*Berlin*, January 31. N. S. On Thursday last Monsieur *Lith*, Envoy from the Czar of *Muscovy*, had a private Audience of the King of *Prussia*, to whom he deliver'd a Letter from his Master, containing an Account of the unexpected Rupture between the *Turks* and *Muscovites*; and acquainting his Majesty, that the Czar was preparing to leave *Petersburg*, in order to Command his Army in Person; and that he had given Directions for as many Troops as could be spared to March towards the Frontiers of *Turkey*, designing to leave no more than six thousand *Muscovites* in *Polish Prussia*, who, in Conjunction with the *Poles* and *Saxons*, would, he hoped, be sufficient to observe the Motions of the *Swedes* in *Pomerania*, especially since he did not doubt but that his *Prussian Majesty* would make good his Engagements, and that the several Powers concern'd, as Guarantees of the *Neutrality*, would take care to have their respective Quota's in a readiness to advance for the Preservation of it. They write from *Lemberg* of the 14th Instant, that they had Reports there that the *Ottoman Port* had propos'd to the Czar the following Conditions of Peace; To acknowledge King *Stanislaus*; To restore all the Places he had taken from the *Swedes*, since the beginning of the War; To give the King of *Sweden* Satisfaction for the Damages he has sustain'd; To Demolish *Asoph*, and other Places in his Possession on the *Black Sea*; To Release all the *Cossacks* that are his Prisoners, and procure *Caminieck* to be deliver'd up to the *Turks*. But these Letters add, that the Czar, instead of listning to these Proposals, has given reiterated Orders for the March of his Troops, and desired the *Crown-General* to admit of *Muscovite Garrisons* to be put into *Caminieck*, *Fort Trinity*, *Dubao*, *Lemberg*, and other Towns in those Parts. His *Prussian Majesty* receives Letters very often from the *Grand Chamberlain*, and

and does not fail to Answer them punctually: This, with the frequent Expressions of the great Consideration he has for that Minister, makes his Friends entertain Hopes the King may have some Thoughts of recalling him. The Committee appointed to examine into the late Administration of the Grand Marshal, have not sign'd the Sentence given against him, as had been desir'd of them, alledging, that though they had by their Report declar'd him Guilty of Mismanagement in his Offices, yet they never thought that he deserv'd the Punishment which has been inflict'd on him. But Monsieur Wipperman, who was the Grand Marshal's chief Agent, having obtain'd his Pardon, has undertaken to Charge him with Matters more Criminal than any that have been hitherto produc'd, and which he pretends will justify all the Proceedings against him.

Brussels, February 8. N. S. Our Letters from Saragossa of the 18th past advise, that the Duke of Anjou set out from thence two Days before on a Visit to his Dutcheffs at Calahorra, where the Prince their Son was indispos'd. The Duke of Vendome continu'd at Saragossa, where he is confin'd by a Fit of the Gout; but it is said, that the Duke of Anjou's Forces were to March towards the Cinca, on which River, and on the Ebro, the Enemy pretend to be able to Canton them, and that their head Quarters are to be at Cervera. But it is believ'd the Garrisons Count Staremberg has left in Balaguer, the Castle of Ebadilla near Balastro, and that of Mirabel on the Ebro, will, together with the Excursions of the Miquelets, render that Design impracticable. These Letters add, that General Staremberg having distributed his Forces into Winter Quarters in the Places above-mention'd, and at Tarragona, was set out for Barcelona. Letters from Paris of the 2d Instant pretend still to say, that the Duke of Noailles, having repair'd the Damages done to the Batteries and Approaches by the late Rains, was continuing the Siege of Gironne; and by Reports industriously given out, and large Lists which are band'd about, of the numerous Squadrons and Battalions which they have in those Parts, they amuse the People with Schemes of forming the Siege of Barcelona, and driving the Allies out of Catalonia before their Succours can arrive; but as this depends very much on the taking of Gironne, in which, it is probable, they have been disappointed; and that they have neither a Fleet, nor Artillery, Ammunition, or Provisions enough for such an Enterprize, it is look'd upon as a Project altogether impracticable. And there are Advices which say, that the Duke of Anjou's Forces are extremely weakned, and scarce make five thousand Horse and four thousand Foot; but the Duke d'Aguilar, who is first Minister, and has undertaken the difficult Task of Recruiting and Compleating the Army, was going to Madrid, in order to take the most effectual Measures for that purpose. The Marshal d'Artagnan arriv'd the 1st Instant at Arras; but we don't yet hear that Monsieur de Villars is set out from Paris.
