Hamburgb, April 22. N. S.

Prince Menzikoff has sent one of his Officers to the Senate of Dantzick, to let them know, that his Master had Authoriz'd him, as well by Word of Mouth, as by Writing, to terminate the Differences that were between his Czarish Majesty and that City, and desir'd them at the same time, to send two Senators with full Powers to treat of and conclude those Matters: But no Answer is as yet return'd; from whence it is concluded that the Senate are of Opinion, That the Czar has already receiv'd sufficient Sums of Money from them, without their being liable to any farther Demands. The King of Denmark is now at Scanderbourg, and has given Order, that the Passage of Seeland shall be open'd upon the first of May. The several Ministers who are to assist at the Imperial Commission to compose the Troubles of this City, had Yesterday a particular Conference at the House of the Count de Schonborn, and expect only the Baron de Grote to begin their Sessions.

Brussels, April 25. N. S. The States of Flanders have consented to the Six hundred thousand Florins demanded as the Contingent of that Province, towards furnishing the Imperial and Palatine Auxiliary Troops that are to serve on this side with Bread and Forage, during the approaching Campaign. The Province of Hainault having granted only Ninety thousand Florins of the Hundred thousand they were to contribute for the same Service, Baron Heems, the Emperor's Minister, set out Yesterday for Mons, in order to induce those States to furnish their whole Proportion. Two Regiments of Imperial Horse, with one of Hussars, pass'd the Rhine on the Nineteenth at Bon, and are advancing towards this Place. Prince Eugene of Savoy having left the Hague on the Twenty second, was expected Yesterday at Gand, on his way to the Army in Flanders. The last Accounts from the two Armies in Artois, left them in the same Situation as when the former Letters came away, the bad Weather still continuing, and the Roads being rendred impracticable: But the Intelligences from the Enemy inform us, that the Marechal Villars, who left Paris on the Eighteenth, was Hourly expected there.

Utrecht, April 26. N. S. Upon Saturday the Twenty third Instant, a General Conference, as usual, was held at the Town-house, wherein the Ministers of the Allies having enquir'd of those of France, whether they were yet ready to give in their Answer in Writing, they said they were not; whereupon it was afterwards propos'd and agreed to, That the General Meetings should for some time be suspended until the French Plenipotentiaries should give notice that they were prepared. All the Ministers of the Allies assisted at this Conference, except some few that were not return'd from the Hague, as it was expected. The same Morning Sir James Wilbart came

hither from that Place, having concluded the Affairs which he had to transact with the States-General: He is advis'd to go to Aix la Chapelle for his Health, and only waits for the arrival of Letters from England, before he proceeds on his Journey thither. The Earl of Strafford and Count Sinzendorf return'd hither from the Hague in the Evening, and Yesterday the Ministers of the Allies agreed to defer Meeting at the Town-house till Monday next; but in the mean time they frequently hold particular Conferences with one another. The Duke of Ormond has this Morning signify'd his arrival at Rotterdam to the Earl of Strafford, who will set out in the Evening, in order to meet his Grace at the Hague. The Baron de Soffenberg, Plenipotentiary on the Part of the Circle of Swabia, has notify'd his arrival here. Letters from several Parts of Switzerland advise, that the Cantons of Bern and Zurich have ordered Six thousand Men to march into the Country of the Abby of St. Galle, to defend the Inhabitants in their Privileges, against the Encroachments of the Abbot, who has caus'd several Forces to march into the County of Tockenburgh, and that the forementioned Cantons have Ten thousand Men more in a readiness, if there should be any occasion for their Service.

Hague, April 26. N. S. His Grace the Duke of Ormond who set Sail from Harwich on the Twenty third Instant, with a Convoy of Seven Men of War, Two Yachts, and about Forty Transports, arriv'd at the Mouth of the Maes Yesterday Morning; where meeting with a contrary Tide, his Grace took the Boat and went directly to Rotterdam, from whence they came to this Place about Ten the last Night, accompanied by several General Officers and other Persons of Quality. The Transports, having on board Recruit-Horses, and Cloathing for Her Majesty's Troops, are got safe into the Goree. The Duke of Ormond went this Morning to visit the President of the Week and the Grand Pensionary, and has since been complimented, upon his arrival, by the chief Persons of Distinction residing here. The Earl of Strafford having receiv'd advice at Utrecht that his Grace is landed, has sent him word by an Express, that he will meet him there to Morrow.

Falmouth, April 17. On the Fifteenth sail'd Her Majesty's Ship Monk, and the Ships formerly mentioned, with the Union Packet, Capt. Jones, with two Mails for Lisbon. This Day came in here a Transport from St. Malo with One hundred Prisoners.

Plymouth, April 18. Yesterday the Tilbury, with about twelve Merchant Ships for Lisbon. The same time sail'd the Kinsale and Lancaster, with about Twenty five Merchant Ships for Newfoundland, and the Dolphin and Lizard with about Forty Sail for Wales.
