*Vienna, November 22. N. S.* The 12th Instant a Courier arrived here from England, being dispatched by the Count de Gallas, his Imperial Majesty's Envoy there, with an Account of the generous Resolutions her Britannick Majesty had taken to send a timely and powerful Reinforcement to the King of Spain. The Regiments of Dragoons of Vaubonne and Paté, consisting of one thousand Men each, are order'd to be in a readiness to embark for Catalonia. Lieutenant-General Paté, who is an Officer much esteemed, and a Walloon by Birth, will go with those two Regiments, and serve in Spain. The Report concerning the Election of the Abbess of Quedlinburg has pass'd the Aulick Chamber, and will be laid before the Emperor for his Approbation. A Diploma is preparing to creat Signior Albani, the Pope's Nephew, a Prince of the Empire; but as he is not to have any Principality granted with the Title, he will have neither Vote nor Session in the Diet of the Empire. That Minister pretends to be surprized, that the Prince Electoral of Saxony had received the Sacrament according to the manner of the Lutheran Perswasion, having flattered himself, during his stay in Saxony, with the hopes of that Prince's Conversion to the See of Rome.

*Lisbon, November 29. N. S.* We have not had any Expreß of late from his Catholick Majesty, which is attributed either to the badness of the Roads by reason of the great Rains, or to the Enemy's diligence in posting Guards at the Passages of the Rivers, to prevent our having any Communication with Castille; but we hear from other Hands, that the Duke of Anjou being informed that considerable Detachments had been made from our Army as far as Ciudad-Real and Almagro, towards the Source of the Guadiana, he had called a Council of all his General Officers, where it was debated whether they should undertake any thing against King Charles, before the Army separated and went into Winter Quarters. The Marquis de Bay pressed the making some Attempt, while our Army was weakened by Detachments, and not yet reinforced by any new Succours, whereupon it was resolved to March, and the Marquis passed the Tagus with his Cavalry at the Bridge of Almaraz, to join the Troops with the Duke of Anjou near Placentia. They then marched towards Talavera de la Reina, with an intent to oblige King Charles to quit all his Posts on this side the Tagus, but they found themselves obliged to stop at the River Alberche, where a Body of his Catholick Majesty's Forces were advantageously posted, and in a readiness to receive them. Besides, the River is of a difficult Passage, but more especially

in the Winter Season. The Enemy having thus failed of their Design, retired in order to go into Winter Quarters. The Marquis de Bay is daily expected at Badajoz, and five Regiments of Horse that were employ'd in that Expedition, are already returned to the Frontiers of Estremadura, and others are gone to Xeres de los Cavalieros. It is not yet known where the Duke of Anjou will take up his Quarters this Winter, but in all probability it will be at Valladolid. The King of Portugal has given Orders for the new Clothing his Troops, and for Recruiting both Horse and Foot, which is forwarding with Expedition, that it is hoped they will be early in the Field the next Campaign.

*Hague, December 5. N. S.* The several Provinces of this Government having given their Consent to forbid the Importation of certain Commodities from the Baltick Sea, and to oblige all Ships coming from those Parts to make their Quarantine, to prevent the spreading of the Infection from thence, the States General have published a Placard accordingly. The Dutch Fleet from Muscovy is arrived safe at the Texel. The French King's Edict, which has been talked of here for some time, is at last come out, prohibiting the Subjects of this Country to Trade any more with France, and ordering that no Passports shall be given to the Dutch Ships for the future. Particular Letters from France assure us, that his Catholick Majesty's Army keeps very exact Discipline in their Quarters in Castille, that the People at Madrid follow their Business as usual, without any Molestation; and that neither Churches nor Houses have been rifled there, as the Enemy have suggested. The City of Toledo is look'd upon to be so well Fortified already, that it would not be practicable for the Duke of Anjou to drive the Allies out of Castille, were his Army better and stronger than it is at present. And if the Duke of Noailles is disappointed in his Project, there is no doubt but that King Charles will have time to establish himself, and wait for the Succours which are sending to him. The Court of France, among their several Projects for raising Money, have got an Operator, who has undertaken to make Gold; he has been introduced to the King, and is now at work to perform the large Promises he has made.

*Falmouth, November 27.* Yesterday arrived the Queen Packet Boat in eight Days from Lisbon, Captain Culverden Commander, who reports, that the late Prize taken at Newfoundland was arrived there. Here is arrived also the Dolphin Galley of and for this Place, from the Canaries in twenty seven Days, Thomas Allen Master.

*Plimouth, November 28.* Yesterday arrived the Martin Galley of and for London, Captain Martin Commander, from the Canaries.

*Dartmouth, November 28.* Yesterday came in here the Sailor's Prosperity, a small Privateer of Guernsey. This Day came in the Flying Mercury, a Dutch Privateer of twenty Guns, and brought in with her, as Prize, a French Ship of about one hundred Tuns, from Martinico, laden with Sugar and Cocoa, which she took in the Channel.

*Bristol, November 29.* This Day came in the Society of Waterford, Robert Fagan Master, in twenty four Days from Lisbon. On the 25th Instant came in the Mary of Dublin, Alexander Hunter

Hunter Maſter, from Cadiz. Her Maſtey's Ships the Haſtings, Speedwell and Wolf are in Kingroad, with ſeveral outwardbound Merchant-men.

Whereas Information has been given of ſome ill Practices and Frauds committed by Perſons, who, under pretence of being ſick Seamen, have been brought to her Maſtey's Commiſſioners for taking Care of Sick and Wounded Seamen, in order to obtain Tickets for being ſent to London Hoſpitals, whereas they were not Seamen, but Strolers pick'd up in the Streets, and hired to perſonate Seamen: And whereas there is a Proſecution ordered by the ſaid Commiſſioners in her Maſtey's Court of Queen's Bench, againſt ſeveral Perſons for the ſaid Offence, theſe are to give Notice, that if any further Information can be given to the ſaid Commiſſioners, at their Office in Prince's Court, Weſtmiſter, in relation to theſe Abuses, or any other Practice of the like Nature, the Perſons who give the ſame ſhall meet with all due Protection and Encouragement.
