Notice is hereby given that, pursuant to section 277 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971, the Council of the City of Chester ("the Council") hereby gives notice that on 25th April 1979 the Conservation Areas above-mentioned were formally designated. The designations can be taken as a declaration by the Council that it wishes to see the Conservation Areas preserved and enhanced and a principal effect of the designations is to prevent the demolition of any buildings in the areas without the Council's prior consent.

The details of the areas affected are given below. In each case, the boundary of the Conservation Area is indicated by a thick black line on the plan which may be inspected during normal office hours at the offices of the undersigned. A copy of any plan may be provided at a small charge on application to the undersigned.

1. Handbridge Conservation Area

The area bounded by the River Dee in the north; the Queens Park suspension bridge and Ministry of Defence buildings at Queens Park and the rear curtilages of properties on the north side of Percy Road in the east, Appleyards Lane, the Water Tower and Overleigh Road in the south, and the General Cemetery eastern boundary to the west. The Conservation Area boundary is shown edged with a thick black line on the relevant plan as mentioned above.

2. Curzon Park Conservation Area

Curzon Park north to the junction with Earlsway including Gamon's Rough, Curzon Park south from the Hollies and Cornerstones to the Gambles, the north side of Hough Green as far west as Redland Close, the five easternmost properties on the south side of Hough Green, the copse between Lache Lane and Wrexham Road, Overleigh Lodge, the Dingle and General Cemetery. The Conservation Area boundary is shown edged with a thick black line on the relevant plan as mentioned above.

3. Elton Conservation Area

Ince Lane between Globe Farm and Manor Farm including Well Cottage. The Conservation Area boundary is shown edged with a thick black line on the relevant plan as mentioned above.

4. Dunham-on-the-Hill Conservation Area

Dunham-on-the-Hill from Bank House and Church View to Town Farm and High Corner. The Conservation Area boundary is shown edged with a thick black line on the relevant plan as mentioned above.

5. Waverton Conservation Area

Common Lane properties from Common Farm to cottages south of Church Cottages including Elm Cottages, Rose Farm, Church House and Church Farm Cottages. The Conservation Area boundary is shown edged with a thick black line on the relevant plan as mentioned above.

6. Ledsham Conservation Area

Ledsham village including Home Farm, Rose Cottage, Court Farm and Manor Farm. The Conservation Area boundary is shown edged with a thick black line on the relevant plan as mentioned above.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC PATH ORDER

TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT 1971, SECTION 210

The Derbyshire County Council (Ball Eye Quarry) Public Paths Stopping-up Order 1978

Notice is hereby given that the above-named Order made on 2nd February 1978 (hereinafter referred to as "the Order") was confirmed by the Secretary of State for the Environment without modification on 22nd May 1979.

The effect of the Order as confirmed without modification is to extinguish the public rights of way (more particularly described below) to allow an extension of Ball Eye Quarry:

Public Footpath No. 8 (Matlock Bath Ward) from its junction with Public Footpath No. 1 (Bonsall Ward) at Point B, GR 2837.5778, in a generally south-easterly, thence north-easterly, thence south-easterly direction to Point H, GR 2888.5773, a distance of 660 yards or thereabouts.

Public Footpath No. 1 (Bonsall Ward) from Point A, GR 2888.5773 and thence continuing in a southerly direction south-easterly direction to Point E, GR 2861.5763, a distance of 403 yards or thereabouts.

Public Footpath No. 59 (Bonsall Ward) from Point G, GR 2837.5769 in a south-easterly, thence north-easterly direction to its junction with Public Footpath No. 1 (Bonsall Ward) at Point C, GR 2849.5770, a distance of 150 yards or thereabouts.

That length of Public Bridleway created by "Stopping-up of Highways (County of Derby) (No. 2) Order 1970" from Point D, GR 2855.5771, at its junction with Public Footpath No. 1 (Bonsall Ward) in a generally easterly thence south-easterly direction to Point F, GR 2889.5751 a distance of 460 yards or thereabouts and create Alternative Highways in lieu as more particularly described below:

Alternative Bridleway, commencing at Point A, GR 2834.5783 and proceeding in an easterly thence north-easterly direction to Point I, GR 2868.5794 thence continuing in a south-easterly direction to Point H, GR 2888.5773 and thence continuing in a southerly direction to Point F, GR 2889.5751 a distance of 993 yards or thereabouts.

Alternative Footpath, commencing at Point G, GR 2837.5769 and proceeding in a northerly direction to Point A, GR 2834.5783 a distance of 163 yards or thereabouts.

A copy of the confirmed Order and the map contained in it has been deposited and may be inspected free of charge at the County Offices, Matlock (Room 108), between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Mondays to Fridays.

The Order will become operative when the County Council certify that the alternative line of path is to their reasonable satisfaction, but if any person aggrieved by the Order desires to question the validity thereof or of any provision contained therein on the grounds that it is not within the powers of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971 or on the grounds that any requirement of that Act or any regulation made thereunder has not been complied with in relation to the confirmation of the Order he may under section 244 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971 within 6 weeks from 8th June 1979 make application for the purpose to the High Court.

KENSINGTON AND CHELSEA ROYAL

TOWN AND COUNTRY AMENITIES ACT 1974

Notice is hereby given that the Council of the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea by a resolution passed on 9th May 1979, designated as a Conservation Area the area described in the Schedule to this notice in accordance with the provisions of section 277 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971.

The effect of designating an area as a Conservation Area is to preserve or enhance its character and appearance.

The demolition of all buildings is brought under control. Anyone wishing to demolish a building within the area must first apply for Listed Building Consent to the local planning authority for permission to do so.

In addition, anyone wishing to carry out work to any tree exceeding 75 mm in diameter in the Conservation Area (other than a tree which is the subject of a Tree Preservation Order) must give notice of their intention to the Council at least 6 weeks before the works are to be executed.
