Public Footpath Nos. 12 and 17, Lincoln

The Mendip District Council (Wells 17/26, Parkwood Estate) Public Path Diversion Order 1979

Notice is hereby given that the Mendip District Council confirmed the above-named Order on 5th June 1979.

The effect of the Order is to divert the existing line of footpath 17/26 which runs alongside the factory owned by Messrs. W. C. B. Clares Limited adjacent to the disused railway line at Parkwood Estate, Wells to a new curved line of approximately 40 metres radius for approximately 80 metres to the east from where it will then follow in a general north-west direction for 60 metres to rejoin the existing footpath.

A copy of the confirmed Order and the map contained in it has been deposited at the Council Offices, Wookey Hole Road, Wells, and may be inspected free of charge between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Mondays to Fridays inclusive.

This Order becomes operative as from 15th June 1979 but if any person aggrieved by the Order desires to question the validity thereof or of any provision contained therein on the grounds that it is not within the powers of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971 or on the ground that any requirement of that Act or any regulation made thereunder has not been complied with in relation to the confirmation of the Order, he may under section 244 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971 within 6 weeks make application for the purpose to the High Court.

Notice of Designation of Whitewell Conservation Area

Notice is hereby given that the Rutland District Council in pursuance of their powers under section 277 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971 have designated the Whitewell Conservation Area.

Commencing at a point to the west of the village on the northern side of the A606 the boundary runs north for a short distance and then east to the rear of two properties fronting the A606 known as The Cottage and The Retreat. From this point the boundary crosses Exton Road and proceeds in a generally easterly direction to the rear of Woodlands Farm before turning south and then east to include land and outbuildings associated with Home Farm. The boundary then runs in a northerly and then easterly direction to include the remainder of Home Farm, the Noel Arms and land immediately to the rear of the public house. At this point it proceeds in a south-easterly direction to include the neighbouring property, numbers 6, 7, 9, 10 and 11 Main Street and intervening land, but excluding the farm buildings associated with High Moor Farm. The boundary then runs diagonally in a south-easterly direction across the A606 before turning north-west to include a number of trees on the southern side of the road. Here the boundary proceeds in a generally southerly, westerly and then northerly direction to include Old Hall Farm and O.S. numbers 5164 and 5358. It then skirts the southern and western boundary of The Rectory before running along the southern side of Church Lane by St. Michael's Church. From this point the boundary crosses the former Edith Weston Road and runs west and then north to include a collection of farm buildings before crossing the A606. It then proceeds west along the northern side of the A606 returning to its point of origin.

The precise boundary of the Conservation Area is defined on Drawing No. 9/79, which may be seen during normal office hours at the Planning Department, Rutland District Council Offices, Catmose, Oakham.

In general the effect of designation will be to increase the degree of planning control which can be exercised by the local planning authority. According to the provisions of the Town and Country Amenities Act 1974 the demolition of most buildings in a conservation area requires permission from the local planning authority. In addition, the Act provides a measure of protection for trees in such areas and requires the local planning authority to formulate and publish proposals for the preservation and enhancement of the area.
