Hamburg, April 12. N. S.

THE Emperor has very earnestly invited the Elector of Treves to be present at his Coronation at Presburg, in Hungary, which is, deferr'd till the next Month, because the Deputies of Transylvania, who are to assist at that Ceremony, will be oblig'd to remain upon the Frontiers for three Weeks, because the Plague has been in their Country, and there will not be sufficient Storage about Presburg before that time, for the numerous Retinue that will attend his Imperial Majesty. The five young Princes of Bavaria have obtain'd the Emperor's leave to reside at Gratz, where his Majesty has appointed them Governors, and Money for their Expences according to their Quality. We have Advice from Petersbourg, that his Czarish Majesty will set out from thence to Pomerania after Easter; and that Prince Menzikoff will be at Koningsbourg, about the Fifth of this Instant, from whence he is to proceed to Coldinguen, to Confer with the King of Denmark, concerning the Operations of the approaching Campaign in the North. The Suedes are apprehensive the Danes will make their greatest Efforts on the side of Norway, and that they will endeavour at a Descent in the Dutchy of Bremen. The Reports continue, that the King of Sweden remains still at Bender, and the Palatine of Kiovia at Jassi.

Hamburg, April 19. N. S. The Diet of Warsaw began its Sessions upon the Fifth of this Month, and after long Debates, the Count Dönhoff, who is intirely in the Interest of King Augustus, was elected Marshal of the Confederacy, from which beginning a good Issue is expected in their following Consultations. The first Proposal which the Senators made to his Polish Majesty, was to desire him to fix the Term of two Months for the departure of the Muscovite Forces out of that Kingdom. His Majesty has given Orders for the Regiment of his Guards, and three other Regiments of Foot to March into Pomerania with a Train of Artillery, consisting of twelve Pieces of Cannon. Prince Menzikoff is already gone from Elbing, in his Passage for Pomerania, but that he will stay some time at Berlin, to make some Proposals from the Czar his Master to his Prussian Majesty. The Swedish Vessels upon the Elbe, have given Chase to some Danes, and their mutual Hostilities still continue. There was a strong Report in this City a few Days ago, that an Action had happened between the Danish Troops and the Suedes in Pomerania, but though two considerable Parties approach'd very near one another, yet they parted without any Engagement.

Brussels, April 21. N. S. The English Troops which were part of this Garrison, march'd hence on the Fourteenth Instant, to the general Rendezvous of the Army. General Wrangel has taken the Command of the Forces remaining here, in the room of the General Baron de Heyden, who commands the

Dutch Troops that were Quarter'd here last Winter. Two Spanish Regiments, and two Squadrons of Dragoons are expected here, which will compleat this Garrison so far, as that we shall have no occasion to fear the Insults of the Enemy during the approaching Campaign. We have Advice from Namur, that the French have evacuated the Forts and Castles of Namur, and that the Bavarian Forces have taken Possession of them. Nothing has pass'd between the two Armies on the Frontiers of Artois. The Designs that have been form'd for driving the Enemy from the Senette have been rendred impracticable, because our Forces cannot march towards them, by reason of the continuance of the ill Weather.

Utrecht, April 22. N. S. Yesterday a Conference was held here, as usual, between as many of the Ministers of the Allies as are at present residing here: They who went to the Hague are expected back this Evening, in order to assist at the General Conference to Morrow, although it is not yet certainly known, whether that will produce any thing more material than some of the preceeding Ones have lately done. Monsieur Palmquist, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sweden to the States-General, who has likewise the Character of Plenipotentiary for the Congress of Peace from the Circle of the Upper Rhine, is come from the Hague, and after making a short stay, will return thither, having no other Business at present, but the providing for his future Accommodation here. The Ministers of Parma, Modena, and of the Republick of Genoa, are all arriv'd at this Place. No General Conference was held upon the Twentieth, because it was appointed for a Solemn Fast, which was kept throughout all the Provinces.

Haghe, April 20. N. S. Two Days ago a Deputation from the Assembly of the States-General, went to the House of the Earl of Strafford; and having had a Conference with his Excellency, that lasted about half an Hour, return'd to give an account of the result of it to the Assembly. Prince Eugene of Savoy will set out to Morrow, to put himself at the Head of the Army in Flanders; he came hither Yesterday in the Morning, together with Count Sinzendorf, and in the Evening had a Conference with the Earl of Strafford and the Deputies of the States-General, and the Council of State, which lasted two Hours. All the Plenipotentiaries of the Allies, who came hither from Utrecht, are returning thither, to be present at the General Conference that is to be held to Morrow.

Plymouth, April 10. Yesterday sail'd Her Majesty's Ship the Monk with five Merchant Ships for Ireland. This Day came in Her Majesty's Ship the Speedwell from the Westward. Arriv'd the Abraham and Isaac of and for London, with Wine from Maderas.
