

Brussels, May 2. N. S. Letters of the 30th past from Tournay advise, that the Confederate Army march'd that Morning from the Neighbourhood of that Place to Orchies, and was to pass the Scarpe to Day, and encamp on the other side that River, leaving Douay on the Rear. The French Army extends with the Left to Arras, and the Right to Oisy, where the Marshal de Villars has his Head Quarters, with the Rivers Scarpe and Senet in the Front; the former of these Rivers being turn'd from Vitry into the latter at Arleux, in the same manner as was practis'd last Year during the Siege of Douay. Eleven Squadrons of the Prussians that are on their March from the Meuse, pass to Day through the Neighbourhood of this City in their way to the Grand Army.

Plimouth, April 22. Yesterday was forced in here by contrary Winds a Ship of Dunkirk, carrying about thirty Guns and one hundred Men, under pretence that she belong'd to London, and was bound for Ireland; but her Majesty's Ship the Warwick soon seiz'd her as Prize: She had four or five Captains on Board, of several Nations.
