Genoa, Sept. 3. N. S.

ON Sunday last, two British Men of War sail'd from hence, with several Vessels under their Convoy, for Barcelona. Four Gallies, belonging to this State, that have been cruising for some time on these Coasts for the Security of our Trade, are return'd into Port; but are preparing to sail in a short time to Corfica. We have receiv'd Advice from Marseilles, importing, that an Ordinance had been publish'd there, requiring an Observance of the Regulation made in the Year 1704, relating to the taking of Neutral Ships; by which Ordinance, the Owners of such French Privateers as shall act contrary to it, are oblig'd to make good all the Damages any Neutral Ships shall sustain by their means. We have Letters of the Sixteenth of August from Barcelona, advising, that Signior Spinola, the Pope's Nuncio, was conducted the Day before to a publick Audience, to which he was attended by a numerous Train, and a splendid Equipage. The Day these Letters were dated, the Court receiv'd Advice by an Express from Marechal Staremberg, That the Confederate Army having been form'd near Igualada was advanc'd within three Leagues of the Enemy, who were encamp'd in three Lines between Cervera and Tranaxel, so that they speedily expected to hear of an Action. Signior Niolas Durazzo is making the necessary Dispositions for his Departure from hence to the French Court, whither he is appointed to repair as Minister from this State.

Venice, Sept. 5. N. S. The Senate having been inform'd that some Disputes are lately risen between the Subjects of this State, and the Turks on the Frontiers, they have resolv'd to send two Persons of their own Body into the Levant, in order to enquire into the Grounds of their Differences, and endeavour to adjust them. Our Letters of the 25th past, from Naples, advise, that the Confederate Squadron, consisting of four British, and two Dutch Men of War, appointed to Convoy some Tartans, laden with Powder and other Warlike Stores for his Catholick Majesty's Service in Spain, was to sail the Day following to Leghorn, and proceed from thence to Barcelona. A British Privateer, call'd the Diligence, is put into Naples, after a Cruise of nine Months; during which time, he has taken one and twenty Prizes. Prince Hercolani, the Austrian Minister, is set out from hence, on his own private Affairs, for the Bolognese, he having an Estate in that Country. They write from Rome, that it was thought the Promotion of Cardinals, which has been so long expected, and is earnestly sollicit'd by the French, will still be defer'd till the Month of November.

Hamburg, Sept. 15. N. S. They write from Pomerania, that the Suedes, who lay entrench'd under the Cannon of Stralsund, retir'd into that Fortrefs, upon the Approach of the Danish and Saxon Army, having first sent their Horses, being Five thousand in number, into the Ile of Rugen. The Garrison of Stralsund is said to consist of Eight thousand

Men, and is plentifully furnish'd with every thing necessary for a long Defence. K. Stanillaus, who propos'd to remove into the Island of Schonen, has alter'd his Design, upon an apprehension, that the Passage thither would be something dangerous, on account of the Danish Fleet, and is likewise retir'd into Rugen. The Danish Admiral Count Guldenlew, having received Intelligence, that the Suedes were preparing to make a Descent, either on Zeland or Jutland, has disappointed them, by Bombarding the City of Malmogen, in Schonen, but without doing any other Damage, than destroying the Vessels intended for the Descent; by which means, he has made them unable to put that Design in execution. The Danish Artillery is arriv'd at Bukou near Rostock, where they are landing it with great Diligence, in order to send it from thence to the Army in Pomerania. The Sickness being considerably abated at Copenhagen, the Minister of Denmark residing here has been directed to send no more Surgeons thither. Though the Suedes have been very industrious to keep the Infection out of their Dominions, it is reported here with great Assurance, that it begins to appear in Schonen. The King of Poland has sent for Commissaries out of Saxony, who will be directed to regulate the Contributions in Pomerania on the same Foot that they were demanded by the Suedes whilst they were in that Electorate.

Hague, Sept. 18. N. S. On Monday last, the States-General receiv'd an Express from the Army, advising, that the Garrison of Bouchain having been refus'd a Capitulation, which they at first insisted upon, agreed to Surrender themselves Prisoners of War; which they accordingly did on the Fourteenth: and we hear they are to be Conducted into this Country. Yesterday the Earl of Albermarle arriv'd here from the Duke of Marlborough, being sent by his Grace to concert with the States-General what is farther to be done before the Conclusion of the Campaign. His Lordship having been in Conference with the Pensionary, and in the Assembly of the States, will return on the Twentieth to the Army near Bouchain; for the Reduction of which Place, publick Rejoycings have been observed here, by Order of the States. The French being under some Apprehensions for Quesnoy and Maubeuge, have destroy'd all the Forage that was near those two Places, as well as that in the Neighbourhood of Cambray, and from thence as far as St. Quintin. They have likewise order'd all the Cattle in the open Country to be remov'd into the Towns, with an Intention to deprive the Allies of all means of Subsistence in those Parts: Whereupon the States have directed a great Quantity of dry Forrage to be sent towards Flanders. Our Letters of the Twelfth from Leewarden advise, that the States of Frize, have already conferr'd on the young Prince of that Name, all the Honours and Employments his Father enjoy'd among 'em; and it is not doubted but the same will be done by the Province of Guelderland. We have at length receiv'd Letters directly from the Muscovite Army, confirming the Peace with the Turks, which
