Vienna, November 15. N. S.

THE Imperial Troops in Hungary have made themselves Masters of the Town of Zolnock on the Tibiscus, whereby they have opened to themselves an Entrance into the Country about Tolay and those Parts, where the Malecontents have preferred themselves hitherto free and undisturbed. The Court of Vienna proposes to draw great Advantages from that Post: But as the Plague is not yet ceased in that Neighbourhood, and the Infection is said to be got among some of the Imperial Regiments, it is believed they will not be able to make to considerable a Progress as might otherwise be expected, at least for the present. The Election of a Coadjutor to the Archbishop and Elector of Mentz being over, Count Schonborn, the Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, who went to assist at that Choice, is expected back from thence in a short time. The Chapter of Quedlinburg having acquainted his Imperial Majesty with their having chosen the Princess Mary-Elizabeth of Holstein to be their Abbess, the Examination of that Matter is now before the Aulick Chamber, who are to make their Report of the Proceedings, in order to the Emperor's granting his Confirmation of that Election in the usual Form. The Resolutions taken by this Court upon the Affairs of Hamburg have been lately dispatched from hence, by which it is hoped the Differences in that Government, which have been a considerable time under the Care and Management of the Imperial Commission there, will soon be determined, and that Town be restored to its former Tranquillity.

Hamburg, November 25. N. S. Monsieur Alefeld, Vice-Stattholder and Privy-Counsellor of the King of Denmark, came hither the 14th Instant. He has had several Conferences, since his Arrival, with the Ministers of the Guarantees of the Treaty of Travendahl, upon the several Points he had in Commission from his Danish Majesty. The Grievances complained of both on the Part of Denmark, and Holstein, are under Consideration, and Endeavours will be used to adjust those Matters to their mutual Satisfaction. Monsieur Alefeld having performed his Orders, left this Town again on Tuesday the 18th. The Burghers of this City have had several Meetings of late, to consider the Demand of an Advance of sixty thousand Dollars made by the Imperial Commissioner, and to settle their Quota of Cannon and other Necessaries to be employed with the Body of Troops designed for the Preservation of the Neutrality in Germany; and yesterday they came to a Resolution to grant the Sum of sixty thousand Dollars, and left it to the Senate and the Council of Sixty to find out the Ways and Means of raising that Money: And as to the Cannon, they will consult the Towns of Luber and Bremen, and

determine themselves according to the Proportions they intend to furnish. General Meyerfeldt is gone to wait upon his Swedish Majesty at Bender. The Plague continues to be violent in some Parts of Pomerania, but we don't hear that it advances much nearer to this Place. The Swedes are afraid lest the Contagion should lay hold of the Body of Troops which they have in that Country. We hear from Dantzick, that the Count de Herberstein had Audience of his Polish Majesty, being introduced by the Marshal of the Crown, which had been retarded for some time by reason of a Dispute with some of the Ministers of that Court, concerning the first Visit, which the Count insists upon as due to him. One Monsieur Baluz, employed for some time by France in Poland and those Parts, has received Orders to repair to the Court of his Czarish Majesty.

Brussels, November 27. N. S. We have nothing material in this Place, since the Duke of Marlborough and the Prince of Savoy left us on Tuesday Morning. We find by the last Letters of the 24th from Paris, that the Reports of his Catholick Majesty's being Retreated towards Catalonia were not true; but that on the contrary our Army was still encamped near Aranjuez, and had still a Garrison in Toledo. The Enemy pretend to be very strong, and to be able to regain the Possession of Madrid in a short time; but the Advices we have from Spain by the way of France are very little to be depended on.

Hague, November 28. N. S. The Duke of Marlborough and the Prince of Savoy embarked last Tuesday in the Evening at Antwerp, on Board the Yacht which had been sent to receive them. They were attended by the Earl of Albemarle, and some other General Officers. They met with an ill Passage, by reason of Fogs and contrary Winds, and did not arrive here till late this Evening. The Body of Troops which were ordered to continue in their Post upon the Lys, for the Security of the Boats which brought the Artillery and heavy Baggage from Aire, was to separate yesterday, and march towards their Winter Quarters. Four of the Men of War belonging to Amsterdam, which are designed for the Mediterranean, have passed the Pampus, and have received their Sailing Orders to make the best of their Way towards the Coast of England. The rest of the Ships which are to compose that Squadron will be ready to sail in some Days, both from the Texel and the Maese. We have advice from France, that the Men of War which sailed lately from Toulon towards Roses, to Convoy thither a great Number of Vessels laden with Ammunition and Provisions for the French Army in Roussillon, met with a very great Storm in the Gulph of Lyons; that a great part of the Transports and Storeships were lost on the Coast of Languedoc; that the Men of War were driven by stress of Weather towards Certe, where they were in danger of being Shipwrecked.

Falmouth.

Falmouth, November 18. This Day put in here the Robert and Nathanie., John Kelly Master, and the Resolution, Arnald Bowers Master, both of London from Yarmouth, for Leghorne; and the Star Sloop of and for Dublin from Ostend, Thomas Lynch Master, who was taken on the 16th off the Lizzard by a French Privateer of fourteen Guns, and Ransomed.

Plymouth, November 19. Yesterday came in a Flushing Privateer, who hath taken and brought in the Amiable of Nants, of sixteen Guns, with Sugar, Cocoe and Indigo, from Martineco; she is English built, and supposed to be the Eugene of Bristol. This Evening came in the Rochester, with seven Merchant Ships from Newfoundland.

Dartmouth, November 19. This Afternoon is come into our Road the Nicholas of and for this Place, Captain Robert Newman Commander; the Mary Magdalen, Captain James Arnald Commander; the Holdsworth Galley, Captain Dyer Commander; and the Two Maries, Captain Hanaford Commander, all four from Newfoundland. Capt. Arthur Holdsworth, in the Mansell Galley, is likewise behind, but not yet come in sight.

Bristol, November 19. On the 17th came in the Bonnyvil, John Axford Master, in twenty four Days from Newfoundland; he came in Company with near one hundred Sail, twenty of which were bound for England under Convoy of the Rochester and Newport; the rest were bound for Portugal and the Streights.

Yarmouth, November 20. Yesterday came into this Road a Fleet of laden Colliers from the Northward, under Convoy of several of her Majesty's Ships, and with them part of the homeward bound Russia Fleet, who were separated from the rest off the North Cape. Her Majesty's Ships the Folstone and Advice's Prize, with divers Ships under their Convoy from Holland, came also Yesterday into our Road.

Deale, November 21. Her Majesty's Ship the Tilbury failed this Morning to the Westward. Here remain her Majesty's Ships the Boyne, Yarmouth, Restoration, Monk, Mary, Dover, Reserve, Tyger, Mary Galley, Charles Galley, Alborough, Fortune Storeship, Swift and Hound. The Outward-bound and the Transports are still here; and yesterday came down the Tuscan Galley for Leghorne.
