Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred on Her by section 1 of the Burial Act 1853 (1853 c. 134), and of all other powers Her enabling, is pleased, by

and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

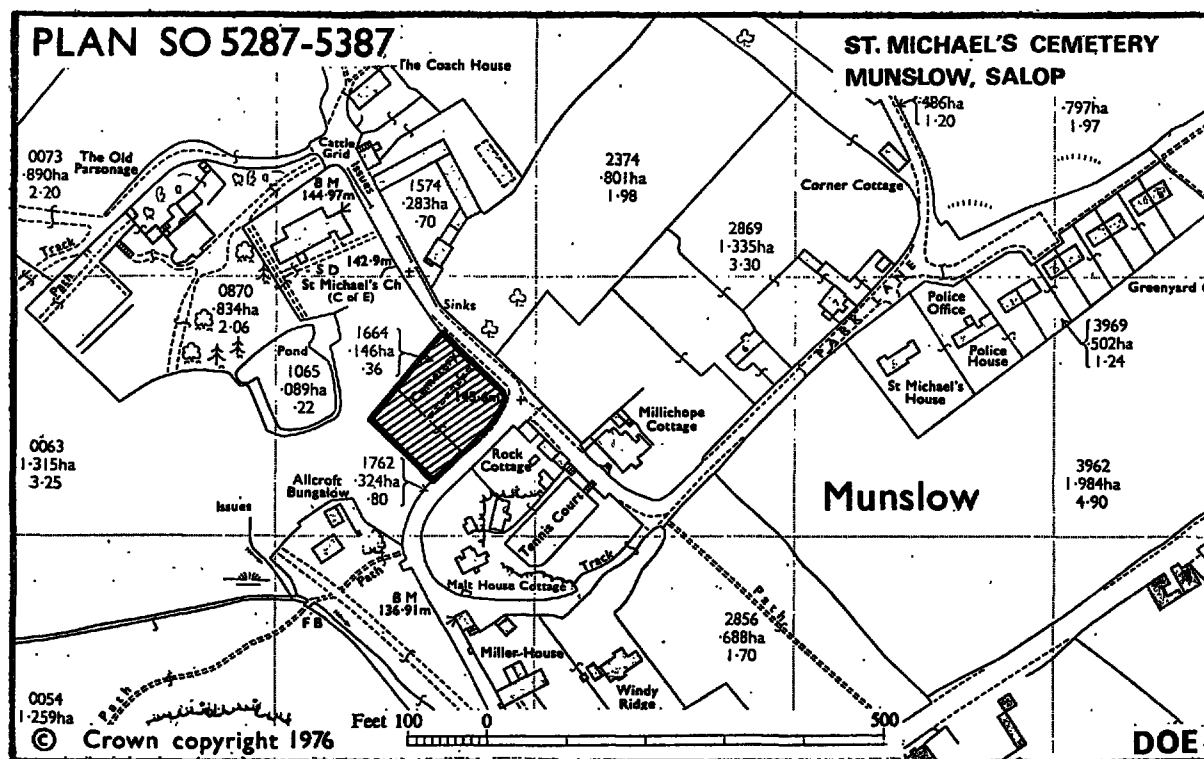
1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith in St. Michael's Cemetery, Munslow, in the County of Salop, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that one further burial may be allowed in each of the existing family graves of Murray John Nathaniel Brown and William John Fletcher, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth of less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. Michael's Cemetery, Munslow, Salop) Order 1977.

Provided that in any earthen grave now existing in the said part of the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. Saviour's Churchyard, Shotton Colliery, Co. Durham) Order 1977.
