Leghorn, Sept. 21. N. S.

THE Confederate Squadron from Naples continue still here, but will proceed to Barcelona, so soon as one of the Men of War, which sprung her Masts, is refitted. These Ships will take under their Convoy, several English and Dutch Merchantmen, together with four Ships belonging to the State of Genoa. The Marquis d'Albici is arriv'd here from Florence, being appointed to go to the Court of France, in Quality of Envoy from the Great Duke of Tuscany. They write from Florence, that the Abbot de Civri is arriv'd there from Paris, and will shortly continue his Journey from thence to Rome, where he is appointed to act as Auditor of the Rota for France. The Venetians have nominated the Procurators Lezze and Pisani, to go in Quality of Ambassadors Extraordinary from that Republick, and compliment the King of Spain, upon his arrival at Milan, to which place they are repairing accordingly.

Vienna, Sept. 26. N. S. It being expected that the King of Spain is upon the Point of departing from Barcelona, the Count de Paar set out from hence on the 22d, in order to wait on his Majesty upon his Arrival in Italy; and several other Persons of Quality are preparing to follow him. The Marquis d'Ariberti, Envoy from Spain to the Republick of Genoa, is making the necessary Preparations for his Majesty's Reception there; and they are likewise fitting up the Ducal Palace at Milan on the same Occasion. The Senate of Venice have appointed two Ambassadors to repair thither, and Congratulate his Majesty, in the Name of the Republick, upon his Arrival at that Place. The Baron d'Imhof, Envoy Extraordinary from the Court of Wolfenbuttel, will continue at Barcelona, in order to be assisting to her Catholick Majesty in the Council of State during the King's Absence. Monsieur Nedezky, one of Prince Ragotzky's principal Adherents, and his Envoy to the Czar of Muscovy, arriv'd here some time since, in order to make his Submission; and was very favourably receiv'd by her Imperial Majesty.

Dresden, Sept. 26. N. S. They write from the Camp before Stralsund, that all the necessary Preparations were forwarding there, in order to make a Descent on the Isle of Rugen; without the Reduction of which Place, it is thought all Attempts upon Stralsund will be ineffectual. In the mean time the Suedes, who are apprehensive of their Enemies Designs, are putting themselves in a Condition to make a very vigorous Defence. King Stanislaus, who was said to have retir'd to the Isle of Rugen upon the Approach of the Confederate Army, is still in Stralsund, from whence he makes frequent Sallies on the Troops that lie before it. It is reported here, that there will be an Interview, towards the End of the next Month, between the Kings of Denmark and Poland, and his Czarish Majesty. Our Letters of the Nineteenth from Warsaw advise, that some Turkish Ambassadors are arriv'd at Caminieck, and have demanded of the Grand Treasurer of the Crown, a Protection for their Persons, and the usual Subsistence. The Sub-

ject of their Commission is not yet known; but it is believ'd they are instructed to propose a Peace between the Kings of Poland and Sueden, of which we shall be more fully inform'd after the Audience they are to receive of the Palatine of Maure, and the Field Marechal of Lithuania. General Janus, having obtain'd Leave for six Months from his Czarish Majesty, has left the Army, and is speedily expected in Silesia. These Letters add, that the Palatine of Kiovia, who has committed great Disorders in his Excursions in the Palatinate of Lemburg, and the adjacent Parts, is gone to wait on the King of Sueden at Bender. Our Advices from that Place are very doubtful as to the Intentions of his Suedish Majesty: some Letters assuring us, that he was set out from thence under a small Guard, and others affirming, that his Majesty resolv'd to continue there this Winter, and endeavour to induce the Port to espouse his interests more effectually the next Spring. It is certain that the Janisaries are forming some Designs against the Grand Vizir, in which they are encourag'd by the Cham of Tartary, who is much offended at his Proceedings in relation to the Peace concluded with the Czar of Muscovy.

Frankfort, Octob. 1. N. S. On the Twenty-fifth of the last Month the Elector Palatine arriv'd here; and on the Twenty-seventh a Courier came Express from Italy, with Letters to his Electoral Highness, importing, that the King of Spain was preparing to sail from Barcelona. Count Sinzendorf having been to confer with the Prince of Savoy, is gone to Vienna, from whence he will proceed to Italy, in order to wait on his Catholick Majesty at his Arrival there. The Elector Palatine has been visited, since his Arrival, by the Electors of Mayence and Treves, as well as by all the Ministers of the absent Electors. Signior Albani, the Pope's Nephew, has lately receiv'd new Instructions from the Court of Rome, and continues to make pressing Instances in Favour of the late Electors of Cologn and Bavaria; but there is no Probability of his succeeding, either in that Affair, or his other Pretensions, which he has urg'd with great Zeal in behalf of the Pope, his Uncle. It having been propos'd to quarter twelve Regiments of Foot, and six of Horse, this Winter in Bavaria, the Count de Sinheim is arriv'd here from thence, with Orders to solicit, that a less number may be sent into that Duchy; which being much impoverish'd, will be unable, without many Hardships, to subsist so great a Body of Forces. They write from Spire, that a great Sum of Money has been brought thither for the Payment of the Army belonging to the Empire. The French suffer extremely for want of Forage; for which Reason, the greatest part of their Cavalry is sent from the Lines of Lauterburg towards Hagenau and Stralsbourg. All the Towns and Villages situate on this side the Rhine, are order'd to furnish daily a certain Quantity of Hay, Straw, and Oats, for the use of the Forces under the Command of the Prince of Savoy; which being to be deliver'd at Philippsbourg, will be conducted from thence in Waggons to the Army.
