Barcelona, November 21. N. S.

THE Duke of Argyle has for several Days been very ill of a Fever, which seized him with so much Violence, as obliged him to quit the Camp at Igualeda, and come to this Place; where the Remedies he has taken have proved so successful, that he is now pretty well recovered.

Riga, December 19. N. S. Our Magistrates two Days ago gave a magnificent Entertainment to the Czar of Muscovy and his Consort, with which they were well satisfied. Their Majesties went from hence yesterday Morning to Petersbourg, by the way of Pernel and Revel. The Czar himself has deferred giving his Answer to the Requests made to him by this Town 'till the 13th of January next, when their Deputies are to attend him at Petersbourg.

Florence, December 15. N. S. On the 8th of this Instant, upon the arrival of a Courier from General Ubaldini, who was appointed by the Great Duke to treat with General Zumjungen, the Grand Prior del Rene went to confer with him concerning some particular Points, in which, it is said, he received Satisfaction. By a Vessel which came to Leghorn on the 9th, there is advice, that the Squadron detached by Sir John Jennings to Final, with Orders to take on Board the Imperial Recruits in that Port, and carry the same to Barcelona, was safely arrived there; and that the Admiral was sailed with the rest of the Fleet for Port Mahon. We hear that Auditor Anteno, is appointed by the Great Duke to go to Milan, and receive the Investiture of Sienna from his Imperial Majesty.

Venice, Dec. 18. N. S. The Senate endeavour to send a Supply of Men, Money and Ammunition into the Levant, where the Motions of the Turks make them very uneasy. The Admiral Correro is order'd to sail for Corfu, and join the Fleet. Signior Albani, Nephew to the Pope, arriv'd here on the Eleventh, and Lodges with the Nuncio. He has received the Visits of Prince Ercolani, Embassador of the Emperor and several Persons of Quality. He sets out on Friday for Rome, by the way of Urbino. They write from Rome, that the Pope had prohibited a Book call'd *Artes Jesuiticae*, and permitted the Jesuites to Print a sort of Defence of their Proceedings in China. There are some new Differences arisen between that Court and the Court of Portugal, occasion'd by the Pope's command to the Bishop of Macao, a Subject of the King of Portugal, to answer for his ill Behaviour towards the Cardinal de Tournon, which Proceedings his Portuguese Majesty will not allow of. The General Steinau, who has Commanded all the Venetian Forces for the five last Years, has lately ask'd Leave to quit his Employment. The Senate have by an Authentick Instrument acknowledg'd his Services, and made him a

The Pope upon the Death of Signior Cafarelli, who was Governour of Rome, has named Signior Scotti Auditor of the Rota, by Birth a Milanesé, to that Government, which Promotion is very agreeable to the Nobility. The Differences between the Court of Rome and the Duke of Savoy, are not yet Accommodated, but seem rather to encrease, his Royal Highness having issued Instructions in order to those Persons being Absolved, who were some time since Excommunicated by the Bishop of Alexandria.

Francfort, December 30. N. S. All the Plenipotentiaries of the absent Electors had Audience of his Imperial Majesty on Saturday last. His Majesty yesterday Treated the Electors of Mentz, Triers, and the Elector Palatin with great Magnificence. The Emperor's Departure for Vienna is put off 'till the Eleventh of the next Month, upon which it is fixed. His Majesty will in the mean time receive the Homage of this City with the usual Formalities.

Brunswick, Jan. 1. N. S. The Duke of Wolfenbuttel is gone from hence to wait upon the Emperor at Frankfort. We have Advice that Lieutenant-General Rantzaw, who Commands the Danish Troops before Wismar had battered the Place with great Violence for Forty-eight Hours, and thrown several Bombs into it, which put the Magistrates into such a Consternation, that they sent Deputies to request a suspension of Arms for two Days, but it was refused them.

Hague, January 3. N. S. Here is advice, that the Duke of Savoy has named the Count de Maffey, who is expected here from England, Monsieur Mellarede, who is now in Germany, and the Marquis del Borgo, who designs to go from hence to Utrecht on Tuesday or Wednesday next, to be his Plenipotentiaries in the Congress of Peace to be held at that Place.

Plymouth, Dec. 30. Yesterday came in the Delight from the Eastward, and the Stratham for the East-Indies. This Day sail'd the Falmouth, Bonadventure, Mary-Gally, and Dunwich, for Spithead; the St. Anthony for London, and Hoast-Gally for Amsterdam. Come in the John and Mary from Guernsey, with Salt for this Place.

Dartmouth, Dec. 30. Yesterday came in here the Mary of and from Belfast, with Butter for Rotterdam. The Dutch Privateer with her Prize from Martineco, the Fortune-Gally for the Coast of Barbary, and the Dutch Doggers from Ireland, are still detain'd here by contrary Winds.

Yarmouth, Dec. 31. On the Twenty-ninth came into our Road several Ships from Norway, bound for London, one of which falling foul of another, came ashore; and this Day another of that Fleet coming in, ran aground on the Sands. Her Majesty's Ships the Pearl and Fox, with several Merchant-Ships under their Convoy from Holland, came in this Day.

Deale, Dec. 31. Here are Her Majesty's Ships the Roebuck and Gibraltar; as also the Marlborough, Kent, Mary, and Recovery, for the East-Indies; the Lyon for Virginia, the Samuel for Antegoa, the Mary for Carolina, and the Carleton for Ireland.
