A PROCLAMATION.

**W** Hereas Our Parliament stands Prorogued to the Ninth Day of this Instant October, We, with the Advice of Our Privy-Council, do hereby Publish and Declare, That the said Parliament shall be further Prorogued on the said Ninth Day of this Instant October, to Tuesday the Thirteenth Day of November next ensuing: And We have given Order to Our Keeper of Our Great Seal of Great Britain to prepare a Commission for Proroguing the same accordingly. And We do hereby further Declare Our Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall on the said Thirteenth Day of November be Held and Sit for the Dispatch of divers Weighty and Important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burghes, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby Required and Commaunded to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Thirteenth Day of November next ensuing.

Given at Our Court at Windsor, the Seventh Day of October, 1711. In the Tenth Year of Our Reign.

**Genoa, Sept. 20. N. S.** Four Palaces are preparing at this Place, for the Accommodation of the King of Spain and his Retinue, his Majesty being expected here from Barcelona, towards the End of this Month: and it is thought that there will be an Interview between the King and his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy, at some Place belonging to this Republick; soon after his Majesty's Arrival. Yesterday a Review was made of the Genoese Troops, that are appointed to attend his Catholick Majesty from hence to Novi. The Army which serv'd this last Campaign in Piedmont have pass'd the Mountains; but part of the Forces are order'd to remain, for some time, at Flet, Lombardoro, and other adjacent Places, the better to observe the Enemy, and prevent their making any great Detachments to Catalonia. They write from Madrid, that Count Bergeick was arriv'd there from Corella, and had brought with him several Artificers out of Flanders, with an Intent to regulate and improve the Manufactures of Spain. Two Tartans, that sail'd lately with the Flotilla from Cadix, parted from thence eight Days after, off the Canaries, from whence they were continuing their Voyage, with a fair Wind, for New Spain. These Tartans return'd the Fifth Instant to Cadix, where they report, that they had receiv'd Intelligence at Sea, that Monsieur du Caffé was safely arriv'd with his Squadron at Carthagena, and was on the Point of returning for Europe with the Galeons, which they expect at Cadix towards the End of the next Month. It is reported here, that six French Men of War

are cruising off the Hight of Lisbon, in order to intercept the Fleet expected from Brasil. Signior Vincent Durazzo, our late Doge, having finish'd the Term of his Government, which he has admistr'd to the universal Satisfaction of the People, was on the Fourteenth Instant conducted to his House with a general Cavalcade of the Nobility, according to the usual Forms; and on the Seventeenth Signior Francis Imperiali was chosen to succeed him.

**Milan, Sept. 22. N. S.** We are making all the necessary Preparations for the Reception of His Catholick Majesty, who is speedily expected at this Place, in his Passage through Italy into the Empire. We are advis'd from Barcelona, that both Armies continue in their former Posts, the Enemy endeavouring all they can to avoid an Engagement. The French have lately seiz'd several Persons, who are accus'd of a Design to set Fire to their Magazines of Ammunition; to which, they say, they were engag'd by large Promises from General Starenberg. The Duke of Anjou's Court continues at Corella, it being not yet known when that Prince will remove to Madrid. He has lately dispos'd of several considerable Employments; in which, regard has been particularly had to such as have appear'd on all Occasions to be most zealous in his Service.

**Cologn, Octob. 23. N. S.** On the Twenty-eighth of the last Month the Dutch Resident, Monsieur Bilderbeek, having receiv'd Advice of the Birth of the young Prince of Nassau, Hereditary Governour of Fritzeland; that Minister gave a very magnificent Entertainment to several Persons of Quality residing here, on that Occasion. On Sunday last the Prince of Hesse arriv'd at Eon, and pursu'd his Journey from thence to Cassel the Day following. They write from Hamburg, that on the Twenty-fourth of the last Month, a Party of Two hundred Horse having been detach'd from the Danish Camp near Wisnar, to get Intelligence, fell in with a Body of Three hundred Suedes, belonging to the Garrison of that Place, and after an hot Engagement, wherein many were slain on both Sides, they forc'd them to retire under the Cannon of the Town. Monsieur Puttendorf, who Commanded the Danes was mortally Wounded on this Occasion, and carry'd Prisoner into Wisnar; and Lieutenant-Colonel Reichel, who had the Command of the Suedish Party, is likewise Dead of his Wounds.

**Whitehaven, Octob. 5.** Yesterday the Friendship and William and Mary, both of this Port, arriv'd safe from Virginia, but last from Belfast: The Ships left the Cape of Virginia about ten Days after the last Fleet, and had forty Days passage to Ireland. Three light Colliers return'd from Dublin the same Tide.

**Plymouth, Octob. 7.** Yesterday Sail'd the Judith and John and Mary, both for Guernsey. This Day pass'd by this Harbour, the Newcastle, Guernsey and Sweepstakes, and under

der their Convoy about thirty Merchant Ships for Barbadoes; they were join'd from this Place, by five or six Sail of Ships for Offend. Came in the Cicilia of this Place, Nicholas Perdue, from Barbadoes.

*Dartmouth, Octob. 7.* This Evening, between five and six of the Clock, pais'd up to the Eastward, a Fleet of Ships of about forty-four or forty-five Sail, some small distance off our Harbour: A great many of them seem to be Ships of War, and one of them wore a Flag at the Maintop-mast-head, which, as well as we could discern with our Glasses from the Shore, is a Red Flag. They are suppos'd here to be the Lisbon Fleet, or that from Canada. There is in Torbay a Dutch Man of War, which brought the Topsham Ships from Holland, and a Flushing Privateer.

*Cowes, Octob. 8.* Here's now passing by to the Eastward, three of Her Majesty's Ships, and seven Merchants; but the Wind blows so hard, that no Boats can go off to know what they are.

*Deal, Octob. 9.* Her Majesty's Ships the Tilbury and Swallow, Sail'd this Morning toward the River. Last Night came in hither Her Majesty's Ships the Newcastle, Guernsey, and Sweepstakes, and under their Convoy about forty Sail of Homeward-bound in six Weeks from Barbadoes. The Lisbon and Turkey Fleets are just now come in hither.

*Whitehall, Octob. 11.* Her Majesty has been graciously pleas'd to grant the Dignity of Baronet of the Kingdom of Great Britain, unto Bibye Lake, of the Middle-Temple, Esquire.
