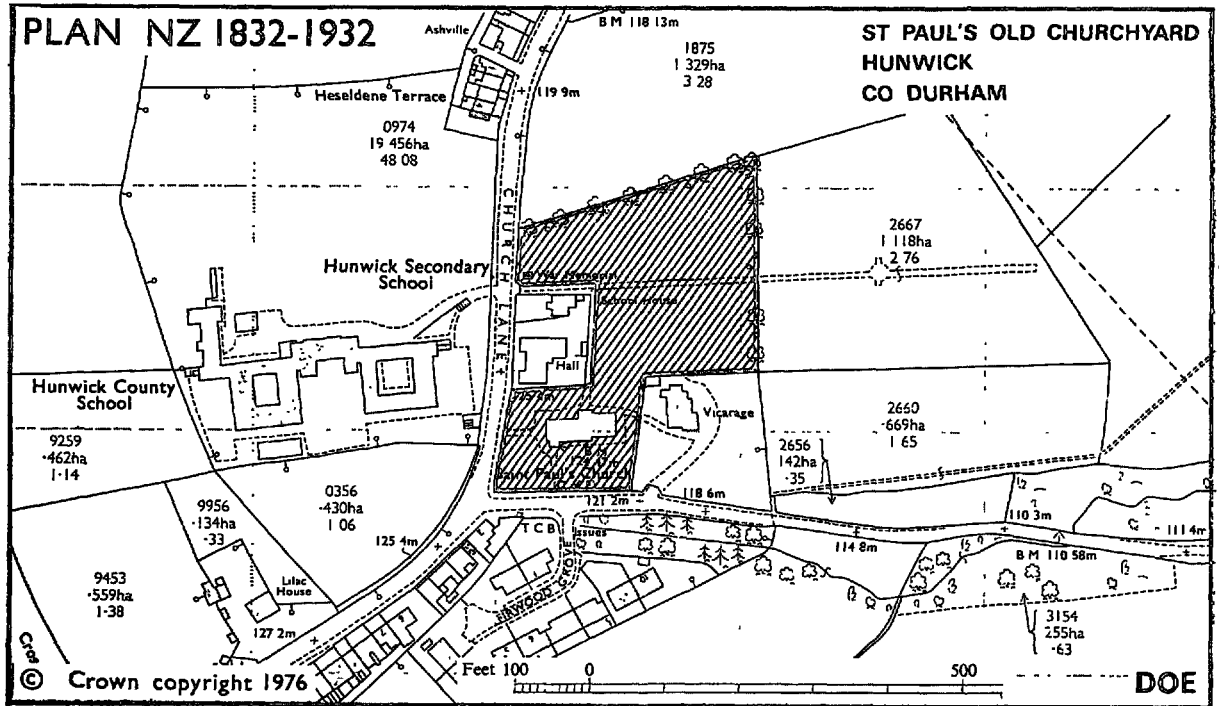
(b) In the said Churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with

the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. Paul's Old Churchyard, Hunwick, Durham) Order 1976.

MISUSE OF DRUGS ACT 1971 SECTION 12(2)

DIRECTION PROHIBITING EXERCISE OF POWERS IN RELATION TO CONTROLLED DRUGS

John Owens

In accordance with section 12(2) of the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971, notice is hereby given that the Secretary of State gave the following direction which was served and thereby came into effect on 3rd November 1976.

Whereas John Owens, M.B., Ch.B., a doctor within the meaning of the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971 whose registered address is All Saints Hospital, Lodge Road, Birmingham, B18 5SD, was on 28th May 1976 convicted of certain offences under that Act:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of section 12 of the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971 I hereby direct that the said John Owens be prohibited from having in his possession, prescribing, administering, manufacturing, compounding and supplying and from authorising the administration and supply of any controlled drug within the meaning of that Act.

This Direction does not extend to the doing of anything in circumstances in which it might lawfully be done without being a doctor.

The Trunk Road (Ganllwyd, Gwynedd) (40 m.p.h. Speed Limit) Order 1976

Notice is hereby given that the Secretary of State for Wales proposes to make an Order under sections 74 and 84D of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1967, as amended by Part IX of the Transport Act 1968. The effect of the Order will be to impose a 40 m.p.h. speed limit on the length of road specified in the Schedule to this notice. The existing 30 m.p.h. speed limit on that length of road will be revoked.
