Venice, Sept. 18. N. S.

ON Saturday last the Senate had under their Consideration a Letter from the Venetian Resident at Milan, wherein he acquaints them that the King of Spain had resolv'd to recall Prince Hercolani, and order him to leave this Place without demanding an Audience; and, that his Catholick Majesty would likewise direct the Ministers of this State to depart from Vienna, Naples, and Milan. This Affair having been duly weigh'd, it was unanimously resolv'd in the Senate; to acknowledge that Prince for King of Spain, giving to his Majesty all the Titles that are due to him as such, and to receive him in that Quality whenever he shall pass through the Territories belonging to this Republick. We are advis'd from Rome, that the Pope has receiv'd a Letter from his Nuncio at Barcelona, wherein that Minister gives an Account of his kind Reception there, and of the great Esteem and Respect he observ'd in his Catholick Majesty for the Person of the Pope, and his Zeal for the Papacy. Several Congregations have been lately held at Rome, in one of which, the Pope assist'd on Friday last, with Thirteen of the most considerable Cardinals. The Consult held for four Hours, and the Resolutions taken, having been first Engros'd and Seal'd up, were left in the Hands of Cardinal Marefcotti. We are here under some Apprehensions for Signior Mocenigo, the Bailo at Constantinople. Our Advices from Dalmatia tell us, he is confin'd by the Turks; but others say, that upon a suspicion that they had a Design to imprison him he fled into the House of Sir Robert Sutton, the Queen of Great Britain's Ambassador at the Port. Tho' these Reports vary, and are uncertain, yet forasmuch as the Senate have receiv'd no Letters from him for a considerable time, we fear there are some Grounds for them. A British Privateer has taken a French Tartane laden with Oil, and sent her into this Port.

Hanover, Sept. 29. N. S. We have lately had Letters from Bender, confirming the Particulars we receiv'd before from Vienna and Constantinople, without informing us whether his Suedish Majesty is dispos'd to accept of the free Passage stipulated for him in the late Treaty of Peace, or if he is rather inclin'd to continue longer at Bender, in hopes of obtaining some further Assistance from the Port. In the mean time we hear, the Czar of Muscovy has declar'd, that he will not Surrender Asofph whilst that Prince is suffer'd to continue in the Grand Signior's Dominions; nor think himself oblig'd to grant his Majesty a free Passage into his own Territories, if the Guard appointed to Conduet him exceeds Five thousand Men. Upon Advice that his Czars Majesty is arriv'd at the Baths at Carlsbadt, the Hereditary Prince of Muscovy is set out from Wolfenbuttel, in order to wait upon his Father.

They write from Pomerania, of the Eighteenth Instant, That the Danes had taken, in the Road of Carlseron, Thirty Transports, design'd to receive the Suedish Cavalry on Board. These Advices are confirm'd by Letters of the Twentieth from Rostock, which add, that the Allies were inclinable to attack the Isle of Rugen, and were making the necessary Dispositions accordingly; but, that it wou'd require a Months time to prepare ev'ry thing requisite for such an Attempt.

Camp near Bouchain, Octob. 1. N. S. We continue to work on the Reparations of Bouchain with all possible Diligence: But as the vigorous Attack of that Place has occasion'd extraordinary Damages in the Fortifications, the Engineers do still require near Twenty Days to put them into a Posture of Defence; during which time, we are in no Danger of suffering for want of Forage, the neighbouring Country having already brought in the Quantities they propos'd to St. Amand and Marchienne; and the States of Flanders have sent Deputies to acquaint his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, that they will supply what shall be further necessary for the time we shall be oblig'd to continue in this Camp. The Enemy having sent considerable Detachments of Horse to Maubeuge, and other Posts along the Sambre, Ten Squadrons were detach'd Yesterday from our Army to Mons, in order to assist the Troops in Garrison there, in protecting the Country of Haynault, and to prevent any Design the Enemy may have form'd to interrupt our erecting Magazines on that side. Yesterday a Party of our Horse brought in a Hundred Prisoners taken near Monsieur d'Abergotti's Entrenchment on the other side the Senfer.

Hague, Octob. 2. N. S. On the Twenty-ninth of the last Month, the Earl of Albermarle, and Monsieur Hymen, were in Conference with the States-General. His Lordship propos'd to have set out in his Return to the Army Yesterday in the Morning; but his Departure is put off for some Days: So that it is not certainly known when he will leave this place. Monsieur Vegelin, one of the Deputies of the States, was expected here from the Army: But his Journey hither has been countermanded; and the Sentiments of this State, relating to the Disposition of the Forces this Winter, and the intended Operations in the Spring, have been sent from hence by an Expres to his Grace the Duke of Marlborough. We are advis'd from Heusden, a Place about Twelve Leagues from hence, that Two thousand Men belonging to the Garrison of Namur, lately made an Incurfion into those Parts, and having pillag'd some Villages, they took several Hostages with them as a Security for the Payment of a hundred and fifty thousand Crowns demanded of the Inhabitants in the open Country. They write from Francfort, that there are two or three Points of Importance remaining to be regulated, before they can proceed to the Election of an Emperor; however, as the several Parties concern'd, use all the necessary Di-

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
