Lubon, December 18. N. S. An Advice-boat arriv'd here on the Sixteenth Instant, in fifty Days, from Bahia, which is the Bay of Todos les Santos upon the Coast of Brazil, and brings an Account how the French, under the Command of Monsieur du Guey Trouin, by the favour of a Fog, entred the Port of Rio de Janeiro, on the Twelfth of Sep-tember last, with sixteen Men of War. The Portuguese Admiral made what Resistance he could; but searing lest four Men of War and some Merchant-men should fall into the hands of the Enemy, thought fitting to fet Fire to them, and retire into the Town of St. Sebastian, which was Defended by the Governour till the Twenty-first of the same Month; in which time, the Inhabitants took the opportunity of retiring up into the Country with the richest of their Essets. It is thought here, that the French will not be able to continue in this Place for want of Provisions. Since the Arrival of this News at Lisbon, frequent Conferences have been held between the Ministers of the King of Portu-gal and the Ministers of the Allies, and particularly of those of the Queen of Great Britain, and the States-General.

Venice, January 19. N. S. We have receiv'd Letters, that Monsieur Rasponi, who had carried the Red Hat to the Cardinal Albani, was return'd from Urbino, with Don Charles and Alexander Albani, the Brothers of that Prelate. The Pope went Yesterday to visit Don Horatio Albani, his Brother, who is at present indisposed; and this Morning has sent several Persons of Quality to attend the new Cardinal, who is to make his publick Entrance into that City within a Day or two. The Duke de Zagarola, the Cardinal Palavicini, and the Prince Borghese, have made him very large Presents towards surpissing out his Equipage

furnishing out his Equipage.

Berlin, Jan. 16. N. S. The Countess Cosell pass'd by this Town in order to return for Dresden. The Queen is expected here to day from Grabow, and the Prince of Anhalt Dessaw will attend her, to be present upon the Coronation-Day, that will be celebrated with the utmost Magnisteence. Major-General Span, who is to be install'd as Knight of the Prussian Order, arriv'd here some days ago, and the Prince of Nassau Dellenburg has sent one of his Gentlemen to represent his Person on that Ceremony.

Hanover, January 19. N. S. The Advices from Constantinople of the first of December import, that

the Grand Vizir having continued at the Head of the Army for some time, when it was expected that he should have attended the Sultan to have given an Account of his Proceedings, his Enemies had taken an Opportunity to repretent to the Grand Signior, that he was wanting in his Duty, and that Affairs had not been transacted with such Sincerity between him and the Muscovites, as became the great Trust reposed in him. The Cham of the Tartars, the Musti, and the Aga of the Janizaries, went so far as to accuse him of ill Practices; but they proceeded no farther than to have him Depos'd, and his Goods Confiscated, but not to touch the Life either of him or any of his Creatures, which in that Empire has always been usual upon the like Occasiors. These Letters add, that the Aga of the Janizaries had been advanced to the Dignity of Grand Vizir, and had made his Entrance into Constantinople. The Sultan having fent for Kuperli, the Bassa of Syria to come to Court, there is occasion given to think, he will fucceed in that Employment, which has been in his Family for some Generations. As this Kuperli is extremely inclin'd to War, Persons give themfelves the liberty of reporting here, that the Port will renew the War, altho' Afoph, and the other Places mention'd in the Treaty, should be surrender'd. But Advices from those Parts varying so extremely much, there can be nothing entirely depended on without farther Confirmation.

Amsterdam, January 29. N. S. They write from Paris of the Twenty second Instant, that they had Advice from Cadiz of the Twenty second of December, that Monsieur du Guey Trouin, and Monsieur du Casse, went together from Martinico, to return to France, richly laden; but as neither Place or Time of their Departure are mentioned, we must expect a farther Consistantion.

Tarmouth, January 25. Yesterday passed through our Road several laden Colliers, and Ships from Norway, to the Southward. There came also Yesterday, from the Southward, a Fleet of Coasters and light Colliers, with their Convoys, who are now here, bound to the Northward.

Plymouth, January 25. The Twenty-third came in from Falmouth, the St. Augustin, of and from Bilboa, with Iron and Wool for London. Last Night came in Her Majesty's Ship Breda from Falmouth, and under her Convoy about fixteen Tin and homeward-bound Merchant Ships, and three Vessels with Coals for this Place.

Cowes, January 26. On Thursday last came into this Road, from Torbay, and Sail'd Yesterday from Portsmouth, Her Majesty's Ships the Seaford, Lyme, and Delight, and with them five Packers for London, with three Coasters, which went up directly for Spithead, whence, it's said, they'll-Sail this Day, with others under Convoy; for the Downs
