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Falmouth, May 29.

THe 25th instant arrived here the *Charity* of *Bristol* laden with Tobacco from *Virginia*, bound for *London*; the next day came in the *Lucy* of *London*, and the *David* of *Brint-Island* in *Scotland*, laden with Wines, and the 27th, the *Edward* of *London*, and the *Elizabeth* of the same place from *Porto*.

Moscow, May 8 *Natroskins* lately employed in the Treaty upon the frontiers of *Poland*, finds some difficulty to preserve himself from his enemies, who endeavor to blame him for concluding a peace with *Poland* to the advantage (as they pretend) of that kingdom, and make use of this as an argument to persuade the Czar to an ill opinion of him.

This last night happened a fire in two parts of this City, which in little time consumed near 4000 houses, and with them the *Swedes Magazine*.

Lisbonne, May 12. The Count *de Schomberg* having procured the settlement of the greater part of the pension formerly granted him, is embarked with Monsieur *Verjus* the *Queens* Secretary, aboard a French man of war for *France*.

A French man of war putting in here to repair, tells us of a Fleet of theirs of about 12 sail which are past by, some towards *Cadix*, others for the *East Indies*.

The Dutch Fleet under the Command of the Heer *Van Ghent* is also past by, and another of near 50 sail expected, at *Setubal* to lade Salt, according to a former agreement.

The Conde *de Villa Fler* is this week going to his Government of *O Porto*.

Genova, May 28. The 21 instant his Excellency the Lord *Falconbridge* had his Audience and took his leave of the Duke and Senate, accompanied by many of the Nobility, and met by four of the Senators after the same manner as at his first Audience: his Excellency, though much pressed to a longer stay, intended to have embarked the next day for *Legorn*, but falling into an indisposition of body, was forced contrary to his resolution to keep his chamber for several days, but on the 25th instant though much weakened with his distemper, he went on board the *States Gally* appointed for his transportation to *Legorn*, where, as by a *Felucca* even now arrived we are informed he arrived the 26th instant. At his Excellencies embarking 60 persons were sent on board with all sorts of provisions for his entertainment.

Three French Gallies have been for some days and still continue in this Port, and intend suddenly to return for *Marseilles*, from whence *Signior Hippolito Centurioni* is lately gone post for *Paris* to receive Orders from his most Christian Majesty.

Two days since sailed hence the *Fame* for *Legorn*.

From *Turin* we are told, that there was lately arrived in that Court a Gentleman sent thither by the Elector of *Bavaria* to acquaint the Duke with the happy delivery of the Electress his Sister of a Son, which news was received by the Duke with much satisfaction and joy, and the Count *de Turnan* was immediately sent away by the Duke to congratulate the Elector and Electress.

The Prince of *Piedmont* is every day more and more consumed in his health.

Vienna. May 28. The Empress *Eleanor* has been lately ill of an Ague, which has drawn hither their Imperial Majesties upon the account of a Visit, but they intend to return again in little time to *Luxembourg*.

Colonel *Nettering* a *Castellan* in *Hungary*, who endeavoured to have held a private Correspondency with the Turks, and was suspected to have had a design to have delivered up to them some considerable place upon the Frontiers, was apprehended upon this suspicion and is brought hither Prisoner, and committed to safe custody.

The Jews had lately great hopes of prevailing with the Emperor, to dispence with his former Edict for their banishment, or at least to have it so moderated that a considerable number of them might have been permitted to continue in this City, but all their hopes seem now extinguish'd, and they are preparing to change their habitations.

Captain *de Thraun* a Comander of Horse employed from the Officers of the army in *Hungary*, with letters to his Imperial Majesties Council of War, is lately arrived here, complaining of the Count *Esterhaz* for refusing a passage over the *Waag* to the Imperial forces, which are said to consist of 18 thousand men, he has been dismiss'd by the said Council after his audience, and is return'd with new Orders.

The Prince *Ragotsky* has been for some time treating with his Imperial Majesty about terms of agreement and reconciliation, but finds little hopes of returning to the Emperors favor, unless he come in person to beg his pardon, which he is not yet resolv'd to do.

The Turks being informed of the march of the Emperors forces into *Hungary*, and that they are passing the *Waag*. The *Basha* of *Neubausel* and other Turkish Officers are drawing together their forces, with an intention not to offer any acts of hostility, but only to secure their Frontiers; they have lately made a bridge over the River *Gran*.

The Prince *Ragotsky's* Army is supposed not to exceed the number of 8000 men, and those somewhat discouraged, since one *Zacky* a Hungarian; and a great Officer has deserted their party. The Imperial Army has lately mustered, and appears very considerable, both in number and courage; their Train of Artillery is come safely to them, and several pieces of Canon are to follow; and the better to tie the Hungarians to the Emperors service, Order is given for administering a new Oath of Allegiance to all the Militia of that Countrey.

On Saturday last the Envoyes from the 13 Counties had an Audience from his Imperial Majesty, in which they made their solemn protestations to live and dye in his service; but at the same time endeavoured to dissuade the Emperor with many strong arguments, from Quartering his forces in the Upper *Hungary*, to which they received no satisfactory answer.

The Emperor has demanded considerable sums of Money by way of Loan, towards the carrying on of his wars in *Hungary*, of the Ecclesiastics, Barons, Knights, and Comonalty of *Udvaria*.

Venice, May 31. From *Dalmatia* they write, that the seas are free, and unintrupted, the Corsairs of *Dulcigno* and *Santa Maura*, keeping themselves within bounds, and observing the peace, as do the rest of the Ottoman Subjects, and are so far from offering violence to any of our Ships

ships, that they have lately with much kindness entertained in their Ports two Gallies belonging to this Republick on their way from *Dalmatia* to the *Levant*.

From the *Levant* we are told, that the Hungarians have made frequent addresses to the Ottoman Court for assistance against the Emperors forces, but have not as yet met with any answer suitable to their desires.

We are farther advised from thence, that the Grand Segnors brethren in *Constantinople* have still a considerable party in the City, inasmuch as the Grand Segnior had suspended his return thither, but was removed from *Salozich* toward *Adrianople*, where he intended to continue till Order could be taken to reduce the people, especially the Janizaries to better obedience.

The Grand Segnior having thus changed his design of going to *Constantinople*, the Visier has sent a Gally to attend Cavalier *Molino* towards *Adrianople*, where he is to have his Audience, on which he may suddenly embark without any farther expectation of the uncertain resolution of the Visier.

On Wednesday last arrived here a Courier from *Florence*, having been at *Medana*, *Parma*, and *Mantoua*, carrying with him the news of the death of the Great Duke of *Florence*, and is to pass hence on the same errand to *In-spruck*, *Salzbourg*, and *Vienna*.

From *Zant* we are advised that the Corsairs of *Tripoli* have lately taken two ships, one French the other a Genoese, and that seven Saichs and one other vessel, whereon were embarked 3000 men which came from *Candia* were unfortunately cast away, and none of them saved.

On Thursday last the General and Marquis de *St An-dre Monbrun* attended the Senate with a great Train of his Officers.

Dantzic, May 31. Our last Letters from *Warsaw* inform us, that at a small Diet held at *Schradaw* in Great Poland, the Nobility intercepting a Letter written in Characters from some of the disaffected faction to one *Zemimadofsky*, a person of great authority amongst them, and *Casellan* of *Posen*, of which upon examination he was not able to give them a satisfactory account; whereupon they imagining that under that cloud, might be concealed somewhat of Treasonable and dangerous consequence, out of their zeal to his Majesty, and the present Government, immediately fell upon him with their Sabres and Poleaxes and so wounded him that he was left as dead upon the place; at the same time they deputed several of their Members to be sent to the King, to desire him, that he would summon the great Officers who absented themselves from the Court, to appear within three weeks, and in case of refusal, to confiscate their Estates, and to confer their Charges upon others. They farther desired that his Majesty would issue out his Letters for a general rising of the Nobility, so that they might be in a posture fit to meet their enemies whither at home or abroad, which is believed will produce no small change for the better in this kingdom.

Two days since arrived here the Great Generals Lady, and is surmised that the General may be also expected. This Assembly of so many of the Polish Nobility in this Place, gives some cause of jealousy to the Magistrates, who have for their security, resolved that the Burgers shall in their own persons by turns, keep watch every night upon the walls, and have published a Proclamation, commanding that no person shall be admitted or received into any lodgings, without they first give an account of themselves, their business, and time of stay.

The Vice-Chancellor of Poland is daily expected here to receive the Homage of this City, and from hence goes on the same errand to *Elbing* and other Towns in *Prussia*.

Other Letters of the 25th Instant from *Warsaw*, confirm the zeal of the Deputies at the Diet at *Schradaw*, telling that the *Casellan* of *Posen* is now very ill under the hands of the Chirurgions at *Posen*, having a great wound upon his forehead, a dangerous one on his side, two upon his back, and one on his foot. The *Staroste* *Bydgosky* en-

deavouring to defend him, was also wounded, and divers others suspected to be of the same party, forced to save themselves by flight.

Hamburg, June 3. From *Stockholm* we are told, that the *Sieur Spaar* the Senator is lately arrived there, and that one other person is to be nominated to joyn with him, and to be sent into *England* about the arbitration of the differences between the two Crowns of *France* and *Spain*.

The Swedes are in great expectation of their Letters from *Moscow*, that they may from them receive some light into their concerns with *Muscovy*.

Cologne, June 6. We are now in great hopes that the Treaty between the Elector and this City may in little time be concluded, with mutual satisfaction, upon the interposition of the Elector of *Mentz*, whose Envoy having been instrumental in this good Work, is desired by the Magistrates and Council of this City to continue here for the perfection of it, and have by their Letters desired also the Elector of *Mentz* to dispence with his said Ministers attendance at *Wurtsbourg* till this be over. Our Elector seems to have the greater inclination to this Peace, since it has been so much the desire of the said Elector of *Mentz*, and that his Imperial Majesty has been pleased also by his Letters to persuade him to an accommodation.

The Elector of *Brandenbourg* has countermanded his forces which were marching towards *Halberstadt*, and the Dukes of *Brunswick* and *Lunenbourg* have remanded also theirs, both parties having been persuaded to submit the arbitration of their differences to the Elector of *Saxony*.

Paris June 11. On Saturday last his Majesty arrived at *St Germain* from his progress into the *Netherlands* and the 7th Instant Monsieur the Duke of *Orleans* came to *Villars Cotterets*, where he intends to expect the return of *Madam*.

We are here in great expectation of the success of the Fleet under the Command of Monsieur de *Marsel* before *Tunis*, of which we have had of late but little account.

The Emperor who was of late somewhat indisposed, is said to be perfectly restored to his health.

London, June 5. On Thursday last *Madam* embarked on her return to *France*, the next day about one of the clock arrived here by water His Majesty, His Royal Highness, and His Highness Prince *Rupert*, and yesterday Her Majesty and Her Royal Highness, having the night before lodged at *Sittingburn*.

His Majesty has since His return received an account from the Resident of *Florence*, brought by a Courier express from thence, of the Death of the Great Duke, for which the Court is this day entered into mourning.
