Whereas a Representation duly made to Her Majesty in Council by the Secretary of State for the Environment that burials should be discontinued as hereinafter directed in St. George's Churchyard, Millom, in the County of Cumbria, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto, has, in pursuance of an Order in Council made the 15th day of November 1978, and duly published, been taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred on Her by section 1 of the Burial Act 1853 c. 134 and of all other powers Her enabling is pleased, by and

with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:

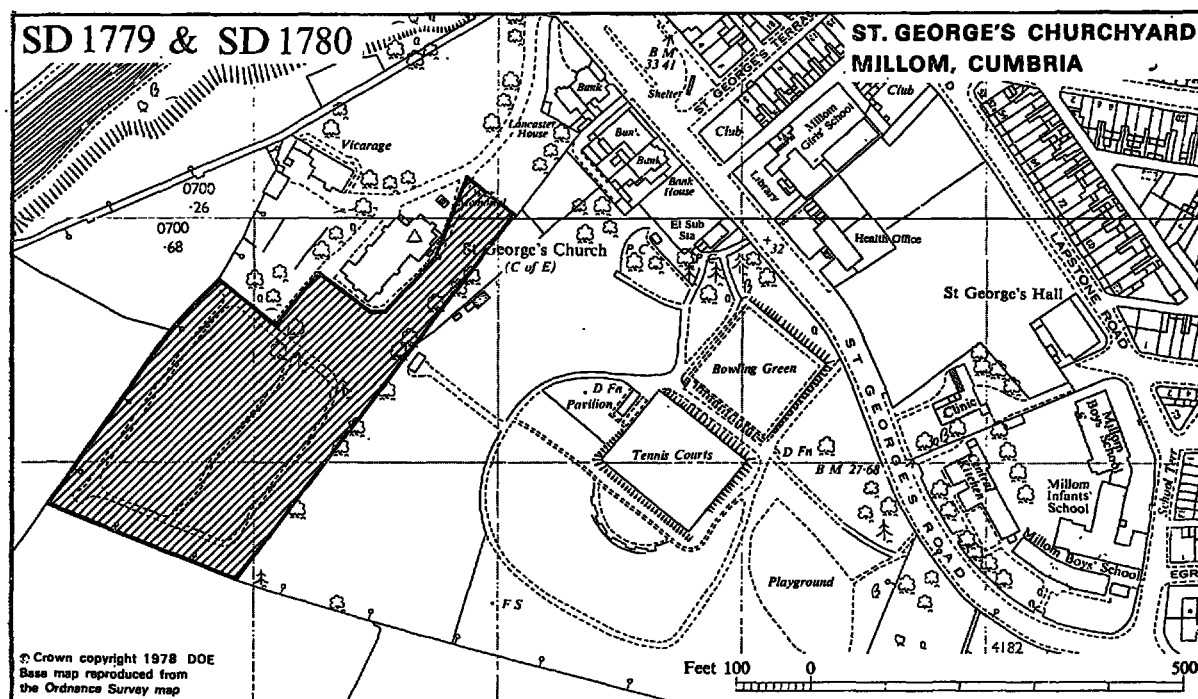
1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith in St. George's Churchyard, Millom, in the County of Cumbria shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that in any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. George's Churchyard, Millom, Cumbria) Order 1979.

Whereas the Secretary of State for the Environment, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the Parish of St. Barnabas, Erdington, in the City of Birmingham, ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act 1853 as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to Her Majesty in Council that burials should be discontinued forthwith in St. Barnabas' Churchyard, in the said Parish, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that in any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body

of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 9th day of March next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such Representation one month before the said 9th day of March.
