They write from Frankfurt, that Count Zinzendorf has prepar'd a very magnificent Equipage, and will come hither accompanied by Monsieur Consbruck, one of the first Ministers of his Imperial Majesty. We are assur'd from Constantinople, that the Grand Vizir is actually deposed, but that it will not be determin'd who shall succeed in that Employment, untill it appears whether or no the Czar will execute the Conditions of the late Treaty. The Dutch Convoy which set Sail from the Brill some Days ago, in Company with two English Yachts and seven Merchant-men, has been driven back thither by the late violent Storm that has been in these Parts.

Deale, January 5. The Carleton Frigate, the Phoenix, the Pellican, the Sea-Nymph, and Bonita, sail'd Yesterday Afternoon to the Westward. But Her Majesty's Ships the Oxford, Bristol, and Blanford, with the four Ships for the East-Indies, and the rest of the Outward-bound as last mentioned, are all still here.

Plymouth, January 6. Yesterday came in the York, with a French Privateer of twenty-four Guns. This Day came in the Berwick, with two Tin Ships from Iowey. Also this Day sail'd the Brother and Sister of this Place for Bristol.

Cow's, January 7. The Ships that were performing Quarentine at the Mother-banks, are this Day sail'd to the Westward, Wind at E. N. E. The Dolphin Brigantine, of and for Boston, sail'd this Day to Spithead, to join the Convoy going to the Westward.
