The Queen's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Hereas by an Act made in the Parliament holden in the Tenth Year of the Reign of the late King William the Third, Intituled, An Act for Suppressing of Lotteries, it was Enacted, That after the Nine and twentieth Day of December, One thousand fix hundred ninety nine, no Person whatioever should publickly or privately exercife, keep open, shew or expose to be played at, drawn at, or thrown at, or should draw, play, or throw at any Lottery by Dice, Lots, Cards, Balls, or any other Numbers or Figures, or any other way whatsoever, except at the Royal-Dak Lottery therein mentioned for the Remainder of a Term long since expired, under the Forseiture of Five hundred Poinds by the Maintainer thereof, and of Twenty Pounds by every Person that should play, throw or draw at the same, to be recovered as in the said Act is directed: and all such Lotteries are thereby declared privately exercise, keep open, shew or expose to be rected; and all fuch Lotteries are thereby declared to be common Nutances: Which was a perpetual Act, and is now in Force. And it having been this Day represented to Her Majesty at this Board, That of late divers Evil-diposed Persons have set up many Lotteries in several Places in this Kingdom in Imitation of the faid Royal-Oak Lottery, called Roly-Poly, and A B C, and other Lotteries for Goods, Lands and Mony, called Sales by Lots, contrary to the said Act, and thereby have unjustly and fraudulently got to themselves great Sums of Mony from the Children and Servants of several Gentlemen, Traders and Merchants, and from other unwary Persons, which tends to the utter Ruin and Impoverishment of many Families: Her Majesty therefore by the Advice of Har Rein Majesty therefore, by the Advice of Her Privy-Courcil, is pleased to Order, that the Judges of fler Courts at Westminster, and Her Majetty's Justices of the Peace, do use their utmost Endeavours for Suppressing all such Lottevies; and that Her Attorney-General do Prosecute such Persons of whom he deall the Persons of whom he shall have Notice, who shall hereafter oftend con-trary to the said Ast, by keeping any such Lottery, or playing at the fame.
