At the Court at St. James's, March 8. 1711.

**T**HIS Day the Right Honourable Thomas Lord Viscount Weymouth was, by Her Majesty's Command, Sworn One of the Lords of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, pursuant to a late Act of Parliament in that behalf, Entituled, An Act for Rendring the Union of the two Kingdoms more entire and complete; and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

*St. James's, March 10.* This Evening Monsieur Marschalch de Biebersteyn, Minister of State, and Plenipotentiary from the King of Prussia, had a Private Audience of Leave of Her Majesty, to which he was introduc'd by the Right Honourable Henry St. John, Esq; One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and Conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

*Hamburg, March 8. N. S.* By Letters from Poland we are inform'd, that the Treasury Tribunal at Radom have sent several Deputies to the Czarowitz, who resides at Thorn, to make a Remonstrance concerning the heavy Exactions that the Muscovite Troops continue to make in the Polish Prussia; and that Prince had promis'd they should cease, as soon as he could have an Answer from the Czar his Father. We have Advice, that the King of Poland has put off his Journey to Warsaw till the Twentieth of April. His Majesty has receiv'd an Express from the Count de Vitthum, his Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of the Czar at Petersbourg, confirming the Restitution of Asoph to the Ottoman Port, and that the Surrender was made upon the Twenty eighth of January last, and that his Czarish Majesty will use his utmost Endeavours to maintain the Peace he has made with that Empire.

*Brussels, March 14. N. S.* Letters from Paris of the Twelfth, confirm those arriv'd two Days before, with an Account, that the young Dauphin, being five Years and two Months old, dy'd at Versailles on the Eighth Instant, between Eleven and Twelve at Night, after four Days Sickness of the Measles. This Accident is the more afflicting to the Court, because that Prince's Brother, the Duke of Anjou, an Infant of two Years of Age, is likewise ill of the same Distemper, but there appear favourable Symptoms of his Recovery. Deputies from Flanders are come hither to acquaint the Government, that the States of that Province have lately granted an extraordinary Subsidy of three hundred thousand Florins, over and above the ordinary one, for the use of the Troops assign'd on them, and for other Puklick Services during the present Year.

*Utrecht, March 15. N. S.* On Saturday the 12th Instant, was held the usual General Conference; at which, it being propos'd as unnecessary to meet twice a Week between that and the Thirtieth Instant, when the Ministers of France have promised to explain themselves upon the Demands of the Allies; it was on all sides agreed, That no general Conference should be held before Saturday the Nineteenth, the next on Wednesday the Twenty third, and none the Saturday following, the same being Easter-Eve, and proper to be employ'd in Devotion. Yesterday

Morning Count Sinzendorff set out for the Hague, where he expects to meet Prince Eugene upon his return from England, and intends to be back here on Friday, in order to assist at the next general Conference. Some other Ministers have likewise taken the opportunity of this Vacation to make a turn to the Hague. Lieutenant-Colonel Benson, of the Earl of Strafford's Regiment of Dragoons, is come hither from Spain, through Italy, in his way to England, and says, we may expect to see his Grace the Duke of Argyle here, in four or five Days.

*Utrecht, March 18. N. S.* Yesterday Morning the Ministers of the Allies held a Conference, as usual, at the Town-house. The same Day being the Anniversary of the Foundation of this University, Monsieur Burman, according to Custom, made an Oration upon laying down the Annual Office of Rector Magnificus, in which he is succeeded by Monsieur Serruifer. My Lord Privy Seal, who was present at this Ceremony, took that Occasion to invite several of the Professors to Dinner. We have for some Days past, had a Rumour here, that the young Dauphin and his Brother were dead; the former is confirm'd by an Express to the French Ministers, but we are still in Uncertainty as to the latter. Sir James Wihart has acquainted the British Plenipotentiaries with his Arrival at the Hague, where he is to concert with the States General, such Matters as relate to the Sea Service for the ensuing Summer.

*Hague, March 15. N. S.* Letters from Paris of the Twelfth Instant advise, That Monsieur du Cassé was arriv'd with his Squadron at a Port in Gallicia. Several Couriers have been lately dispatch'd to Brabant and Flanders, with Orders to the Generals of the States, concerning the opening of the Campaign. On Sunday last the Deputies of their High Mightinesses held an extraordinary Conference. Yesterday Count Tilly parted hence for the Frontiers, where the Army will be form'd on the Fifteenth of April next; and the same Evening Count Sinzendorff arriv'd here. Last Night a Messenger past through this Place with Dispatches for the Queen of Great Britain's Plenipotentiaries at Utrecht.

*Hague March 18. N. S.* Yesterday Morning an Envoy from the King of Poland, and likewise an Envoy from his Highness the Elestor Palatine, had each a particular Conference with the Deputies of the States General. Count Tarrouca, Monsieur Consbruck, and several other Plenipotentiaries and Ministers of the Allies are arriv'd here from Utrecht. Two hundred Recruits for three Regiments of English Horse, that are now in Flanders, landed yesterday at Rotterdam, and are pursuing their March for the Low-Countries. Baron Heems, the Minister of his Imperial Majesty, has been in Conference with the States, concerning the regulation of Quarter's for near Twenty four thousand Men, being the Imperial Troops who are on their March for Flanders, and are expected near Maestricht about the beginning of the next Month. Letters from Paris, of the Fourteenth Instant, bring Advice, That the young Duke of Anjou was recovered, and that his illness had been occasioned by the breeding of his Teeth.
