Frankfort, Jan. 20. N. S. The several Electors and Ministers that attended at the Coronation of his Imperial Majesty, are upon their departure homewards. On the Fifteenth of this Instant the Elector of Treves went privately from hence for Coblenz the Place of his Residence; and the same Day the Troops of the Elector of Mentz, that had attended the Emperor out of this City, came back hither, and immediately march'd for their own Country. On the Sixteenth the Count Dhona, the Ambassador of the King of Prussia, Elector of Brandenburg, and the Baron de Gortz, Ambassador of the Elector of Brunswick and Lunenburg, parted hence for the Courts of their respective Princes. Upon the Seventeenth the Baron de Frise, Ambassador from the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony, set out for Dresden; and the same Day his Electoral Highness of Mentz came back from Aschaffenburg where he had treated his Imperial Majesty very magnificently; and this Morning left this City under a triple discharge of all our Artillery, and is on his way for Hoffheim, near Hochst, where his Highness will for some Days divert himself with Hunting. The Troops which Prince Eugene of Savoy had sent hither, at the request of our Magistrates, to remain in this City, during the Election and Coronation of the Emperor, will return this Week to Andau. The Count de Wertheren, Ambassador of Saxony, who is gone to Pomerania by the King of Poland's Order, is expected back here in a few Days; from whence he will proceed to Utrecht, being Nominated as the Plenipotentiary of his Polish Majesty to assist at the Conferences for a General Peace, which are to be held there.

Hague Jan. 26. N. S. On Saturday last Count Sinzendorf was in Conference with the Grand Pensionary; after which, a Courier belonging to the Emperor was dispatch'd to Great Britain; as were two others the next Morning, one for Vienna, the other for Milan and Naples and so on to Barcelona. The same Day the States of Holland unanimously agreed to pass the Lottery for Twelve Millions, the Town of Leyden having at last consented to it, and that of Amsterdam having taken upon themselves to subscribe one half of the Sum intended to be rais'd. On Sunday the Twenty-fourth Instant, Monsieur Metternich arriv'd here, being empower'd by the King of Prussia to assist as first Plenipotentiary of that Prince at the Treaty of Peace; as likewise did Baron Singerling, who is named to be third, on the part of his Imperial Majesty. Monsieur Vander Dussen, and Monsieur Gollinga, the one being chosen Plenipotentiary by the Province of Holland, the other by that

of Friseland, set out this Day for Utrecht. The States of Holland, who separated Yesterday in the Afternoon, will re-assemble in a few Days. We expect, with great Impatience, the Mails that are due from England. The Peregrine, Henrietta, and Mary Yachts, wait for a Convoy to come from thence; and Monsieur Borsele, Envoy Extraordinary from the States to the Queen of Great Britain, being now in a Readiness, will go on Board the former, as soon as any such Convoy shall arrive.

Utrecht, January. 26. N. S. On Saturday, the Twenty-third of this Instant, the Plenipotentiaries of the Allies had a Conference together, at which they drew up and agreed to a Project of a Regulation, to be observ'd by the Ministers during the Congress; which having been since communicated to the French Plenipotentiaries, they return'd the said Project, having made some Alterations, the Reasons of which they explain'd. The British and Dutch Plenipotentiaries have, for these three Days last past, had long Conferences; and this Morning Monsieur Buys went from hence to Amsterdam, with an Intention to return again on Thursday. The Day agreed on to begin the General Conferences, is Friday the Twenty-ninth of this Instant, N. S. and afterwards they will be regularly held on Wednesdays and Saturdays, at Ten in the Morning. Messieurs Vander Dussen and Gollinga came hither this Evening, and have notify'd their Arrival to the British Plenipotentiaries. The Count de Martini, the King of Prussia's first Plenipotentiary for the Treaty of Peace, pass'd through this Place on Saturday last, in his way to the Hague. He was to see several Houses, and at last fix'd upon one, and is expected back again every Day.

Hague, January 29. N. S. Since the Arrival of an Express from the Court of the Elector Palatine, the Imperial Ministers have had frequent Conferences with Count Efferen, the Envoy Extraordinary of his Electoral Highness. Count Tarouca, Ambassador from the King of Portugal, and Monsieur Metternich, Plenipotentiary of his Prussian Majesty, have made the necessary Preparations in order to repair from hence to assist on the part of their respective Masters at the Treaty of Peace. Upon Wednesday last, Monsieur Matueof, Ambassador from the Czar of Muscovy, had a Conference with the Deputies of the States-General. Letters from Brabant advise, that Twelve hundred Men of the Garrison of Valenciennes, had form'd a Design to surprize Three hundred of ours in a Post belonging to Marchienne; but being timely discover'd, they retir'd, having been disappointed of their Enterprize.

Utrecht, January 29. N. S. On Wednesday the Twenty-seventh Instant, the British Plenipotentiaries visited Messieurs Vander Dussen and Gollinga, two of the States Plenipotentiaries, and Monsieur de Dellared, one of the Duke of Savoy's, who came hither the Morning before, and immediately notified their Arrival to their Lordships, whose Visits they likewise return'd the same Day. The States of this Province were Yesterday assembled here, and the Regulation agreed to by the Ministers to be observ'd during the Congress, was communicated to them.

The Ministers of the Allies at this Place hold frequent Conferences, in order to preserve the good Union and Harmony which all along subsisted amongst them.
