

# The London Gazette.

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London, June 19.

**T**His day Dr. Creighton, Bishop of Bath and Wells was solemnly consecrated at Lambeth with the usual Ceremonies, at which assisted the Bishop of London in the place of his Grace the Arch-bishop of Canterbury, not yet fully recovered from his late distemper, with the Bishops of Winchester and Ely, where an excellent Sermon was preached on the occasion, by Dr. Hill, Chaplain to his Grace the Duke of Ormond; after which, the Bishops, several of the Nobility, and many persons of Quality were entertained at a plentiful dinner.

Legorn, June 9. The 4th instant arrived here the Dutch Convoy of two men of war and five Merchant ships, and the same day the Olive branch richly laden from Smirna, leaving behind several Holland ships, one English ship, and one French ship, lading for several parts of Christendom. They write from Smirna, that the Viceroy intending suddenly to leave Candia had since February last laid an Embargo upon all vessels, which he had pressed to attend him.

This week arrived also the Owen and David, and five other English ships from Puglia laden with Oyls and bound for England, and may in 8 or 10 days depart hence under Convoy of the *Fersey* and *Centurion* Frigats. The Dutch Convoy may follow in 15 days for Holland.

The *Lady of Loretto*, a French ship arriving in 25 days from Alexandria, came thence in company with two ships of Messina homewards bound, one Polack, and one Bark for *Marseilles*, from whose company she was separated about 11 days before her arrival here. She left in the Port of Alexandria the *Conception* lading for this place with several other ships bound for *Candia*, *Marseilles*, *Venice*, *Majorca*, and six Turks bound for *Barbary*. Three days before her departure sailed thence eight ships and two Saichs bound for *Constantinople*, and the 26th past, on her return hither off *Fauigliana* she met with Seven Maltese Gallies, and the next day with the Great Dukes Squadron, which had not then met with any considerable adventure.

Genoa, June 11. Here is lately put in here a Bark, having on board 5 Italian slaves, which about three months before made their escape from *Argier*, and have since been wandering up and down the sea with various fortune.

Here are lately arrived three French ships from *Lisbon* laden with Sugar and Tobacco, and two Dutch men of war from the *Levants* homewards bound; here are also in Port the *Return* and the *Conclusion*, both of them English ships bound for *Zant*.

The Duke of this Republick has been lately much indisposed, but is now upon recovery.

The 9th instant according to custom, election was made by Lots of three Senators, viz. *Gio Baptista Zaogli*, *Carlo Pallavicino*, and *Gio Giacomo Monja*, who are to succeed as Governours, and of two others, viz. *Marco Antonio Salsi*, and *Hieronimo Rodino* to be Procurators of this Republick.

Our Convoy is safely arrived at *Cadix*, where the Gallions are suddenly expected.

From *Milan* they tell us, that the Duke d' *Osuna* the new Governour continues to receive the Visits and Compliments of all persons of the most eminent quality. He is very intent upon the advance of the publick interest,

endeavouring to ingratiate himself with the people by easing them from their payments; he has since his entry upon the Government confirmed all the Orders and Edicts of the Governours his Predecessors, especially those in which the state of the Church was any ways concerned.

The 25th past being the Dukes birth-day, the Officers of the Army, Ministers of State, and publick Officers appeared at the Court richly habited to compliment their Governour, as did also the Nobility and Ladies.

From *Turin* we are told, that the Duke of *Savoy* was gone to divert himself for some time at *Venaria* and *Rivoli*, and that he had named Signior *Bigliore* for his Ambassador Extraordinary to the Court of *Rome*, for which he was making preparation.

Dantzic, June 11. The 6th instant arrived here the Bishop of *Culme* the Vice-Chancellor of *Poland*, and with the usual solemnity received the Homage and Oath of Fidelity from this City, as he had done the 4th instant from the Magistrates of the City of *Thoren*; he was treated and entertained here with much civility upon the publick account, this people giving many testimonies of their satisfaction, and proclaiming it with the noise of their Cannon. The Vice Chancellor intended to be at *Warsaw* the 16th instant, and accordingly went hence to *Elbing*, where he is also to take the Homage of that place. The Provincial Diet of *Prussia* is broken up without any resolution, several of the principal persons who should have been concerned in the Assembly being absent so that they expect the Kings Letters to empower them to meet again.

Many of the other smaller Assemblies in the several Provinces and Palatinates have concluded it necessary to summon the *Arriereban* or publick Assembly in the field in Arms, protesting with much zeal against the French faction, and against such persons as have combined against the present Government; whereupon his Majesty has thought fit to dispatch his Circulatory and Universal Letters to all the Nobles, to acquaint them with the sense of the Dietines, and the necessity which obliges him to summon them to this publick Assembly for the preservation of the publick peace and safety of the Kingdom; giving them account also of the present state of affairs, and particularly, that the *Bassa of Silistria* had seized at *Bialogrod* a person of *Karnowsky*, his Envoy to the Cham of *Tartary*, that he was not assured of the intention of the Cossacks they having not yet sent their Deputies to Treat; that there was an eminent necessity of paying and recruiting the Army; that the posture of the Turks, Tartars, and others of their neighbors made it necessary to enter into some strict alliance with some potent Princes their neighbors; nor was the danger threatened from within the bowels of the kingdom to be despised, many Letters in *Cypher* being lately intercepted, written by several persons ill affected: His Majesty desiring that these Letters might take place as a double summons, and that they would prepare to meet in a warlike posture at such a place of Rendezvous as should in little time be appointed them by their 3d and last summons, where he promised to be personally present and ready to hazard his life for the good of his Countrey.

Venice June 14. By the way of *Zant* and other places we are informed, that the Grand Visier had fully resolved some time this Month of June to leave *Candia*, to meet the Grand Segi for his Master, and to attend him to *Constantinople*, who is in the mean while diverting himself in hunting and other diversilements, in which he employes near 30 thousand persons, which ar

Several ships are lately arrived at *Candia* laden with Timber and other Materials for building, the Turks being now Employed in repairing and Rebuilding the ruined City, and every where in the Country Cultivating and Improving th Lands.

Yesterday arrived here a ship laden with several Merchandises from *Smyrna*, where there were many other ships taking in their Freights for several Ports of *Italy*, the place being now plentifully furnished with Commodities from all the Turkish Dominions, where was also expected a Caravan from *Armenia*, which was reported to be far richer than those of former years.

The Squadron of *Corfairs* which were Cruising in the Seas about *Cerigo*, are gone thence for *Trippli*, supposed to have some apprehensions of a Squadron set out by this Republick for the security of our Trade.

On Wednesday last arrived here *Signior Valier* Governour of the three Islands, and on Thursday morning attended the Colledge with a numerous Train of his Friends, by the same ship which transported him, we have Letters from *Zant*, informing us of the arrival these of the Gallies and Gallies which are designed for the Levant, with instructions to clear those seas from all Pyrates, and to be in readiness to Obey such farther Orders as shall be sent them.

The Duke of *Rouen* is three days hence expected, and in little time the Duke of *Chaulnes* the French Ambassador.

On Wednesday the Resident from *Florence* had his Audience from the Colledge upon the Death of the late Great Duke his Master.

The Senate having considered of many ways and Methods of raising Moneys for the payment of the Publick Debts contracted in the late wars, have Ordered the sale of 1000 Officers in this City and *Terra firma*, every one of which may bring to the Publick, the sum of 4000 Ducats

*Brussels, June 25.* The Duke de *Villa Hermosa* having acquainted *Don Antonio de Cordoua*, the Lieutenant General, of his design of entering upon his Charge as General of the Horse; the said *Don Antonio* immediately issued out his Orders for the drawing of all the Horse which were quartered between this City, *Malines* and *Louvain*, to a place designed for their Rendezvous in a Plain about a League from this City, where they were accordingly drawn up in thir several squadrons the 17th instant in excellent Order to the number of about 3000, well armed and equipped: his Excellency about five in the evening appeared in the field, accompanied by *Cou t Marcin*, *Don Francisco de Velasco*, and a great Train of other Officers, visiting the several divisions, and complimenting their respective officers, where he received his Commanders Staff, and was proclaimed General of the Horse at the head of the whole body of Horse, with the usual Ceremonies, and afterwards called the troops to draw off in Order, the better to take a view of each Troop, and acquaint himself with the Officers.

The Constable of *Castile* expects suddenly to return for *Spain*, and has Ordered all persons that have pretention to any Moneys to put in their Claims, that so all his debts may be discharged before his departure.

From *Liege* we are told that upon a late difference risen between the Marquis of *Westerloo* and the Abbess of the Cloister of *Hocht*; The Country people have been summoned in to seize upon the Castle of *Peterschem*, which is the place Contended for, but the Marquis being in possession, is raising Souldiers and fortifying the Castle, intending to stand upon his Guard.

*Paris, June 25.* The King and Court is at present at *Versailles*, and Madam diverting her self at *St Clou*; great preparations are making at the Fort *St Sebastian* neer *St Germain*, where a considerable body of an Army is to encamp for this Summer, to be kept upon Duty and Exercise.

At *Thoulon* five men of war are equipping to attend *Monsieur de Nointel* into the Levant, with whom is also to embark the Turkish Envoy on his return homewards.

We hear not as yet of any good success of our Fleet before *Tunis*, but suppose they will attempt somewhat upon that place upon the arrival of the French Gallies, which are sent out to their assistance.

From *Cadix* we have news of the safe arrival of the Gallions, consisting of 18 sail, who are said to be returned home richly laden, to the great joy and satisfaction of *Spain*; as also that the Dutch Vice Admiral *Van Ghent* is with his Squadron of 10 men of war departed hence for *Sally* to settle a peace with that Port; which ended, he intends with the addition of 7 men of war, which were designed to be sent after him, to pass into the *Mediterranean*, to attend the motion of the Pyrats of *Argier*, who have much disturbed their Trade in those seas.
