TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACTS

BRADFORD CITY METROPOLITAN COUNCIL

TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT 1979

Notice is hereby given in pursuance of section 277 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971, as amended, that City of Bradford Metropolitan Council, as Local Planning Authority, after consultation with the West Yorkshire Metropolitan County Council have determined that the area of Little Horton roughly bounded by the University of Bradford, Chester Street, an area of Council development, the Nurses Home and Margaret McMillan College and more particularly shown on a deposited plan is an area of special architectural or historical interest the charter or appearance of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance and have accordingly designated the said area as a conservation area.

The effects of designating an area as a conservation area are as follows:

- (1) Where an application for planning permission for development of land in or adjacent to the conservation area is made to the Council and the development would, in the opinion of the Council, affect the character or appearance of the conservation area, the application will be subject to the special procedure in section 28 of the Act.
- (2) Any building within a conservation area other than a listed building, excepted building in section 58 (2) of the Act, and building excepted by the Secretary of State, must not be demolished without the consent of the Local Planning Authority.
- (3) Advertisements in a conservation area may also be controlled by the Local Planning Authority to avoid detracting from the appearance of the area.
- (4) Trees in a conservation area are also protected by the Act and any person doing any prohibited act against a tree will be guilty of an offence. This includes felling, lopping, topping, uprooting and wilful damage to trees. Trees of a certain size species or trees belonging to specified persons or bodies may be excluded by the Secretary of State.

Plans and details regarding this conservation area may be inspected during normal office hours at the office of the Chief Planning Officer, Jacobs Well, Bradford.

Footpath No. 47 (Danecourt) Diversion Order 1979

Notice is hereby given that on 23rd November 1979, the Council of the City of Cardiff confirmed the above-named Order.

The effect of this Order, as confirmed, is to divert that length of Public Footpath No. 47 running from a point B

on the north-east boundary of parcel number 7615, map reference 13867923, O.S. sheet ST1379, and continuing approximately 24 metres in a south-westerly direction, then approximately 114 metres in a north-westerly direction, and then approximately 26 metres in a north-easterly direction to a point A; to a straight line running from point B, as described above, approximately 112 metres in a north-westerly direction, to point A, as described below.

This Order becomes operative as from the date on which the Council of the City of Cardiff certifies that the alternative highway has been constructed to their reasonable satisfaction, but if any person aggrieved by the Order desires to question the validity thereof or of any provision contained therein on the grounds that it is not within the powers of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971, or on the ground that any requirement of that Act or any regulation made thereunder has not been complied with in relation to the confirmation of the Order, he may under section 178 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1962 within 6 weeks from 7th December 1979, make application for the purpose to the High Court.
