Coire, November 25. N. S. The Congress of the Heads of the three Leagues of the Republick of the Grisons, which was lately assembled here, have written a Letter to Mr. Manning, her Britannick Majesty's Secretary, complaining of several Grievances which they lye under from the Imperial Court, particularly relating to their Commerce with the Circle of Swabia, wherein, as it is alheig'd, they fusier Hardships, contrary both to the Hereditary Union, and the late Treaty for the Passage of the Troops of the Allies through their Country. The Imperial Envoy, Monheur de Greuth, had given them hopes of some Redress; but as the Gritons have hitherto found no effect of those Promises, they have applied again to her Britimick Majetty to repeat her interpolition at the Court of Vienna, to procure them Satisfaction in their just Demands.
