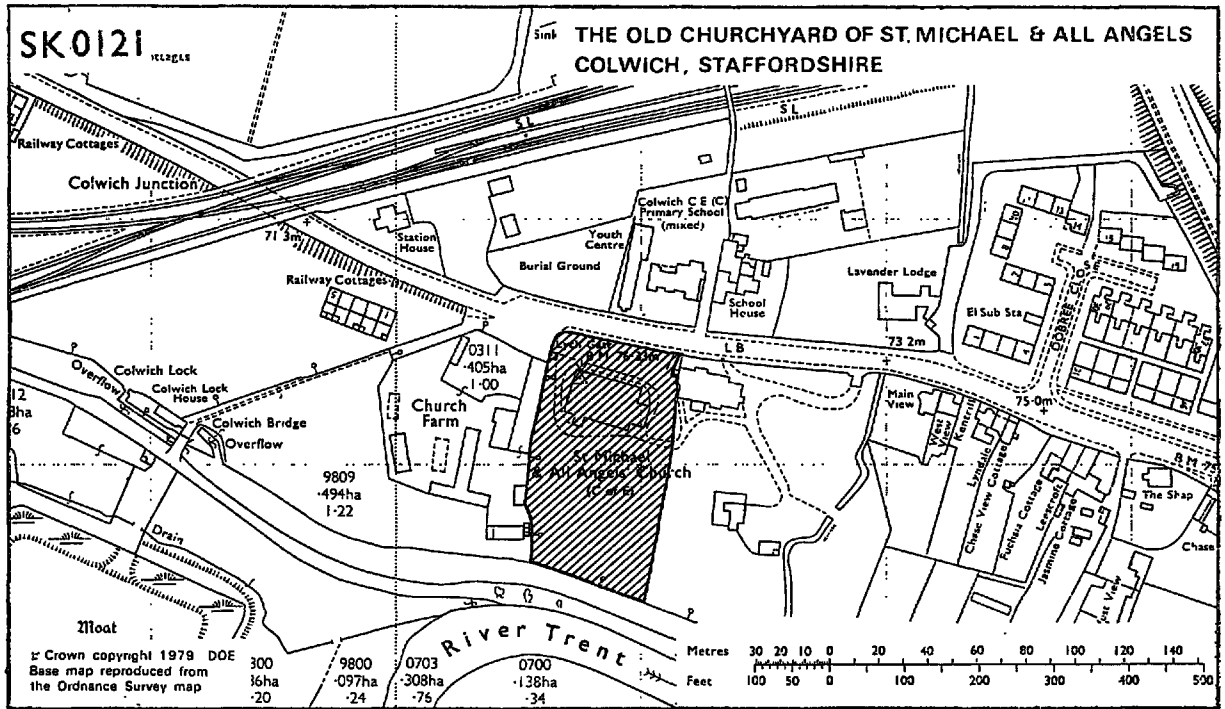
Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred on Her by section 1 of the Burial Act 1853 (1853 c. 134) and of all other powers Her enabling, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the Old Churchyard of St. Michael and All Angels, Colwich, in the County of Staffordshire, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (Old Churchyard of St. Michael and All Angels, Colwich, Staffordshire) Order 1979.

1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith in that part of St. Gregory's Churchyard, Weare, in the County of Somerset, which is shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that in any earthen grave now existing in the said part of the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. Gregory's Churchyard, Weare, Somerset) Order 1979.
