Hanover, November 25. N. S. The Court is not yet returned from the Goere; his Electoral Highness had a Fall from his Horse in Hunting, and Duke Erneit is indisposed by a like Accident. The Prince-Royal of Prussia went from thence on Saturday the 22d with his Princess, in order to return to Berlin. We hear from Wolfenbettel,

that his Czarish Majesty had sent the Order of St. Andrew to Prince Lewis, second Son to that Duke; and that it was believed the Marriage would be soon concluded between the Princess of Wolfenbettel, his second Daughter, and his Czarish Majesty's Son. The Minister who came hither from the Court of Holstein, is returned to Götterp. The Abbot Giardini is come hither from the Duke of Modena.

Brussels, December 1. N. S. The Advices we have here from Spain are only such as the French Letters of the 29th of November give us by the way of Vittoria. They tell us, that the Duke of Anjou remained still encamped on the 9th at Casafaxada, but that it was given out that they designed to March in three or four Days. They were in great Want of all Necessaries, and suffered extremely by the great and continual Rains. His Catholick Majesty's Army continued in the Neighbourhood of Aranjuez on the Tagus. There was a strong Garrison in Toledo, and a Detachment of Horse was posted at Madrid; so that it was believed the late Motions of our Troops were for the conveniency of Subsistence, and for the better securing the important Post of Toledo. A Body of Portuguese have appeared near Elvas, and another Detachment of the Troops of that Nation have made themselves Masters of Alcanices and Sanabria in the Kingdom of Leon. We have Reports here; that a great Tumult has lately happened in the Frontier Provinces of France on this side, occasioned by the heavy Imposition of the tenth Penny. The raising of that Tax meets daily with greater Difficulties, and causes a general Murmuring and Discontent throughout the whole Kingdom; so that some are of Opinion the Court will at last be obliged to desist from executing that Edict with Rigour, and find out some other Expedients to supply the pressing Necessities of their Affairs.

Hague, December 2. N. S. The Duke of Marlborough and the Prince of Savoy have since their arrival had daily Conferences with the great Pensionary, the Deputies for Foreign Affairs, and the Ministers of the Allies. They are concerting Measures for pushing the War with the utmost Vigour on all sides, in order to bring the common Enemy to the Terms of a safe and honourable Peace. The Matters which are under Consideration being of the highest Importance, make the Duke of Marlborough's Presence necessary here for some time longer. But the Baron de Bothmar, Envoy-Extraordinary to her Britannick Majesty from the Elector of Hanover, having received Orders to hasten his Departure for England, the Men of War which were sent to attend his Grace, are ordered to Convoy that Minister thither in the William and Mary Yacht. Several British General-Officers intend to make use of that Opportunity, and go over with the same Convoy. Monsieur de Bothmar designs to go on Board to Morrow, and will sail with the first fair Wind. The Men of War having seen the Yachts safe into the Thames, are to return immediately to Helvoetsluys, to Convoy the Duke of Marlborough, who hopes to be ready to Embark towards the

the end of the next Week; at which time the Prince of Savoy designs to be going from hence towards Vienna. The Advices we have received this Day from France agree, that the Movements his Catholick Majesty had made with his Army, which gave occasion to the Reports spread by the French, of his Retreat towards Catalonia, were only in order to post his Troops the most advantageously for maintaining their Winter Quarters in Castille; and that for the better Subsistence of his Forces, great Quantities of Corn were brought from the Manche and other Places, and Magazines were making at Toledo; which Place was well Fortified, and in a very good Condition of Defence. The Count de Savella, whom his Catholick Majesty has made Viceroy of the Kingdom of Valentia, had found the Dispositions of that People so favourable to the Interests of King Charles, that it was believed he would soon be Master of the City of Valentia, and of the rest of that Country.

*Bristol, November 22.* On the 19th came in her Majesty's Ship the *Hastings*, and under her Convoy the several Ships following, viz. the *Salisbury*, *Diamond Galley*, *Constantine Frigate*, *Mary Galley*, and the *Union Sloop*, all five from *Jamaica*; the *Boyle Frigate*, from *Barbadoes*; the *Magée*, from *Carolina*; the *Mermaid Sloop*, from *Newfoundland*; and the *Speedwell's Prize*, from *Madera*. Most of the above Ships came last from *Cork*, with five Sail of *Cork Vessels*. On the 20th in the Evening came in her Majesty's Ships the *Speedwell* and *Wolf*; the same Night came in the *Dover* and *Westbury Gallies*, both of this Place, from *Jamaica*. Yesterday came in the *Generous*, a Prize taken on the Banks of *Newfoundland*.
