*Dantzick, February 4. N. S.*

**T**HE Grand Treasurer has received Advice from the Crown-General, that the Sultan had dispatch'd a Messenger from the Port, by way of Asoph and the Black Sea, with secret Instructions to the Czar of Muscovy, who, according to our Letters from Riga of the 22d of the last Month, was expected there in a few Days with Prince Menzikow, who was to command a Body of forty thousand Men, all regular Troops, in Livonia. They write from Berlin, that his Prussian Majesty proposeth to reside for some time in Prussia, where he hopes his Presence will in some measure relieve the low Condition of that Kingdom. They say they have a Specification at Berlin, by which it is made appear that the Grand Chamberlain, Count Wartemburg, whose Estate was in no degree considerable before he came into Employment, had found means to enrich himself to the value of Five millions and two hundred thousand Crowns during his Administration. Our Letters from Dresden advise, that pursuant to the Sentence lately pronounc'd against Monsieur Pfingstein, that Minister had receiv'd Orders to prepare himself for Death, notwithstanding the great Intercessions that had been made in his behalf. The Swedes pretend to have undoubted Assurances, that the Person seiz'd not long since in Pomerania had undertaken to Poison King Stanislaus, and that another Emiffary was sent with the like Design against the King of Sweden at Bender, from whence we are advised that General Meyerfeldt was arrived there, and found his Swedish Majesty in good Health; but these Letters make no mention of any warlike Preparations, nor when the King propos'd to set out from that Place.

*Hanover, February 13. N. S.* All our Advices from the North make mention of the frequent Contests between the Poles and Muscovites, on account of the Contributions demanded by the latter. They write from Warsaw, that a Diet was held there on the 26th of the last Month, but the Nobility refusing to consent to some new Impositions, they immediately separated, without coming to any Resolution. These Letters add, that the Muscovite Troops are every where preparing to march, but require great Sums of Money from all the Towns in which they have been quarter'd, before they quit them. They write from Lemberg of the 21st of January, that the Garrison of Caminieck had been reinforced with three thousand Men; and provided with all Things necessary for a vigorous Defence, in case the King of Sweden should think fit to attack them. In the meantime the Apprehensions of a Rupture begin to lessen in those Parts, the Tartars having countermanded their Parties, and desisting at present from all Acts of Hostility. Notwithstanding which, several great Detachments under the Command of General Wideman are in Motion on the side of

Muscovy, in order to secure the Passes on that Frontier. The Polish Artillery is sent from Belzath to Sokal, under a strong Guard of Dragoons; and the Officers commanding the Troops quarter'd in Podolia and Volhinia, have received Orders to assemble their Forces, and advance towards the Frontiers. An Express from the Port is arrived at Lemberg, and is sent to the Marshal of the Crown with some Dispatches relating to the present Situation of Affairs. Our Advices from Lublin agree with those from Lemberg, as to the Disposition of the Turks to a Rupture; and add, that it was thought the Imperial and Venetian Residents at Constantinople had perswaded them to desist from it; but of this we must wait for a Confirmation, since all our Advices from the North are so often subject to vary.

*Brussels, February 16. N. S.* Our Letters from Paris of the 13th advise, that the Duke of Noailles's Brother arrived at Court the 11th, and brought an Account, that the Forts of Gironne were surrendered the 31st of the last Month, pursuant to the Capitulation, and that the Garrison was Conducted to Barcelona. Monsieur Planque, who brought the first News of the Reduction of the Town, has been gratified by the King, who has likewise made him a Marshal de Camp. According to Monsieur de Noailles's Relation, General Staremberg has possed the greatest part of his Troops in Barcelona and Tarragona; and the Miquelets having ruin'd the Country, and removed all the Provisions and Forage, the Duke de Noailles's Army suffer extremely for want of Necessaries, and have no other way to be supplied but out of France. These Letters add, that a considerable Enterprize had been projected in a late Council of War, and that Marshal Villars set out immediately to make the necessary Dispositions for the Execution of it. It is thought here, that they were in hopes of surprising Lisle, but miscarried upon the Discovery of a Design laid to set Fire to the Magazines belonging to that Garrison, and which, had it taken Effect, was to have favour'd them in their Attempt.

*Hague, February 17. N. S.* The States-General and the Council of State have issued out new Orders for the perfecting the Magazines in Flanders, and for the levying in Brabant the Funds granted by the States of that Country, to the end the Allies may be in a Condition to take the Field in good time, and disappoint the Designs of the French. Our Letters from the Frontiers advise, that Marshal Villars arrived the 15th Instant at Cambrai, and that a considerable Number of Troops were already Canton'd near Arras. They write from Namur, that the Artillery for the late Elector of Bavaria's Army is order'd to be in a readiness by the 20th of March, and that all the Villages between the Sambre and the Meuse are to provide a great quantity of Straw by the 20th of this Month. We hear from Vienna, that Count Caroli has made his Peace with the Emperor, and that they are now in hopes of putting a speedy end

to the Troubles in Hungary. It is said the Castle of Muran has surrender'd to the Imperialists, and that the Town of Caschau will soon be obliged to do the like. The Turks have demanded a Passport for an Aga, who is to assure his Imperial Majesty, in his Master's Name, that the Fort has no Design to act in any wise contrary to the Treaty of Carlowitz. The States are raising two millions of Florins more by way of Loan, for which they are to pay Ten per Cent. for twenty Years, and sink the Principal. The Ministers of the Allies have deliver'd Monsieur Palmquist, the Swedish Envoy, a new Project for the Preservation of the Neutrality in the North, whereupon an Express has been sent to his Swedish Majesty at Bender, and another to the Senate in Sweden, on that Subject.
