#### NOTICE OF SEIZURE UNDER THE CUSTOMS AND EXCISE MANAGEMENT ACT 1979

To: Mr. M. M. Thompson, 2021 East Eighth Street, Jeffersonville, Indiana, U.S.A.

Pursuant to section 139 (6) of the Customs and Excise Management Act 1979, and paragraph 1 of the 3rd Schedule thereto, the Commissioners of Customs and Excise hereby give you notice that by virtue of the powers contained in the Customs and Excise Acts, certain goods, namely:

A Chevrolet Corvette motor car, registration number IND 10B 803 imported at Southampton on or about 8th June 1982

have been seized as liable to forfeiture upon the grounds that relief from payment of the duty chargeable in respect of the said goods was afforded under Part 2 of the Customs Duty (Personal Reliefs) Order 1970 (S.I. 1970 No. 558) and subsequently the Commissioners were not satisfied that a certain condition imposed by Article 6 (iii) thereof, namely that the goods shall be exported from the United Kingdom in any event not later than 12 months either from the date of their importation or from the date of the entry into the United Kingdom of the person who imported them, whichever is the earlier date had been complied with.

Whereby and by force of article 17 (2) of the said Customs Duty (Personal Reliefs) Order 1970 the said goods are liable to forfeiture.

If you claim that the said goods are not liable to forfeiture you must within 1 month from the date of this notice of seizure give notice of your claim in accordance with the said Schedule to the said Act specifying the name and address of a solicitor in the United Kingdom who is authorised to accept service of process and to act on your behalf. In default of such notice the said goods will be deemed to have been duly condemned as forfeited and will be liable to be disposed of in such manner as the
