#### GLANFORD BOROUGH COUNCIL

##### TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT 1971

##### *Barton-upon-Humber Conservation Area*

Notice is hereby given in pursuance of section 277 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971 that the Glanford Borough Council has designated an extension to the Barton-upon-Humber Conservation Area.

In addition to the previously designated areas the extended Conservation Area now includes the following: The western side of Pasture Road up to and including No. 23; Soutergate; parts of Marsh Lane including the industrial buildings fronting Marsh Lane; Queens Avenue but excluding properties and curtilages fronting Butts Road; all properties and curtilages on Newport Street and Fleetgate; Maltby Lane; Finkle Lane; parts of West Acridge up to and including No. 32 on the northern side and up to and including No. 25 on the southern side; Westfield Road up to and including No. 48 on the northern side and up to and including No. 25 on the southern side together with the length of Holydyke between its junctions with Fleetgate and Ferriby Road.

A further extension to the Conservation Area has been designated to include the whole of the recently extended Baysgarth Park and the property fronting Brigg Road known as Park Cottage.

The effect of designation is that special attention should be paid to the preservation and enhancement of the character and appearance of the Conservation Area. In particular controls are applied regarding the demolition of buildings where owners are required to apply to the council for Listed Buildings Consent to demolish any buildings or parts of buildings situated in the Conservation Area. Control is also imposed in respect of the display of advertisements and the felling, topping, lopping etc. of trees within the areas. Penalties apply in the event of violations against this control.

A map showing the Barton-upon-Humber Conservation Area may be inspected at the Planning Department, Cary Lane, Brigg, during normal office hours or at the Library

in Holydyke, Barton-upon-Humber, during normal opening hours.

#### NEWCASTLE-UNDER-LYME BOROUGH COUNCIL

##### NOTICE OF PUBLIC PATH ORDER

##### TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT 1971, SECTION 210

*The Newcastle-under-Lyme Borough Council (Footpaths at Birchenwood, Kidsgrove) Public Path Diversion Order 1982.*

Notice is hereby given that the above-named Order (hereinafter referred to as "the Order") made on 8th October 1982 is about to be submitted to the Secretary of State for confirmation or to be confirmed by the Borough Council of Newcastle-under-Lyme (hereinafter referred to as "the Council") as an unopposed Order.

The effect of the Order, if confirmed without modification, will be to divert the existing routes of the following lengths of public footpaths over the Council's reclamation site at Birchenwood, Kidsgrove:

- (i) A length of public footpath commencing at a point immediately to the north of the old Potteries Loop line railway cutting and running in a north-easterly thence north-north-easterly direction for a total distance of 345 metres and comprising part of Footpath 26, Parish of Kidsgrove (290 metres to the parish boundary) and part of Footpath 13, Parish of Newchapel (55 metres from the parish boundary);
- (ii) A length of public footpath commencing at the junction of Footpath 28, Parish of Kidsgrove with the said Footpath 26, and running thence in a generally northerly direction for a total distance of 255 metres and comprising the whole length of the said Footpath 28 (110 metres to the parish boundary) and part of Footpath 9, Parish of Newchapel (145 metres from the parish boundary);
- (iii) A length of public footpath commencing at the junction of Footpath 29, Parish of Kidsgrove with the said Footpath 28 and running thence in a generally north-north-easterly direction for a total distance of 260 metres and comprising the whole length of the said Footpath 29 (45 metres to the parish boundary) and part of Footpath 10, Parish of Newchapel (215 metres from the parish boundary);
- (iv) Part of Footpath 25, Parish of Kidsgrove commencing at its junction with the said Footpath 26 and running in an easterly then north-north-easterly direction for a distance of 275 metres.
- (v) A length of public footpath commencing at the junction of Footpath 27, Parish of Kidsgrove with the said Footpath 25 and running thence in a north-north-westerly direction for a total distance of 200 metres and comprising the whole length of the said Footpath 27 (160 metres to the parish boundary) and the whole length of Footpath 106, Parish of Newchapel (40 metres from the parish boundary);

to the line of a new length of footpath, having a minimum width of 2 metres and a total length of 995 metres, running generally around the southern, eastern and western boundaries of the said reclamation site of the Council, as described hereunder in sections:

- (i) Commencing at the before-mentioned point on the said Footpath 26 immediately to the north of the old railway cutting and running thence in an east-south-easterly direction, adjacent to the northern boundary of the cutting, for a distance of 265 metres, then in a north-north-easterly direction for a distance of 170 metres to a point where it crosses the said Footpath 25;
- (ii) Continuing from the said Footpath 25 in a north-north-westerly direction for a distance of 195 metres to a point where it meets the said Footpath 106 and crosses the said Footpath 13;
- (iii) Continuing from the said Footpath 13 briefly in a north-north-westerly direction then in a north-north-easterly direction, parallel to the western boundary of the old Newchapel Mineral Line, for a total distance of 150 metres, then in a west-south-westerly direction
