*Turin, April 9. N. S.*

**E**Very thing continues very quiet on our Frontiers. The German Detachment which lately arriv'd at St. Balein and Montanaro, continue still there; and, as the Soldiers want several things to enable them to take the Field, his Royal Highness hath promis'd the General Officers that he will not make them March towards the Mountains, 'till it be absolutely necessary, that their Officers may have time to furnish themselves with such Provisions as may be convenient. General Zumjungen hath begun the Siege of Porto Ercole, but cannot push it on with any Vigour, 'till he receives the Succours and Ammunition, which are order'd from Naples. His Royal Highness with his Court, continue at the Venerie, where they are all in perfect Health. A Courier is every Moment expected here from Utrecht, with the French Answer to the Demands of the Allies, by which it is believ'd, we may be able to guess at the Success of the Negotiations there.

*Venice, April 16. N. S.* We have Advice from Naples, that Her Majesty's Ships the Cornwall and Mary, with some Transports and several Tartanes, were Sail'd with Provisions for Port Mahone. The Letters from Rome bring an Account, that a Promotion of Cardinals is expected very speedily. There is a great mortality of Horses in that City, and in all the Southern Parts of Italy, but a Remedy has been found out which saves many of them. Upon Saturday in the Evening, the Earl of Peterborough return'd hither by Post from Genoa. The Weston Gally is arriv'd here with Sugar, Lead, and other Commodities from Bristol. The Letters from Constantinople of the Tenth of March inform us, that the Port not being satisfy'd with the Restitution of Afopn, makes still farther Pretensions upon the Muscovites, and that the Cham of Tartary was in a readiness to March; in the mean time their Preparations for War, give an Umbrage to this Republick.

*Milan; April 16. N. S.* We have Advice from Florence, that the German Cavalry which were Quarter'd in the Siennese, are arriv'd in the Country of Pifa, but it is not yet known whether they will March back into Lombardy, or pass directly for Final, to be in a readiness to embark for Barcelona. The Attack of Porto Ercole goes on but slowly, because the Artillery and Ammunition that was expected from Naples, are not yet arriv'd. The Count de Vimercato is sent from hence to Rome, to acquaint the Pope with the Death of the Cardinal Archinto, Archbishop of this Place, and to intreat him to nominate some other Nobleman of Milan in his room.

*Zurich, April 20. N. S.* The Roman Catholick Canton of Lucerne has seiz'd several Posts upon the Frontiers of Zurich, and the latter has sent about Sixteen thousand Men into the County of Tockenburgh. The Troops of the Canton of Berne are marching thither with Twelve Pieces of Cannon, and a great quantity of Ammunition. Both these Protestant Cantons have publish'd a Manifesto, declaring, that they have no other Design than the Protection of the Inhabitants in their ancient Privileges and Liberties; and that they are desirous to accept of any friendly and honourable Mediation, rather than come to a Rupture.

*Utrecht, April 29. N. S.* Yesterday Morning at a General Conference which was held between the Ministers of the Allies, Baron Stoffenberg produc'd his full Powers from the Circle of Swabia, and was admitted into the Conference. In the Afternoon the Ministers of France dispatch'd a Courier to their Court, and seeing they have not as yet demanded a Conference for to Morrow, with the Ministers of the Allies, it is suppos'd that they are not provided to give in any Answer. The Baron Bothmar, who is arriv'd from England at the Hague, is expected here this Evening, having the Character of Plenipotentiary from the Elector of Hanover and Brunswick, for the present Negotiations of Peace.
