Venice, Sept. 11. N. S.

ON the Ninth Instant, two large British Gallies, called the Brice and Briad, arriv'd here laden with Sugar, and other rich Commodities, from Lisbon. The Masters of these Gallies report, that they left Sir John Jennings with the Confederate Fleet under his Command at Port Mahon, in a readiness to Sail for Barcelona. They write from Rome, that Signior Erba, Vice Legat of Bologna, will be appointed Nuncio in Poland. He is a Milanese by Birth, and of the Family of the late Pope Innocent XI. of which he, and Don Livio Odescalchi, are the only Persons remaining. And as some one of that Family has a just Pretension to a Cardinals Hat, it is believ'd, that this Employment is conferr'd upon him, in order to promote him to that Dignity. Signior Spinola, the present Nuncio in Poland, will be made Auditor della Camera, which will likewise give him a Title to the Hat; and Signior Bentivoglio, a Ferrarese, is to be sent Nuncio into France; but it is thought none of these Nominations will take Effect, till after the Election of an Emperor, at which time there will be a Promotion of Cardinals. A Courier arriv'd at Rome on the Twenty-second past, with Dispatches from Francfort, and was soon after sent back with Instructions to Signior Albani, relating to the Ceremonial.

Berlin, Sept. 19. N. S. On Wednesday the Ninth Instant, the King of Prussia went to Oranienburg, where he continued till the Twelfth; at which time his Majesty return'd to Charlottenburg. Monsieur Hoffman, one of the King's Physicians, has presented a Memorial to his Majesty, wherein he acculeth Monsieur Guldenheim, the chief Physician, of having prescribed several things to the late young Prince of Prussia, which hasten'd his Death: Whereupon Monsieur Guldenheim hath requir'd to have this taken into Consideration, and that Monsieur Hoffman may be oblig'd to a suitable Compensation, in case he shall not be able to make good the Satisfaction brought against him. His Majesty has hitherto taken any particular Notice of this; only, he appears somewhat displeas'd at Monsieur Hoffman's Conduct. A Book has been publish'd by a Gentleman of Silesia, setting out the Pretensions the Reform'd in that Country to be admitted, and included with the Lutherans in the Treaty of Alt Rastadt; and giving account of what has been done in their favour by the Queen of Great Britain, and other Protestant Princes. At the Request of the Author, several Copies of this Book have been sent to his Prussian Majesty's Ministers at Francfort; where, though the Pretensions of the Protestant are not thought to be of much Importance as to deserve a separate Article in the Imperial Capitulation, yet Count Schaffhausen is order'd to solicit the Austrian Ministers in behalf before the Election, and to desire the Consent of the other Protestant Electors to do the same. This Day the King went from Charlottenburg to Landsberg; from whence his Majesty in-

tends to remove on Monday next to Goltz, near Cutrin. The Design of this Progress is said to be the Shooting of the Stag, the usual Diversion of this Season in that Country: But as the late Rains have laid the greatest part of the Ground thereabouts under Water, it is thought his Majesty proposeth, before his Return, to have an Interview with the Czar of Muscovy, who is lately arriv'd in those Parts, and his Allies the Kings of Denmark and Poland. The two last of these Princes join'd the Seventh Instant with their Armies, which encamp'd about half a Mile from Straßund; but, we do not yet hear of any Progress they have made since.

Hamburg, Sept. 22. N. S. They write of the Sixteenth Instant, from the Camp before Straßund, that the Saxon and Danish Ministers are frequently in Conference, and that the King of Denmark has at length been prevail'd upon by his Polish Majesty, to consent to the Siege of that Place, which is now resolv'd, and it is believ'd, that in a Day or two the Forces will block it up more closely; but as it will be impossible to invest it, whilst it preserves a Communication with the Isle of Rugen, the King of Denmark has given Orders to Count Guldenlew, to detach ten Frigats from the Fleet under his Command, in order to cut off that Communication: And a Commissary is arriv'd at Rostock, with Directions from his Danish Majesty, to seize all the Vessels in that Port, and send 'em towards Rugen, to be employ'd in the Reduction of that Place. The King of Denmark goes often out in Person, to view the Situation of the Town, notwithstanding the great Fire from the Enemy. On the Thirteenth the Artillery of the whole Army was discharg'd, on Account of the Peace concluded between the Czar of Muscovy and the Turks; and the King of Poland was entertain'd at Dinner by his Danish Majesty on that Occasion. They write from Lemberg, that a Courier pass'd through that Place on the Thirty-first of the last Month, being sent Express from Constantinople, with the Ratification of the Treaty. These Letters add, that the Muscovite Infantry is said to be in a very good Condition, notwithstanding the many Hardships they have undergone, but that the Horse have suffer'd extremely. Our Letters from Copenhagen make no mention of the Numbers that dy'd there some Weeks past, but say in general, that the Mortality continues daily to abate. The Elector of Hanover has granted to the Jews of Altena, Permission to pass through his Provinces, to the Fair of Leipfick, provided they engage not to carry with them any Commodities transported from Copenhagen, or any part of Zeland, within these six Months past, declaring at the same time, that he will cause all those to be Hang'd, that shall be found acting contrary to this Regulation.

Hanover, Sept. 22. N. S.
