Requiring Quarantain to be performed by Ships coming from the Balrick Sea.

ANNE

Here is several Places on the Baltick Sea have been for some time past, and yet are infested with the Plague; and we, out of our tender Care of our People, and to prevent out or our tender care of our respie, and to prevent the Infection that might be by Ships coming into our Ports from thence, did by our feweral Orders in Council made in the Months of August, September, October, November, December, January and February left, direct and require, that all Ships and Persons soming in the same from the Baltick Sea should per-form their Quarantain in such manner, and in such places, so in and by the said Orders are directed: Notwithstanding which it has been represented unto us, That several persons arrived in our Ports in such Ships from the faid Sea, have presumed to come on hore, and beve appeared in the publick Streets, and mingled themselves with our Subjects; and some of our Subjects have gone on Board such ships, and re-eived Goods therein imported, to the manifest Dan-ger of infesting our Subjects. For the remedying whereof, and preventing the said Infestion being brought into this our Kingdom, and to the intent that no person whatsoever may pretend ignorance of our Commands herein, we have thought fit, and with the Advice of our Privy-Council, do, by this our Royal Proclammion, give Notice of the faid Orders, and do require that all persons do yield exact Obedience to the same, which are as follows.

First, That all Ships or Vessels arriving in any of

our Ports from the Baltick Sea, do make their Quarantain for forty Days, which shall be reckoned and commence from the Day each Ship shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for performing such Qua-rantain, and not before.

Secondly, That the places for performing Quarantain by Juen Soins bound to the Rivers of Thames, and Medway be Standgate-Creek on the South shore of the River Medway opposite to the Isle of Grain, Sharpheet-Creek, and the lower End of the Hope; and by such Ships coming into any of our Out-ports, be such places as have been, or shall be appointed by the Officers of our Customs in such Out-ports, who are impowered and required to appoint proper places for the same.

Thirdly, That until, and during the time for making such Quarantain, no Persons coming, or Goods imported in any such Ship, shall come on shore, or be landed in any place within this Kingdom.

Fourthly, That if at the Expiration of the Quarantil hardy direct at the Expiration of the Research

rantain hereby directed to be made, there shall appear Persons taking Charge of fuch Ships, shall be, that all the process of the Mayor, or other Coief Magistrate of the Place, in or near which fuch Ships shall be, that all the propose the mayor, or other Coief Magistrate of the Place, in or near which fuch Ships shall be, that all the persons therein are in perfect Health, that then the persons therein are coming in such Ships shall be the respective persons coming in such Ships shall be irmitted to go on shore; but the Goods imported in such Ships shall be landed, opened and aired, and so remain a Week, and after may be brought to their Places of Difeberge; other than Linnen, Polonia Wooll, Hogs Eriftles, Spruce Tarn, Feathers, Hemp and Flax, which the Officers of our Customs soull cause to remain on Board such Scips, and not permit to be landed 'till an Account thereof shall be given unto us in Council, and we shall give Orders concerning the same.

Fitthly, That the place for landing and airing the Goods imported from the Baltick, and designed for the River Thames, shall be the Island of Stowfort in the River Medway; and in other our Ports, such places as have been, or shall be appointed by the Officers of our Customs, in conjunction with the respective Chief Magistrates there.

Sixthly, That whatever Sip or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on Board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantain, shall therefore be compelled to do the like Quarantain.

Seventhly, That such persons as after Quarantain

performed shall be employed in the Hold of any such Ship, for the taking Iron, Tar, Pipe-Staves, Tim-ber, or other Goods, from Hemp, Flax, Linnen, Polonia Wooll, Hogs Bristles. Spruce Yarn or Feathers therein, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantain.

Eighly, That the Captains of every of our Ships of War who shall meet any such Ships coming to any of our Ports of this Kingdom, shall take Care to prevent the landing any Goods, Seamen or Passengers therein, untill they shall be put under the Direction

of the Officers of our Customs. Ninthly, That the Commissioners and other Officers of our Customs do use their utmost Diligence and Care that the Quarantain before directed be duly

performed.

And we do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Persons whatsoever that hall come into any of our Ports in this Kingdom from any parts of the Baltick Sea, that they do make their Quarantain according to our Orders herein before expressed; and that during the time of their Quarantain they do not presume to come or put any Goods out of such Ships on shore, nor permit or suffer any Ferson to come on Board such Ships; and that all other Persons, other than such as shall be appointed to take Care that the Quarantain be duly performed, do not go on Board, or receive any Goods from juch Ships 'till they shall be discharged from their quarantain, so herein before directed, upon Pain of being proceeded against with the utmost Severity that the Law will allow of, for disobeying our Commands bersin, so necessary for Securing the Health of our Subjects. And we do bereby command our Commissioners of our Treasury, our Commissioners for Executing the Ofice of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain and treiand, and the Commissioners of our Customs, that they do take care and give the necessary Directions, that our said Orders be put in Execution, and duly observed: And Orders be put in Execution, and duly objerved: And we do likewise strictly Charge and Command the Commanders of our Ships of War, the Commanders of our Forts and Garrisons lying near our Sea Coasts, and all our Fusices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, Headboroughs, Tythingmen, and all other Officers and Ministers of Fusice, to be aiding and assisting to the Officers of our Customs, and to all other Persons that Chill be concerned in topping Ships coming from the shall be concerned in stopping Ships coming from the Baltick Sea, and bringing them to the Places appointed for, and obliging them to perform their Qua-rantain, in the due Execution of our Commands berein-

Viennz, November 1. N. 3. The Duke Regent of Wirtemberg having been a very great Sufferer during this present War, and particularly by rea-ion of the Troubles in Bavaria, General Pfuhl, his Envoy at this Court, has lately made very pressing Instances to procure some Indemnisation for his Master from his Imperial Majesty. He makes the Damages sustained to amount to above sifteen Millions. At his Request to the Ministers of the Queen of Great Britain, and of the States-Gemeral of the United Provinces, lately presented a Memorial, recommending the Interests of that Prince, who has given signal Proofs of his Zeal, and unshaken Adherence to the Common Cause. Before Count Sinzendorf left this Place, in order to return to the Hague, the Emperor, to show how well he was fatisfied with his Conduct in his late Negotiations, granted to him and his Heirs, the Town of Scharding in Bavaria, which is an Estate valued at Five thousand Pounds Sterling a Year. His Imperial Majelly likewise made him a Present of a Ring worth Two thousand Pounds. A Conference was lately held here, to settle the Repartition of the Winter Quarters for the Troops in Lombardy. The Regiment of Dragoons of Vaubonne, and a Body of Hussars, which are intended to be sent forthwith to Spain, have been ordered to be quartered in the Fiels that lye on the Frontiers of the Republick of Genoa, that they may be near the Coast, and in a readiness to embark. The Recruits for the Imperial Troops which are in her Britannick Majesty's Pay in Spain, are directed to be taken out of the first Recruits that are furnished by the Hereditary Provinces, that they may be in a readincs to be transported as soon as possible. Lieutenant-General Count Konigseck, who is named by this Court to be the Imperial Commissary at the Conferences intended to be held at Milan, for adjusting the Disputes with the Duke of Savoy, and who was fent for from Mantua for that purpose, is arrived here, in order to receive his Instructions for that Commission.

Hamburgh, November 11. N. S. The Baron de Goertz, Minister of the House of Holstein-Gottorp, has defired the Ministers of the Guarantees of the Treaty of Travendahl, to move the Court of Denmark to renew the Conferences for compofing the Differences remaining between those Princes; which it is hoped his Danish Majesty will confent to, upon the Instances that have been lately made. The Administrator of Holstein has sent the Count Van der Natt as Envoy-Extraordinary to the King of Denmark. The Minister residing here from the King of Prussia, has declared to the Imperial Com-mission, his Master's Resolution to withdraw half the Troops he has in this Town very suddenly. The Minister of Hanover has likewise declared, that the Elector, his Master, has resolved to recall his whole Battalion; fo that we are in great expectation here, that most part of the Foreign Troops will March out in a short time, and that the Guard of the Town will foon be left to a Garrison of our own. Monsieur Pincier, Brother-in-Law to old Monsieur Wedderkop, who was some time since put in Prison at Tonningen, by Order of the Court of Holitein, is come hither with the Son of Monieur Wedderkop, to follicit for his Enlargement; and Monseur Alefeld, Vice-Stadtholder for the King of Denmark in this Country, is likewife suddenly expected.
